### SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat, well-formed track, no steps, 5km or less. Clearly signposted. Suitable for wheelchairs with assistance.
- Formed track. May have gentle hills and some steps. Clearly signposted. No experience required
- Formed track, some obstacles, 20km or less.
   May have short steep hills and many steps.
   Some experience recommended.
- 4. Rough Track. May be long and very steep with few directional signs. For experienced bushwalkers.
- 5. Unformed track. Likely to be very rough, very steep and unmarked. For very experienced bushwalkers with specialised skills.

#### Pre-Outing Report – Autumn Visit to Rock Slab in Girraween – 26th March 2023

We will meet as usual at Weeroona Park at 9 a.m. Our meeting spot for morning tea will be a short distance along Mt Norman Road from the intersection with Pyramids Road . After morning tea we will climb the rock slab out to the south carrying our lunch. We will be looking for changes to the environment since we were last there in October 2022. Instead of doing a loop walk we will be exploring further to the south than our previous visits. The return trip will be retracing our steps and we plan to back at the cars for afternoon tea. If we have spare time we will look at the area on the western side of Pyramids Road.

#### Outing Report – The Piano Mill – 26th February 2023

Our February outing was to The Piano Mill just south of the Mt Lindesay Road where fifteen members were joined by a couple from the Tenterfield Nats club and the owners and friends of The Piano Mill.

The day was beautiful, very little cloud or wind and a comfortable walking temperature. We had smoko at The Mill site whilst Bruce and Jocelyn, the owners, spoke to us about the history of their project. We carried lunch and walked around a slashed track identifying plants and birds. around a slashed track identifying plants and birds. We stopped for lunch at the main dam area before completing the circuit back to the cars.

The area visited on top of the Dividing Range just west of the scarp and fairly level, has been grazed and logged in the past but is now in a fairly pristine condition. Bruce and Jocelyn have included all uncleared areas of the property in a future Conservation Reserve in perpetuity. With an easterly/southerly aspect the area has fairly moist climate and is covered with tall eucalypt forest with emergent rainforest species in the gullies.

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Our route had been slashed recently and was easy walking, with a descent into a deep gully and an easy climb back up to the higher ground leading to the lunch spot by their dam and picnic area. After lunch a short walk led back to the cars.

Birds were not plentiful but nice sightings were a black-faced monarch (a summer visitor) and a large-billed scrubwren in the gully. A group of very enthusiastic botanists compiled a large plant list. Some members of the party were attended by leeches (one member for the very first time) but all in all it was a very nice day. We were finished before 3pm.

At the dam site, a large log was balanced on a post such that it could be revolved quite easily. There were metal tubes hanging from the log which hit upstanding rocks placed on the ground at various distances from the pivot point so that different notes played as the log was revolving.

106 plant species have been identified so far, which is available to any member who wants it. We only ended up with eight birds seen or heard on the day. Peter identified a greater number of birds on a previous visit to The Piano Mill.


