SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat, well-formed track, no steps, 5km or less. Clearly signposted. Suitable for wheelchairs with assistance.
- 2. Formed track. May have gentle hills and some steps. Clearly signposted. No experience required
- 3. Formed track, some obstacles, 20km or less. May have short steep hills and many steps. Some experience recommended.
- 4. Rough Track. May be long and very steep with few directional signs. For experienced bushwalkers.
- 5. Unformed track. Likely to be very rough, very steep and unmarked. For very experienced bushwalkers with specialised skills.

Preouting Report - 25 June - Girraween Rock Slab

As many of our members come from different areas in the Granite Belt we will make our own way to our meeting spot for 10 a.m. morning tea which will be a short distance along Mt Norman Road from the intersection with Pyramids Road . This spot is about an hour's drive from Stanthorpe. When doing the pre outing we noticed lots of wattle heavy in bud but no flowers yet. There were still

flowers of golden everlasting remaining and also banksia integrifolia. We saw one banksia Spinulosa.

After morning tea we will climb the rock slab out to the south carrying our lunch. We will be looking for changes

> to the environment since we were last there in October 2022.

Instead of doing a loop

walk we will be exploring further to the south than on our previous visits. The return trip will be retracing our steps and we plan to back at the cars for afternoon tea.

If we have spare time we will look at the area on the western side of Pyramids Road where there is an extensive area of acacia granitica. When doing the pre-outing we were surprised at the number of pretty faced wallabies beside the road and also some eastern greys, so drive safely. After the outing it may be better to return via the day use area and the highway so as to avoid the afternoon sun glare.

Boonoo Boonoo Outing Report 28th May



Unfortunately there were no takers for the outing at Weeroona Park on a perfect winter day, but as Trish and I were all prepared we decided to go it alone. The previous outing to the area in April 2015 attracted 11 people, and before that I found another outing in April 1978 with 25 and the best in November 1971 with 41. On the latter two trips most participants climbed to the bottom of the falls on the

track which is now closed.

Trish and I stopped at the Platypus pool for morning tea with a family of four Australiasian Grebes to entertain us. We then went along the River track to the falls which were quite a sight with a good flow in the river, then returned to our car for a rather late lunch and returned home.

The following list of flowering plants surprised us since it was early winter.



New England Banksia – Banksia neoanglica, White Banksia – Banksia integrifolia, New England Beard-heath – Leucopogon neoanglicus, Prickly Moses – Acacia ulicifolia, River she-oak – Casuarina cunninghamiana male and female flowers, Grass trigger plant – Stylidium graminifolia, Golden everlasting – Xerochrysum bracteatum, Wild Parsnip – Trachymene incisa, Flannel flowers – Actinotus helianthin, Common correa – Correa reflexa, Trailing lobelia – Lobelia andrewsii, Grey billy buttons – Craspedia canens, Prickly guinea flower – Hibbertia acicularis, Black-eyed Susan – Tetratheca thymifolia, Lady's slippers – Hybanthus
