A Regent Bower Bird (female) which stayed around for quite a period, then was found dead presumably because of the lack of its usual diet. He also recorded a Little Brown Cuckoo and some Plum-headed Finches and enquired if these had been recorded locally Jean Harslett reported seeing a male Lyrebird within 3 kms. of the Stanthorpe P.O. on the Sugarloaf Road. She feared foul play and wondered if someone had endeavoured to bring it to town to show off and that they got "cold"feet before getting there. An interesting note came from Brian Mc.Donagh who told of a pair of Turquoise Parrots nesting down a hollow post in his trellesed grape vines, and marvelled at the size of the hole they were getting into.

BUSINESS Trees to be planted at Storm King Dam, are not ready yet. They are still too small for droughty conditios, and are being cared for and nurtured in Tom Archers Nursery.

BOONOO BOONNOO OUTING A REPORT BY LEADER TOM ARCHER 21:11:82.

Boonoo Boonnoo was originally a small township and a Cobb and Co. stop or staging post, on the Mount Lindsay Highway which then, was the main north south road link.

In its gold mining days the village was made up of a shop, a school, an hotel, various residences and a cemetry. Now there is only one visible house left to mark the spot. However scattered groups of exotic trees suggest previous residence.

Further down the road towards Tenterfield where the terrain drops more steeply through a narrow valley is "Thunderbolt's Hideout" and higher up is "Thunderbolt's Lookout" names which recall Thunderbolt's (FredWard) bushranging days, when valuable loads even including gold passed this way. The "Hideout" is quite an interesting rock formation.

Nearby the present road is a slab of concrete and below have been constructed some wartime tank obstructions. These were made during the early days of World War 11 as part of the "Brisbane Line". It was hoped that if the Japs invaded the North-East of Australiathey could be stapped just north of Brisbane.McArthur had other ideas and was out to stop them where ever they happen--ed to be and he certainly was not going to wait for their marches through the bush.

About this period the Cunningham Gap-Road, the Heifer Creek Road and the extension of bitumen surface of the Stanthorpe to Wallangarra via Devil's Elbowwere put through. Thus the. **Thus**= Mount Lindsay Highway after years of being the most used thor--oughfare retired to being just a road.

Our first stop was to look for, and be successful, a patch of Pupple Diuris. In fact the main feature of the outing were the wild flowers, which were remarkably good. All the messmates on the hilltops were in flower, too, and gave a faint suggestion of a powdering of snow on a very hot day.

Our next stop was at Morgan's Gully where a cut has been made through the rock to enable the old creek bed above to besluiced out. Gold was the goal and with what success seems unknown. However though it appears that there was little fortune here, times appear to have changed when he moved north into Queens--land and discovered Mount Morgan which also bears his name. It seems this gully rests peacefully on, whilst his mountain namesake has seen incredible change. Above this rock cut are a couple of old boilers from a portable steam engine. In the near future the road is going to be moved uphill to avoid two bad

creek crossings and will pass beside these boilers and will then cross the creek by bridge.

The cool stream running within its banks and under the ferns was very pleasant and nearby pink boronia andyellow and brown pea flowers were providing an excellent display. The next stop was for lunch, at a popular picnic spot on the River, where we en--joyed the sight of a cool expanse of water and some of the kids enjoyed the swimming. Near a small stream, close by was a smallbut beautiful patch of pink Grevillea, and a large flowered white heath.

Our last stop was at BoonooBoonoo Falls but by that time the bottom of the falls was too far below the top, and we were content to admire the falls from above. This time some of the adults went swimming as well as the children, but it must have been on the cool side, because <u>even</u> the children said so ! Here the local "Hollybush" Oxylobium illicifolium was in full bloom, and very nice too. Driving home there was promise of a storm, but no luck.

BOONOO BOONOO OUTING FLOWERS by DORE Mc.COSKER, 21:11:1982.

Blackbutts - Eucalyptus pilularis = were blooming along the roadsides and on the hills in their thousands.

With the approach of Summer small flowers are more evident in the grass - various daisies, the dainty blue lily, Dianella laevis, two species of Goodenia, Wallenbergia, the cousin of the violets, Hybanthus filiformis, some mauve doubletails -Diuris punctatum and some dainty Hibbertia.Pink Trigger plants -Stylidium gramminifol--ium, kept the 'littlies' busy popping the 'triggers'.

The scarlet flowers of the prostrate Grevillea trinervis con--trasted with the fluffy white of Pimelea.

At Morgan's Gully just a few belated blooms clung to the Kunzea capitata bushes, and two Leptospermums and two yellow Callistemons, namely C.sieberii and C.pallidus were seen on the rocks but the lovely shadings of colour of massed calyxs on the Calythrix tetrogona were a lovelier sight.

Boronia in full bloom is always a delight and the low growing species in this area is especially showy. Here too were the yellow pea flowers of Dillwynia and Pultenaea, the cyclamen coloured Comesperma ericinum and also in these parts the closely related C.retusum distinguishable from the former by erect character and flat leaves and growing in the swamps of 3,000-5,000 ft. The white Conospermum, golden everlastings, Helichrysum and the prickly holly leafed pea -Oxylobium ilicifolium were plentiful hereabouts.

The steep banks of the trench-like watercourse provided just the right climate for many ferns, mainly Gleichenia dicarpa (the Umbrella fern) with a few of its close relative Sticherus flabell--atus and some Fish back ferns -Blechnum sp.-
