# APRIL OUTING TO TOONUMBAR DAM CAMPSITE.

Eighteen adults and five children met at the Mallanganee lookout for morning tea and to enjoy the panoramic views before passing through the tick gate and turning north on to the Cambridge Plateau Forest Drive. The road followed the ridge top and provided excellent views, both east and west, as it climbed steadilythrough patches of scrub and cleared areas to enter the Cambridge Forest and to level out at the Cambridge Forest picnic area 12km from Mallanganee.

Here the group followed the newly opened 2km circular walking track on its steep descent to the creek where we decided not to continue the walk owing to the slippery condition of the track still wet from recent flood rains. However, Rob McCosker and family pressed ahead to the waterfall, several kilometres further on.

Stenocarpus senuatus(Wheel of Fire), Austromyrtus bidwillii (Python Tree), Araucaria cunninghamii(hoop pine), Cassine australis (Red Olive Plum) were among the impressive variety of trees seen in this small area. Many of the trees were of majestic proportions both in girth and height.

A pleasant lunch was enjoyed at the well maintained picnic area with its superb views towards Casino, Lismore and Mount Warning, before continuing on through areas of rainforest and stands of magnificent trees including hoop pine, spotted gum, brown pine and flooded gum. We descended from the plateau to the camp site at Toonumbar Dam. "Old Spotty", a huge spotted gum at the roadside caused much comment. Estimated to be between 200 and 300 years old, four people could just touch hands around the trunk.

Our picturesque little campsite for the two nights included among its facilities, a covered picnic table large enought to seat the whole group at one time, fireplace, water tank and a cold, cold

shower complete with guardian spider.

Sunday began at a leisurely pace with walks before breakfast, Dore McCosker saw a large White Breasted Sea Eagle air freighting an eel off for breakfast. During the morning we inspected the Rotary Park at the Dam wall and then set out on the Rotary walk to Bells Bay. Memories of the walk include the excellent Rotary lookout, delicate little fern gardens, ground orchids in bloom, large white domed fungi, the almost goosestepping march to avoid the hordes of leeches, the varied birdcalls, the group de-leeching on the Bells Bay jetty, the surprised look on Rob McCosker's face when he entered the water below the dam wall for a swim - it was COLD, the very small eel caught at the wall which seemed quite at home in a drinking glass of water, Roy and Beryl dancing the "Slippery Crossing Polka" to its inevitable horizontal conclusion.

After lunch on Sunday we travelled to Afterlee and then began the long climb up to the Toonumbar Forest drive to the northern end of the Richmond Range. Here the rainforest trees seemed even more lush and larger than those on the plateau. Many times we stopped to admire outstanding examples of staghorns, elk horns, crows nests and huge strangler figs. One fig had completly overwhelmed a very large host tree who's crumbling trunk left

openingsto the sky resembling cathedral windows.

The Murray Scrub lookout, perched on the western edge of the range, provided an almost vertical view of the densily timbered valley floor many hundreds of feet below and away towards Tooloom and other points west. The rushing waters of the Eden Creek Falls could be hear through the scrub, but wet conditions prevented us

from viewing them.

The road continued climbing north to the top of the range then turned east along a high ridge to the Sherwood Lookout. This gives an unobstructed view of Mount Lindsay, Mount Barney and surrounding ranges and foothills. From the lookout the road gradually descended past the Toon Hopp Pine plantation to the Summerland Way and Kyogle, where we arrived at dusk for fuel and refreshments, before setting off for the 29k drive back to the campsite.

We made a mid morning departure on Monday from the campsite and travelled via Kyogle and Wiangaree to Wilson Avenue, the start of the 50km Lions Raod which follows the Kyogle-Brisbane railway line up through the Richmond Gap in the McPherson Range before descending into Queensland to Rathdowney. Flood damage and high creek levels denied us access to some areas. However the top road was clear and the lunch stop was made at the loop lookout with its excellent picnic facilities. This overlooks the unique spiral loop in the railway where a gain of the extra 20 metres was an advantage in reducing the length of the tunnel under the main range. A pictorial display of animal and birdlife and construction difficulties encountered on the building of the road proved most interesting.

Trucks had to be towed by one bulldozer with another chained alongside to prevent them slipping off the road. A short stop was made at the border gate to place donations in the Liens collection box to assist with the upkeep of the road.

The steep grade from the border gate to Running Creek was further accentuated by a high ridge which created a false horizon and the illusion of almost slipping forward in our seats.

The party arrived at Rathdowney mid afternoon and then proceeded home independently after a long weekend of good fellowship and wonderful scenery.
