SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- Flat walking, road or track.
- Road or track gentle hills.
- Track, some hilly sections.
- Track, some steep sections.
- 5 Cross country easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6. Track, steep section common, with steps.
- 7. Cross country some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- Cross country steep section with scrambles over rocks etc.
 Some thick undergrowth.
- Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

STATE FOREST CAMPING CODE

Camping in State Forest Parks will be more enjoyable for you and other visitors if you observe this simple camping code.

- All plants and animals are protected please don't disturb or damage them.
- Keep your camp clean and tidy and respect your surroundings. At the end of your stay, make sure the site is tidy for those
 who follow.
- Tables and fireplaces are for all to use please don't monopolise them.

Leave waterfront areas clear for everyone - pitch your tent well back from the creek bank.

- Light your fire only in the fireplaces provided. Use firewood sparingly.
- Be sure your fire is out before leaving.
- Avoid polluting creeks and lakes with soap, detergents or shampoo. Draw water in containers for washing purposes and dispose of used water well away from the stream.
- Be aware of plants and creatures that might make your stay uncomfortable for example, leeches, ticks and nettle.
- Don't leave clothing or footwear out on the ground overnight biting insects, spiders or centipedes may crawl in. Always knock out your shoes before putting them on.
- Take care when swimming in creeks and waterholes before entering the water check for depth, snags or other obstructions.
- If you go bushwalking, always let someone know where you are going and when you expect to return.
- Camping is limited to two weeks. If you wish to stay for a longer period, please contact the local Forestry Office.

This code applies to most places where Nats, go on outings.

The Queensland natural history award: Jean Harslett was congratulated on winning the award for 1995. Jean thanked the Field Naturalist Club for nominating her for the award which was presented on Monday 20th February at the Qld. Museum. Jean felt her interest in natural history was developed by her family when she was a child. She felt privileged to have met a number of scientist who were very enthuastic. She reported that two members of the judging panel remarked on how well-presented the submission was andthanked Tom Archer who had prepared it.

I am sure the members of the Stanthorpe Field Nats. appreciate the enthusiasm Jean shows for natural science and sincerely congratulate her on receiving the award.

Specimens: Joan Bourne had some good specimens of Lattice Fungus.

Jean Harslett had a frog from a dam in the forestry. There were hundreds of frogs in the dam which was free of pollution. A 6ft area around the e dge had groups of froth full of eggs.

Photos were tabled of Mt Cordeaux outing, Morgan's Gully outing, the slugs at Mt Cordeaux, Quart Pot Creek and Girraween.

Clean-up Australia Day, 5th March

About a dozen people met at Heritage Park and admired the sign before starting to clean up the area. The cubs were also working in the area, but we had decided that a good deal of our cleaning up was to be cleaning out exotic weeds from the park.

Several people set out with markers to show any blackberries and Robin and Kris followed with spray provided by the shire council. We took plastic bags to hold any rubbish and pulled out weeds such as cobblers pegs and ragweed as we came across them. Millie and Ray did a sterling job of sweeping up shards of glass from the rocks around the little red bridge.

As Fred had his boat, he ferried Kris across to the island to spray a large patch of blackberries there. Tom and Richard Clewes and his children planted about fifty Callistemons and Hakeas which are native to the district on the southern bank of the creek, and in the afternoon Tom & Fred planted the island with about twenty-five Callistemons.

After lunch those who remained painted weed killer on the Honeysuckle growing amongst the natives along the creek bank, or in the case of Rod, dug out large quantities of prickly pear. He found the spines go right through leather gloves.

As well as all this activity Alec Harslett spent the morning spreading a load of soil to form the basis of the garden, after a meeting of the Lanccare/Nats group in consultation with Michael McAuliffe, the council gardener.

Although not a great deal of the usual sort of rubbish was collected the outing was a very successful one.



"NATURAL HISTORY AWARD" PRESENTED TO JEAN HARSLETT



Granite Belt naturalist/historian, Jean Harslett, recently was presented with the Natural History Award for 1995 at the annual meeting of the Queensland Naturalist Club Inc held in the theatre of the Queensland Museum Brisbane for her significant contribution to natural history in Queensland.

Jean was nominated for the award by the Stanthorpe Field Naturalist Club Inc of which she was elected inaugural vice-president in 1969. Jean has served the Stanthorpe club in many capacities, is still a vital member and is, undoubtedly one of the most knowledgeable members. She shares her knowledge with sensitivity and humour.

Club member Tom Archer was responsible for researching Jean's long association with natural history which began in childhood and her contributions, both by written word and in photography, are well documented. The subsequent submission was well presented and is a tribute to Jean's achievements and Tom's meticulosity.

On October 22, 1994 Jean received an honour from the Royal Historical Society of Queensland when presented with a Fellowship Certificate at the Killarney Seminar for her contribution of written history and photographic records. Jean, since 1959, has copied more than 10,000 historical photographs and given desired negatives to the Oxley Library.

Such has been Jean Harslett's commitment to her community that she has written and co-written several books of historical content including "They Came to a Plateau" and several school histories.

Jean was awarded the British Empire Medal in 1983, the Stanthorpe Shire Australia Day Award in 1984, Rotary's Paul Harris Fellowship in 1985, Fellow of the Royal Historical Society of Queensland in 1994 and the Queensland Natural History Award for 1995.
