

## Scale of Difficulty for Walks on Nats Outings

- 1. Flat walking, road or track.
- 2. Road or track gentle hills.
- 3. Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections.
- 5. Cross country easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6. Track, steep section common, with steps.
- 7. Cross country some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8. Cross country steep section with scrambles over rocks etc. Some thick undergrowth.
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

#### Outing Report for 25th July 1993

As we waited at Weeroona Park on 25th July for Nats to arrive Kris's hair turned greyer by the minute, as the first half dozen cars were conventional vehicles. However, matters improved with the arrival of more four wheel drives, and 22 vehicles containing 71 people headed for Sundown National Park and Blue Gorge. We stopped at the Farndale gate where we had morning tea and met Peter Hazelgrove, the National Parks Ranger and his family, bringing the total to 75 people.

Peter led the convoy a short distance to where we left the conventional drive vehicles and transferred to 4 W.D. The track wound through fairly open bush for a start where quite a number of trees had hollow limbs - "bird holes" according to Juric.

Lincoln stopped to check on his bees in the neighbouring paddock and when he set off again he ran into trouble with the loose rocks on the steep track. His utility had to be pulled to the side of the track and picked up on the way back.

After some distance there was more undergrowth and we were in wilderness. A couple of grass trees, about ten feet high with grass skirts which hung to the ground were growing close to the track. They had obviously not been burnt. The Subarus were left before a steep creek crossing and some of the occupants struggled along the fence, where the going was very rough. The rest travelled in "comfort" till we picked them up.

Eventually we stopped at a gully where we had lunch, before setting out for our trek to Blue Gorge. The track, where there was one, followed the gully and we saw Red Flowering Mugga (Eucalyptus sideroxylon var. rosea) along the banks. There were Lemon Scented Tea Trees (Leptospermum petersonii), with bright green leaves growing in one section of the gully. They start and end quite abruptly and are not found in other parts of the park. There were smokey looking bushes the gorge, growing in the rock crevices, which were Olearia canescens, and one Blue Flowering Alpine Daisy (Olearia canescens). There was quite a lot of Acacia leiocalyx formerly Ac. glaucescens - which has a very broad leaf, seen on the outing.

A couple of members decided to stop to admire the view when the rocks became too steep and slippery for their liking, but most of the group walked to the top of blue gorge. We had one mishap when a rock moved under Desley's foot and she grazed her arm badly on a tree trunk. The view from the lookout made the trek worthwhile as it was very beautiful, with Rats Castle in view, looking deceptively close. Peter told us it would take a day to walk along the bottom of the gorge from there to where we were. By climbing onto a rocky outcrop nearby Red Rock could be seen "hanging" high in the hills.

We had afternoon tea at the vehicles before heading back. On the way two half-grown feral pigs crossed our path and ran away through the fence. It was obvious that the roots of Yellow Jackets are a favourite food, by the amount of rooting around the trees.

Just as the last vehicles gained the road the rain started and fell quite heavily. We were very fortunate in the timing of our wilderness outing.
