SCALE OF DIFFIÇULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- Flat walking, road or track.
- Road or track gentle hills.
- Track, some hilly sections.
- 4. Track, some steep sections.
- 5 Cross country easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- Track, steep section common, with steps.
- 7. Cross country some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- Cross country steep section with scrambles over rocks etc.
 Some thick undergrowth.
- Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

STATE FOREST CAMPING CODE

Camping in State Forest Parks will be more enjoyable for you and other visitors if you observe this simple camping code.

- All plants and animals are protected please don't disturb or damage them.
- Keep your camp clean and tidy and respect your surroundings. At the end of your stay, make sure the site is tidy for those who follow.
- Tables and fireplaces are for all to use please don't monopolise them.

Leave waterfront areas clear for everyone - pitch your tent well back from the creek bank.

- Light your fire only in the fireplaces provided. Use firewood sparingly.
- Be sure your fire is out before leaving.
- Avoid polluting creeks and lakes with soap, detergents or shampoo. Draw water in containers for washing purposes and dispose of used water well away from the stream.
- Be aware of plants and creatures that might make your stay uncomfortable for example, leeches, ticks and nettle.
- Don't leave clothing or footwear out on the ground overnight biting insects, spiders or centipedes may crawl in. Always knock out your shoes before putting them on.
- Take care when swimming in creeks and waterholes before entering the water check for depth, snags or other obstructions.
- If you go bushwalking, always let someone know where you are going and when you expect to return.
- Camping is limited to two weeks. If you wish to stay for a longer period, please contact the local Forestry Office.

This code applies to most places where Nats. go on outings.

MINNIE WATER CAMPOUT

10/11/12TH JUNE 1995

This outing was attended by 12 people, some arriving Friday evening, some Saturday, while one joined us on Sunday. Several of our regular campout people were unable to came, being overseas, or at the other end of Australia.

Saturday was cloudy without rain so we decided to have a short walk to the beach via a wild flower patch. On arrival at the beach we were surprised by the number of four wheel drive vehicles and empty boat trailers near the harbour - about 30, as well as five tractors. We realised why when we saw a large catch of fish on one of the boats returning from the reef.

Saturday afternoon we took a short drive to the National Park Campsite further up the coast to take pictures. (A number of Nats walked all the way from the National Park back to Minnie Water Caravan Park). Some went to see the stingrays being fed by hand. This happens each day, just on dusk.

Sunday was fine, but again cloudy. We left for Diggers Camp about 10.00am, stopping on the way to photograph Lake Hiawatha. The heath country further on was a mass of wild flowers and we spent much time finding and identifying them. We decided that the Christmas Bells were really Queen's Birthday Bells because it wasn't Christmas. The banksia ericifolia was particularly spectacular and integrifolia was good as well. We arrived at Diggers Camp for an early lunch.

A short walk along the beach, then up (up and nearly away) a set of stairs took us along the cliff top with magnificent views of the natural rugged coastline. To the south we could see Wooli. There were hundreds of small birds working the banksia, mostly silvereyes; and a large patch of greenhoods (pterostylis) was seen. During the walk along the beach a lot of time was spent at the interesting rock pools, but much more could have been spent observing the wildlife in them.

We returned via Wooli where some went fishing and others took in the beautiful sunset over the river.

The clouds disappeared overnight and Monday was clear and beautiful. Some members observed the fishermen pulling in a net full of bream, and we're pleased to see that they returned the undersized fish to the ocean before loading the others. Some of us returned to the heath country to take the photographs we couldn't on Sunday.

The weekend was enjoyed by all. - (except that we didn't have the Mardsen Damper and the McPhee honey!!! - but we had Fred's fish.) Thanks Fred!

A very long bird list 30+ and a much longer flower list was compiled and will be available. It was an excellent natural history weekend as well as an enjoyable one. One highlight was seeing an echidna that had been digging under the annex of one of the caravans, another was seeing a jabiru so far south.

PREOUTING FOR OUTING TO SUNDOWN NATIONAL PARK 23RD JULY 1995

Rod & I visited Sundown National Park on Thursday 8th June, spoke with Peter Hazelgrove and offer the following information regarding the July outing.

Plans for this outing are as follows - leave Weeroona Park 9.00am. It should take approximately 1 hour to get to Sundown National Park. Take the Stanthorpe Texas road, turn on to the Glen Lyon Dam road - 75 km bitumen road to the turnoff to Sundown, followed by 4 km of gravel road.

It is planned to have morning tea (smoko) at the camping ground. We will then carry lunch (and water) to the permanent water hole on the Severn River. This track is fairly easy walking - not a made track, but quite easy walking at a reasonable pace. We grade it about 3 - 4. This walk should take approximately half an hour and we will lunch at the water hole.

After lunch you will be free to: -

1. Explore around the water hole or cross over the river and explore the other bank.

OR-

2. Ramble up Ooline Creek to view that area and/or bird watch. Peter Hazelgrove tells us that there are numerous birds in that area.

THERE IS NO ACTIVITY PLANNED FOR AFTER LUNCH - YOU ARE FREE TO STAY AS LONG AS YOU WISH AND MAKE YOUR WAY HOME WHEN YOU ARE READY. I'm sure that you can spend much time around that water hole - it is quite magnificent.
