FEBRUARY OUTING REPORT

On Sunday, February 21st the outing was to Rocky River which, as the crow flies, is about 20 miles south east of Tenterfield but is considerably further by road. The Billarimba Road takes off from near the Tenterfield Reservoir. It is mostly a good dirt road, very scenic and the countryside could not have looked better. Fifty one attended the outing on a day that was just right p not too hot. Enroute we passed through patches of very fine timber with a number of views down into the valley which is partly cleared grazing some up to 20 feet tall with over ten branches or flowering headsl road along the Rocky River branches off to the right while the road itself continues on to Drake. An interesting drive along the river, but it can be a bit rough after rain.

The Rocky River or Timbarra River flows fairly fast over rocks and gravel. It is not a big river but never the less a very pleasant stream. With permission of the local landowner, we picnicked under the River Oaks and went swimming or canoeing or just yarned - a quiet relaxed afternoon.

Geologically the valley of Demon Creek and Rocky River is very interesting, for they lie along the Remon Fault. This fault stretches from just east of Stanthorpe to Kempsey - a distance of about 200 miles and the greatest lateral shift is about 40 miles. On a satelite photograph the fault line shows up very clearly. In its heyday it must have been something like the St. Andreas Fault which runs through San Francisco. Now it is completely stable and imobilised.
