



JULY OUTING by Organiser Millie Marsden

The club became involved with Recreation Week July 24 to 31, by organisng a visit to Leyburn to follow their Heritage Trail on July 24. This outing also tied in with the Bi-Centennial year with the delving into the history of that segment of the Downs. Seventeen members left Weeroona Park on a perfect winter morning, the first stop was made at Cunningham to inspect two historical cairns in the village. One erected to the memory of Patrick Leslie who established the first sheep station in Queensland there in 1840(unveiled in 1959) and the other in honour of pioneer families erected in 1978.

On arrival in Leyburn the group assembled at the school playshed which was built 105 years ago at the cost of £151, the shingle roof of 10,000 shingles was replaced by the P&C in 1973-74, but the floored playshed is mostly still in original condition. Principal of the Leyburn school Mr. Russell Hopkins, joined the group and took the lead in the Heritage Trail. Enid Armstrong (Rauchle) a pupil of the school in 1922 rang the school bell which

dates back to 1871.

Outing Report (continued)

Other sites visited in the morning included the first permanent school(used from 1865-1934), Henry Kirby's grave(Henry died in 1854 ans was buried on a high spot overlooking the township which he had helped create). The post office was viewed as was the St. Matthew's Catholic Church, built in 1900 and still used for weekly mass. Sites of the Court House, Police Reserve and the cottage connected with the Owens murder, Leyburn's original school and the Police Magristrate's residence.

The cemetry was visited and the old graves caused a lot of interest, especially that of James Murray who built the Royal Hotel in 1863 and died in August of that year of "intemperance". St. Augustine's Anglician Church, constructed and dedicated in 1871(and still used for services) has a shingle roof and is patterned on the typical English village church of thattime. Enid Armstrong told the group that her father was baptised in the church in 1890.

During lunch on the banks of Canal Creek, a number of birds were noted and, in particular, torquoise parrots caused much interest. Was the activity in the water that of a platypus? Wattles were the main wild flowers seen on the outing.

After lunch, the trail continued with a viewing of the old cheese factory site, Kirby's store, butcher shop, Bathams store, QCWA hall(constructed in 1928), the memorial to the men of 200 flight and Z Special Unit - unveiled by Sir Walter Campbell in 1987.

The Royal Hotel was inspected and, while looking at the CoffeeRoom/Boarding House on the opposite side of the street, the owners Mesdames Ann Doran and Elva Simmons invited the group to "step inside and take a look around". This unexpected hospitality was the icing on the cake, the ladies have embarked on a massive renovation programme and the results of their labours created a lot of pleasure. The house was built by James Murray in 1858 and has a marvellous amount of history having been used as a temporary Court House and for church services before the Roman Catholic Church was built. It is today, Leyburns oldest building and houses the works and treasures of a pair of talented ladies.

The last inspection was that of Howitz Brothers sawmill where cypress pine from state forsests near Inglewood is cut. The mill uses steam to power most of the operations, the industrial boiler fuelled by pine offcuts, supplies the steam to the engine of a 1926 Ruston and Hornsby 30HP twin cylinder steam engine.

The group returned to the school where conversations with Russell Hopkins continued, he was thanked for his leadership and for the enthusiasm with which he imparted his local knowledge. The group left Leyburn and proceeded back to Warwick through the old road to Leslie, pausing to inspect the Sandy Creek Hotel. All voted it a great day.
