



OUTING REPORT TO MI. MAROCN. By Rob McCosker Leader.

The July outing of the Stanthorpe Field Naturalists Club was held on July 22 and 23 as a campout to Mt. Maroon.

A total of 25 people turned up to enjoy the campout weekend in fine mild weather. Most people elected to arrive on Friday night to set up camp in the dark and consequently had a relaxing morning on Saturday. we left camp at about 9.30am and drove to the base of the Mt. Maroon for the start of the walk. The small camping area here was being well used - even car parking space was at a premium, so we were grateful to have chosen the more spacious area at waterfall Gully.

After skirting the reedy lagoon, the track passes through open grazing land and then eucalypt forest. The ridge steepens abruptly and continues to a rocky cliff which we avoided by dropping down into the gully a little to the right and then following its course to the saddle between the mountain peaks. This saddle is similar to the Rum Jungle area of Mt. Barney, although it is smaller and has less tropical

vegeatation, it does have a small fresh water stream.

We climbed the peak to the north for a brief look at the view and then decided to continue to the top for lunch, as the day was mild with little breeze. Of course, when we reached the top the wind was much stronger and quite cool. The high cloud, which had moved across from the west, obscured the sun but fortunately not Mt. Barney or the main range. we had a wonderful panorama of mountain peaks. We retracted our steps to the cars after lunch and returned to the campsite about

The stream at the campsite has a small waterfall which tumbles into a sizeable sparkling clear pool. I had foolishly told the children, in the morning, that we wouls be going for a swim after climbing

Mt. Maroon - boy was that water cold!!!!

Next morning we leisurely packed up camp and set off homeward in various directions as desired. One group first drove to Mt. Maroon Dam, then returned to the Burnett Creek Road and followed it through to the white Swamp Road. We had lunch on the roadside and then took the Head Road down to Killarney as the skies opened up and rain followed
