

In the absences of president Robin, the meeting was chaired very smoothly by vice -president, John O'Donnell, who extended a welcome to members and numerous visitors and in particular the Guest Speaker Mr. Roy Wheeler.

On behalf of the C.W.A. Mrs.Marsden apologised for the double booking of the C.W.A. Rooms necessitating our change of venue. Mrs.Marsden's action was so prompt and well organized that, indeed, no inconvenience was occasioned by the club in any way. Thank you Millie.

Jean Harslett pointed out that the rent of the Civic Centre exhibition area room was \$15 and the C.W.A. was agreeing to pay the extra on our usual rent. However ,since the mix-up was not really the fault of the C.W.A. that the least we could do was to pay half. Moved Jean Harslett and seconded Dot Archer that the Club pay \$7.50 towards the rent... Carried.

CHRISTMAS PARTY. The venue for and the date of the Christmas Party was discussed. President Robin had offered the use of his home at Severnlea, an offer for which the club is most grateful. It was considered that the most suitable date would be Dec.13th. following the Girraween Workshop.

The meeting closed at 8.39.pm. Vice President Mr.John O'Donnell

then capabily introduced cur rather special Guest Speaker, the well known Victorian bird observer Mr. Roy Wheeler.

REPORT ON PROGRAMME: - by Jean Harslett.

Mr.Roy Wheeler opened his programme by speaking briefly of his 68 years of bird watching, and 500 birds wiser of personal observing of Australian Species. He also spoke on this trip of the 80 good cooks he had met. The number is now increased as he was hosted for several days while in the district by Janet and Colin Hockings. Nancy Aiken and Loranthee Greenup also provided, I'm sure, more good scones for morning teas. Mrs.Loranthee Greenup was interested to meet Mr.Wheeler, after years of correspondence and providing bird observations for him over many years.

Mr. Wheeler is one of Australia's well known bird observers. He has the honour of being the first Australian to have been award -ed the M.B.E. directly for work on conservation and Nature Study. Bird watching for 68 years and 500 species wiser, which he has pers -onally observed. He has 16 years of service to the International

COUNCIL for BIRD PRESERVATION, in which Prince Philip: has taken a very active interest.

He has been associated as writer or editor with 16 publications or books, Sec. of Bird Observers Club of Vic., Vice-President of the Gould League of Victoria and Life member of 3 ornithological assocs.

Following the passing of his wife Vera, Mr Wheeler decided to travel around Australia, with the objective of observing in one year, and surpassing the figure of 490 sightings by Mr. Arnold Mc. Gill of Sydney. He joined any trips in the year done by other bird observers and commenced by joining the trip by the Bird Observers Club to the remote Kimberly areas in W. A. in June 1979. A trip across the Nullabor in Sept. by R. A. O. U. 1979. Mr. Wheeler's address titled "Chasing a Record" was well illustrated by some outstanding photographs collected from some of the best known bird photographers of Australia and depicted many rare an most unusual species.

He began in Canberra with number one observation a "Galah", this recorded on New Years Day. The route progressed through Victoria, South Australia and N.S.W. many bird observers called upon ,many stays with them and plenty of Human interest along with other comments supported all the way by those top photographs of birds. Queensland was visited next by March, the list went from 249, to 340 during April and May in Southern Qld.including Green Mountains and visits west to the Malcolm Wilsons and Camerons who helped the list along considerably by their local knowledge. Back to Melbourne thence to Kimberleys. Then Adelaide, Alice Springs Darwin, MtIsa Cairns various reef islands. The 500 tally was created by the view -ing of the common noddy. At Binalong N.S.W. a Supberb Parrot seen on 31st.Dec. brought the list to the tall \$\frac{\psi}{2}\$ to 501.

Mr.Wheeler stayed in 80 homes and saw 35 species not previously listed by him. To new recordoffbirds to Aust. namely the Green Sandpiper from Northern Europe and Asia and the Brown-headed Gull from the HongKong, both migrants.

Mr. Wheeler was asked during question time, "How many miles?"
His reply was a part enership ownership in Australian airlines!!!
Though many slides shown Mr. Wheeler held the attention of everyone throughout and indeed we really were on our toes to get to that 500 figure, and were excited when it was reached. The vote of thanks for such a memorable programme was given by Jean Harslett and carried enthusiatically. A number of visitors interested in bird watching throughout the district, joined us for the night and it was splendid to have them with us, to enjoy this unusual programme and to see such wonderful pictures of species we may never have the chance or stamina to carry out.

I would also like to record in these notes that Mrs Loranthe Greenup was present and met Mr. Wheeler in person for the first time ,after corresponding with him and sendehim bird observations for 30 years. Both were delighted with this meeting. Some one asked how many years of observing and recording to earn a kiss from the guest of honour? The answer inthis case thirty years !!!!

The report on the outing to Mount Cordeaux led by Mr. Colin

Hockings will appear in the next bulletin.

However an extract from a letter from Mr.Geoff Monteith (Curator of Entomology at the Queensland Museum) may be of interest about a very colourful and photographed "longicorn" beetle. This particular beetle was so colourful that I was really taken by it having only seen this sort of colouration in exotic species. I have on several occasions seen the most comprehensive collction of this family which is housed in Sydney and was the collection of the late Mr.Keith Mc.Keown, an Australian authority on the group. The extract from Mr.Monteith's letter is fairly enthusiatic and reads thus,

"Despite its bright colouration, it is apparently a Prionine."
(a family of which the other representatives are brown) "I've seen it once or twice before in collections, always very old spec-imens. We had a couple in the University Collection, collected for student collections and labelled "South Johnstone". I remem-ber I once took them to Sydney with a bunch of other un-named longicorns to check them in the bib Mc. Koewn Collection in the Australian Museum-without finding it there. They were such un-Austr-alian looking things that I always had a Gnawing suspicion that a few mis-labled exotics had found their way into the student collection. How ever this very fresh specimen from you scotches that belief!

Your specimen, Jean is so much larger than any previously seen. Did you notice its really remarkable mandibles? I have never seen them in other species. Yours is a male so perhapes its large size and specially modified mandibles are characteristic of the sex."

That completes Geoff's remarks , however it is interesting to note that the only two known specimens came from South Johnstone and this from a scrub area in the other extremity of Queensland. which suggests the possibility of a very long range. It was certain—ly the most colourful longicorn beetle I have ever seen and was in its pristine beauty of being newly emerged.

Jean Harslett was shown a nest by Miss Helen Butler of a pair of King Parrots which had nested an a perfectly flat peice of ground in the middle of nowhere. The shining white eggs were like little headlights, when the nest was left. However despite this they did not fall to preditors, but eggs dried out in severe heat of an unusually hot period.
