

SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat walking, road or track.
- 2. Road or track gentle hills.
- Track, some hilly sections.
- Track, some steep sections.
- 5 Cross country easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- Track, steep section common, with steps.
- Cross country some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- Cross country steep section with scrambles over rocks etc. Some thick undergrowth.
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

STATE FOREST CAMPING CODE

Camping in State Forest Parks will be more enjoyable for you and other visitors if you observe this simple camping code.

- All plants and animals are protected please don't disturb or damage them.
- Keep your camp clean and tidy and respect your surroundings. At the end of your stay, make sure the site is tidy for those who follow.
- Tables and fireplaces are for all to use please don't monopolise them.
- Leave waterfront areas clear for everyone pitch your tent well back from the creek bank.
- Light your fire only in the fireplaces provided. Use firewood sparingly.
- Be sure your fire is out before leaving.

• Avoid polluting creeks and lakes with soap, detergents or shampoo. Draw water in containers for washing purposes and dispose of used water well away from the stream.

• Be aware of plants and creatures that might make your stay uncomfortable for example, leeches, ticks and nettle.

• Don't leave clothing or footwear out on the ground overnight - biting insects, spiders or centipedes may crawl in. Always knock out your shoes before putting them on.

- Take care when swimming in creeks and waterholes before entering the water check for depth, snags or other obstructions.
- If you go bushwalking, always let someone know where you are going and when you expect to return.
- Camping is limited to two weeks. If you wish to stay for a longer period, please contact the local Forestry Office.

This code applies to most places where Nats. go on outings.

Leader Kris Carnell

For our Environment Day outing about 24 members of the Stanthorpe Field Nats Club met at the Red Bridge area. The main activity of the day was the painting of the Little Red Bridge. This bridge was construced by trainees under the L.E.A.P. scheme as part of the new walking tracks, running east from the new Granite Street bridge.

The members spent a considerable amount of time removing sawdust and shavings from between the planks in preparation for painting. As the most effective way of removing these from around the bolts, was by blowing, spectators were entertained by the sight of Nats huffing at each other across the bridge. Harry went home to procure several brooms to help with the cleaning, and Bob did a mighty job with one of these. A coat of paint was applied before lunch and another in the early afternoon.

While the painting was being done some members gathered a truckload of brush to lay over some of the old paths to be reclaimed, and another group started gathering rubbish. Several bags of glass and bottles were taken to the red shed for recycling and the industrial bin was partly filled with garbage. Some of the more interesting pieces of rubbish were a frypan and the top of a spirit stove which had been stowed between some rocks. It appeared that someone may have camped in the area a long time ago - perhaps the owner of some of the bottles?

Jean found a legless lizard while working in the burnt area, and Noor discovered a small frog under a clump of burnt grass, that blended so well with its habitat, it was almost impossible to see.

A couple of members of the L.E.A.P. planning committee joined us for a barbeque lunch which was held overlooking the weir created by the Granite Street bridge.

The final job of the day was to strain up the fence on the south-eastern side of the creek to keep pedestrian traffic off private land. During the day most Nats took the opportunity to explore the tracks created by the L.E.A.P. scheme, and to do a preliminary survey of the flora of the area. Some members have expressed a desire to take a continuing interest in the area's management if the Stanthorpe Shire Council is agreeable. 

Happenings at "Orana", Severnlea

There have been a few interesting happenings at "Orana" since last winter. For a start we had the best terrestrial orchid flowering I can remember in the spring.

The Waxlip Orchid (Glossida major) made a purple carpet under the teatrees, interspersed with Spider Orchids (Caladenia dilatata), and Brown Hoods (Pterostylus rufa). There were also Spotted Doubletaisl (Diuris aurea), I think, and Pterostylus mutica. One very exciting find was a very dainty purple spotted Doubletail (Diuris) with very long lateral sepals, which we had never seen before, and what we think was a Sun Orchid (Thelymitra). Unfortunately we didn't manage to see this one with the flower open, although we checked on it for weeks at different times of the day. Kris went to have a look at lunch time one day thinking it would be open, as it was closed early in the day and after 3.30 p.m. As it set seed we presume it must have opened at some stage. Having marked the spot we're waiting for next spring and hoping to have better luck. The Hyacinth Orchids (Dipodium punctatum) were quite disappointing, however, perhaps from the effects of extremely dry weather.

When walking near the creek in October I noticed a bright yellow flower on a rather sparse shrub right on the creek bank. I took a specimen home and identified it as a Cassia from a book, "Australian Plants Identified" by Gwen Elliot. Wondering which Cassia it was, I pressed it and sent it to the Herbarium, and received notification that it was Senna odorata (formerly Cassia odorata). There had been a fire in the area about three years previously which I thought may have caused the seeds to germinate. We found quite a number of plants by walking upstream for quite some distance. When the seed was ripe we gathered some and treated half by pouring boiling water over it, and the rest by lighting a small fire over it. The seeds treated with boiling water germinated well and we now have several growing in pots in the shade house. Those treated with fire did not come up at all.

For some time after this, the weather was so hot and dry that we didn't do much bushwalking at all. After the rain in January, we went exploring again and discovered that most of the Blackthorn trees near the creek were covered in small, shiny, brown beetles - rather metallic looking - which were eating the leaves. They have actually stripped the bushes and quite a number of them appear to be dead. I did notice recently that some are starting to shoot from the tips.

We also noticed a blue Scaveola amongst the rocks on a walk up the mountain. It was a very dainty thing and would make an attractive garden plant.

Our other exciting find was a family of Variegated Wrens at the creek in the vicinity of the Sun Orchid. We had never seen them at our place before, so we're hoping they stay in the area and raise another family next year.

One day in May I looked out the kitchen window to see a small speckled bird hopping across the yard in the company of Double Bars and Yellow Rumped Thornbills. After much poring over books and discussion we decided it was a Speckled Warbler. There have been the usual Honeyeaters, Parrots, and Finches about. A pair of yellow-faced Honeyeaters and a pair of Superb Blue Wrens nested in the Camellia outside our bedroom window. Now we're hoping for a wet spring so that there will be a recovery of wildflowers, which have been suffering the effects of drought since a fire 3½ years ago.

COPYRIGHT LAW

Copyright law in Australia is comprehensive and complicated and there can be severe penalties for breaking it. Please take care with the articles that you submit for the magazine. As a general rule, it is against the law to publish anything already published without written permission. You cannot just hand in a poem or other article that you like however much it appeals to you and relates to the club activities.

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If an article is in a magazine and has a copyright note such as "This article may be published without alteration provided its source is acknowledged", it may be used but must not be altered and it must have the copyright acknowledgement with it. Some publications allow use of their articles and have the annotation that must accompany the reprinting inside the cover. Some even say "Please acknowledge and send us a copy", while others have the exact words that must be used so these exact words must be used in our magazine.

I repeat - it is breaking the law to include anything that is not cleared for us to use. It is wrong to give anything to the editor that could cause problems for the club. As our magazine is sent to Libraries, Other Clubs and Organisations it is our responsibility to see that we do not break the law. It is also correct for our club to do the right thing.

Many of you have artistic talent, and some can write very interesting articles. Now that the magazine is done on a photocopier, you can present an illustration or article on A4 paper as you wish it copied and it can be reproduced exactly. If I can do it, so can most of you. [The articles that I write quite often just happen and very rarely end up as they were planned. (If I can help you in any way just ask.)] HAVE A GO! You will add pleasure and interest to the magazine - you might even surprise yourself and find you have hidden talents !
