Outing Report - Ray Marsden gave a brief report of the outing from the Sanitarium through to Finneys Falls. After a look at the site of the now dismantled Sanitarium the party moved down to the Quart Pot Creek and followed it to Finneys Falls. Most noticable was the effect of the heavy frosts and/or dry weather on the wattles and cypresses which showed up by their colours of very effec-tive autumn tones. Some sections were very lush and the finding of an unknown shrub was made. Evidence of the work of early tin miners - possibly Chinese - was the digging of trenches parallel with the creek and the rock piled along the edges. In all a good outing.

PLEASE NOTE CHANGE OF NIGHT - TUESDAY, September 21st.

John James from National Parks & Wildlife Service based at Warwick is our speaker for this night and he will be speaking on : Rural Nature Conservation.

John is going to talk and show slides on a new project of the Service. It involves the integration of fauna and flora conservation with rural enterprises such as grazing, for the mutual benefit of nature and the human community.

Ecological destruction has always followed civilized man like a shadow. This project will document the experience of landholders trying to reduce further degradation and thus it is both interesting and very important.

Meeting will start at 8 p.m. followed by our guest speaker.

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OUTING REPORT - From the Old Sanitarium site through to Finney's Falls.

August outing was organised by the bush walking officer, Ray Marsden, and took us, on foot, from the old Sanitarium site through to Finney's Falls. Fifteen adults and six children took part in the outing. The first part of the outing was along the road prepared and built with stone walling by the patients at the San. When the site of the San.was reached a halt was made to inspect what remains of the complex. It is sad to note that there is surpising little left of this part of Stanthorpe's history. It was in 1911 that Dr. Helen Shaw developed the sanitarium for the care of people with chest complaints in the belief that the cold bracing climate was of value. After the World War I the Government took over the area and developed it into a large complex for returned men with T.B. and such afflictions. The sanitarium had a capacity of one hundred patients and Dr. Eustace Russell was the Superintendant and the resident was Dr. Steele. Treatment included plenty of fresh air and the buildings were designed for this, many with canvas roll up walls. Patients who were well enough worked in the gardens, some of this work is still visible today. It was later found that the climate in Stanthorpe was no better for the ٩

treatment of T.B. than Brisbane, so patients were moved to Rosemount and the buildings were offered for sale. Many were removed to Stanthorpe and close centres for housing and the Drill Hall is said to be one of the buildings from this site.

The reservoir tank is still intact and many cement slabs, which once were floors of various wards etc. are all that remain in the area. Several large pines have recently been felled andthese would have been planted when the San. was in its prime.

The walking party then moved on to Quart Pot Creek and stops were frequent as people found objects of interest. Many varities of wild flowers were seen, many in bud but without rain they may not come to full blossom. Even in the creek area many of the shrubs were showing signs of stress both from the excessive cold and the drought conditions.

Another interesting facet of the outing was the evidence of tin mining activities along Quart Pot Creek. These included the channels dug beside the creek to divert the water while the creek bed was mined, many small holes dug to get the tin, and the very large dredge holes with still some of the steel buckets from the dredging chain lying around. Evidence was also seen of the habitation from the tin mining days. One wonders what hardships these miners endured to get the mineral from the rocky earth.

The destination of Finney's Falls was reached at the alloted time of 4 p.m. but the distance travelled was found to be closer to 4 Klms. than the three stated in the pre outing notes. Not a lot of water was coming over the falls but the sound of the softly falling water held a fascination of its own. The young people had a wonderful time exploring this rocky wall and the adults found the wild flowers of interest. It was felt that the dry time has taken its toll on the number of wildflowers in this area. Members enjoyed the day and thanked the leader Ray Marsden for his organisation.

FLORA AND FAUNA SEEN - Leucopogen would have been the most prolific wildflower seen during the walk and many varieties of Acacia were flowering or in bud. One shrub in bloom was not able to be identified by any members and so a piece was pressed and it is hoped that identification will be established.

Another point of interest was the viewing of three possums (?) which had departed this life. The remains were found in close proximity and one wonders what caused the deaths. Another sad pile of head and feathers marked the last resting place of a Kookaburra.
