June Outing Report by Frank Wilkinson

The June Outing coincided with the shortest day of the year and a -6 temperature reading. However, ten members in three cars spent a very enjoyable day and covered 273 kilometres. The smaller number was due to school holidays, which enabled families to holiday elsewhere, and

to some other family committments.

We left on time and stopped at Tenterfield for a few minutes to see that all was well. Here we turned east and travelled through hilly country with a great many bends in the road and a good view of wellington Rock could be obtained provided ones neck was in good working order. Another stop was made to investigate a disturbing noise in my car, here I must point out that the noise was exterior. We found nothing and it gradually disappeared, much to my releif. We then stopped at Drake, where gold mining is still taking place and had a cuppa. A few photos were ta taken here.

A goodly bit of roadwork was encountered but caused us no trouble and near Tabulam we turned north and came across a now disused lime-

stone quarry with some old machinery about.

We had half an hour or more to fossick, Jean found some copper ptrites and we all had a bit of something or other to fetch home. More photos were taken, some of green water and green rocks too. Onwards towards Pretty Gully where another stop was made to admire a patch of rainforest type vegetation and numerous wrens. Tree ferns were in evidence also passion fruit vines (edible and otherwise), plus that pest lantana.

We stopped again to photograph an old slab building and met Mr. and Mrs. MeLeod, who told us some interesting things about the district. I might mention that we have never seen so many "Keep Out" signs anywhore before and the McLeods told us that the place was a mineral field and fossickers were quite a nuisance. Apparently there were 3000 miners after gold along the Clarence River Valley at one time and Tooloom was a township as large as Casino, but not the Casino of today's dimensions, this is all gone now.

On arrival at the bridge, we stopped for lunch and a ramble, viewing the map it seemed no distance across to Rivertree and the waters from there passed under the bridge we later crossed. Nearby we saw some concrete pyramids, which had been used as possible tank obstacles during wartime. Having driven down steep roads to get to the river we now had a few steep hills to climb away from it. The bitumen was way past us, but we came across more and through the Tooloom Scrub, a luxuriant patch of

rainfor est. Here we stopped only briefly, as all seemed to want to get

home, as this the shortest day was drawing to its close.

On to the crossroad and to the western turn through Koreelah to Legu. ume, where we came across the roughest part of the road through Wylie Creek. All seemed to enjoy the day, a very different type of outing, as we drove a considerable distance- much more than our usual outings.

A Salute to those who passed a similar way to our outing - 145 years before us.

Brothers Frederick and Edward Ogilvie left the Hunter River in 1840 - on horse back and journeyed overland to the Clarence River from southern New England Tableland via the rough Guy Fawkes route, known as the Craig Line (of marked trees). They made their way up the Clarence Valley discovering and taking up the country which became "Yulgilbar Station".

The Ogilvies, determined to discover a better route to take their stock back - they, therefore continued up the unexplored Clarence watershed to near Sandy Creek and from there to Boorook and through to the Booroo Booroo Mountains, passing south east of the now Wallangarra

to the Mole River.

Early in 1841, they returned via their Boonoo Boonoo route, taking their sheep with them and completing their droving year on 1st May 1841.
