#### SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat walking, road or track.
- 2. Road or track gentle hills.
- 3. Track, some hilly sections.
- 4. Track, some steep sections.
- 5 Cross country easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6. Track, steep section common, with steps.
- 7. Cross country some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8. Cross country steep section with scrambles over rocks etc. Some thick undergrowth.
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

#### STATE FOREST CAMPING CODE

Camping in State Forest Parks will be more enjoyable for you and other visitors if you observe this simple camping code.

- All plants and animals are protected please don't disturb or damage them.
- Keep your camp clean and tidy and respect your surroundings. At the end of your stay, make sure the site is tidy for those who follow.
- Tables and fireplaces are for all to use please don't monopolise them.

Leave waterfront areas clear for everyone - pitch your tent well back from the creek bank.

- Light your fire only in the fireplaces provided. Use firewood sparingly.
- Be sure your fire is out before leaving.
- Avoid polluting creeks and lakes with soap, detergents or shampoo. Draw water in containers for washing purposes and dispose of used water well away from the stream.
- Be aware of plants and creatures that might make your stay uncomfortable for example, leeches, ticks and nettle.
- Don't leave clothing or footwear out on the ground overnight biting insects, spiders or centipedes may crawl in. Always knock out your shoes before putting them on.
- Take care when swimming in creeks and waterholes before entering the water check for depth, snags or other obstructions.
- If you go bushwalking, always let someone know where you are going and when you expect to return.
- Camping is limited to two weeks. If you wish to stay for a longer period, please contact the local Forestry Office.

This code applies to most places where Nats. go on outings.

# Outing Report, Spinx to Mt. Norman 25th of September

With a large number of regulars away on holidays, only a small crowd of 17 turned up at the Castle Rock Camping area at Girraween for the September 25th outing. Of these, only 9 did the organised walk the rest confining themselves to activities close to Park head-quarters.

The walk set off along established tracks to Turtle Rock, but from then on it was cross-country bush bashing to the ridge that lies in between Sphinx-Turtle Rock and Mt. Norman. From this, there are excellent western views of the Sphinx and to the east vast rocky areas around Mt. Norman which notably feature iron stainings from run off over the years. The ridge was followed northwards to its end from which a very large moderatly flat rock gave about 360° views Scrambling down, the party passed some outstanding rock formations which some-one referred to as Easter Island images. Eventually, the Mt. Norman track was reached and walkers followed this back to the camping area.

I have never seen this country looking so dry, and not a skerrick of water was seen either in rock pools or in the creeks which looked as though they had been dry for a long time. This time of the year is when wild flowers are most profuse and although definitely not at their best under the prevailing conditions, over 30 flowering species were observed. These included:-

7 Acacias - adunca, venulosa, granitica, ruppii, floribunda, pruinosa, ulicifolia

Various peas - Hovea longifolia, Hardenbergia violacea, Mirbelia speciosa, Bossiaea rhombifolia, Pultenea hartmannii, Dillwynia sp.

Boronia and - Boronia amabalis, Phebalium rotundifolium, related plants Zieria smithii, Eriostemon sp.

Orchids - Dendrobium speciosum, Galeola cassythoides

Several Leucopogons including biflorus

Miscellaneous - Prostanthera saxicola (bright purple)
Choretrum candollei (root parasite)
Homøranthus flavescens (compact shrub, yellowish
flowers)
Kunzea obovata (mauve Melaleuca type)

Steparthemum scortechinii (now used as filler in bouquets)

Pomaderris sp. (yellow shrub occurring in thickets)
Grevillea linearifolia (small white flowers)
Pimelea linifolia (white rice flowers)
Patersonia sericea (purple iris)
Stylidium laricifolium (trigger plant)
Micromyrtus sessilis
Cryptandra amara

Wild life was conspicuous by its absence with the only positive bird sightings being two wedge-tailed eagles, a tree creeper, a rainbow bee eater and the ever present opportunistic crimson rosellas and

kurrawongs at the camping area plus a few very elusive lizards.

Outing Reports:-



## BORDER THICK-TAILED GECKO (or Granite Belt Gecko)



This sparsely distributed gecko has a slightly depressed head, body and tail. Four rings of pale spots adorn the tail, which is quite bulbous in outline in the basal two-thirds.

It shelters by day under shaded exfoliations, in rock piles or under large shaded rocks and logs, waiting, with little body movement, for spiders and crawling insects to venture close enough to be overpowered. It rarely ventures forth at night. It is usually undisturbed by close observation but if a short gentle puff of warm air is blown onto it (as may happen with the approach of a mammal predator such as an Antechinus), it leaps forward, "squerking", snaps quickly and then runs off.

HABITAT: high, drier areas of the Great Dividing Range in areas of granite and psammite outcropping with nearby lightly timbered or shrubby soil areas.

HEAD AND BODY LENGTH: to 7.0cm TOTAL LENGTH: to 10.5cm

DISTRIBUTION: 30,00 - 100,000km ABUNDANCE: very sparse to sparse STATUS: probably secure

Dear Gordon,

Many thanks for your note. I am delighted that the local F. N. Club. has taken an interest. Enclosed please find photocopies of an extract from H. Ehmann's book which is almost as good as a photo because they are usually greyish coloured anyway with the various spots and bands somewhere between black and white as shown. It has scattered conical tubercles all over its back and has been recorded from just SSE of Stanthorpe and also from the Amiens area. One point to note is that this species may lose its tail and regrow another which is completely different to the original in shape and colour, it has no black and white bands and is almost egg shaped! It is often found in rocky areas and may probably be seen out and about from about one hour after sunset to about midnight on warm nights (I am only guessing). We know next to nothing about this species so any observations would be useful re habitat, behaviour, temperature etc.

Don't forget my phone number is Ø49 772463 a.h. (reverse charges) if anyone comes across any specimens. You can probably help me by letting me know where the rocky areas are around Amiens and Stanthorpe.
