
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

It was with absolute disbelief that the news of the tragic death of our friend Ray Marsden was met as it filtered through the district. Many community associations are mourning a much loved and very active member.



DECEMBER 1995

The third of December 1995 saw Field Naturalists and some guests fly to Lord Howe Island for a week's holiday. The flight from Brisbane was made in clear weather. Touchdown was after midday where our accommodation hosts met us to take us to our rooms. On the way shopping was done as the rooms were self catering. Some of us took the opportunity to do some walks that afternoon as there was plenty of daylight left. As the island is not very big most walks are fairly easy but some degree of fitness is necessary.

The next day we all took the around the island boat trip, well worth it as it gave us a good understanding of the island's size, topography and features including the cliffs of Mt Gower and the north coast with the coastal islets. A few of the party that afternoon went on a glass-bottom boat to view the coral reef that makes the large lagoon which provides a safe haven for the boats. Those who were able took the opportunity to snorkle having a closer look at the marine life.

Tuesday saw us going our own way on various walks and fishing excursions but Wednesday we got together for Jim's Heritage Tour where we learnt about the Kentia Palm industry. This palm is exported around the world and is popular in Europe. It survives well in artificial environments such as office buildings.

Other highlights were feeding the fish at Ned's beach where recently a child had to be evacuated to the mainland after being bitten by a shark. Ron's Ramble was an interesting guided walk. He taught us about some of the flora and fauna and showed us some aspects of the island.

There are many places to eat out with local fresh fish being offered for a good meal. Telephones and postal facilities are the same as the mainland with daily air services to Sydney.

Mt Gower is the highest mountain on Lord Howe. At 875 m it is equivalent to the Mt Marlay car park above sea level. Frank James was the only one of the group game enough to tackle the climb led only by a guide. It is fairly strenuous and one needs to be reasonable fit and agile. In some parts ropes are provided for reassurance and because of the steepness. The others opted for a boat trip for a picnic at a quiet beach at another part of the island.

The rest of the time various groups did their own thing till the day came we all had to leave. The flight takes about two hours and good weather was had, passengers enjoying the views over the clouds and sea.

Our thanks go to Gerard Torrisi who came with us and organised our evening meals to the various restaurants and also some of the outings. We all agreed we had a very enjoyable holiday, as Lord Howe is rather a unique experience.

SUGGESTIONS FOR LORD HOWE ISLAND APRIL TRIP

Suggestions for people with limited walking capabilities at Lord Howe Is next month, assuming accommodation at Ocean View Apartments.

- 1. Round the Island boat trip. This is an excellent way of getting a perspective of the island. Pick a calm day for this two hour cruise. Seasick may be of some use to certain people.
- 2. Coral viewing from a glass bottom boat. If using the 'Coral Princes no extra charge for use of snorkelling gear or a wetsuit. Walk from Ocean View.
- 3. Round the island bus trip. A good way to have an informative tour to some sights. Bus will pick up at Ocean View.
 - 4. Boat trip to North Beach, Old Gulch and for a picnic. Walk to jetty.
 - 5. Stephen's Reserve Walk. Walk from Ocean View.
- 6. Walk to Post Office, telephones, Thompson's Store, Visitor's Centre Blue Lagoon Restaurant. Easier by shortcut through the paddock.
 - 7. Walk to Old Settlement Beach.
- 8. Walk up to the stile behind Ocean View on the way to Malabar Hill. through fence behind clothes lines. Also, on the way to the stiles turn left and the distance is the Catalina crash site. Can return by Old Settlement Beach. Giviews can be had from the stiles.
- 9. Walk to Ned's Beach to feed the fish. Make it a round trip by go towards the stiles in No 8, but turn right and head towards the forest. Go throthe stile and forest to join Ned's Beach Road. Walk to shed. Also go left althe beach till the sand stope to see the terns. Return via Ned's Beach Road Post Office shortcut.
- 10. Ron's Ramble. Very good but some slight hills and distance to negotiated. The most difficult walk suggested here. A guided tour.
- 11. Jim's Heritage Walk. Probably more tiring by standing around testraight walking. A guided tour.
- 12. Walk to Little Island. Take the bus to the end of Lagoon Rd part Capella South. This flat track follows an old vehicle track about a kilometre loand is part of the Mt Gower route. Not recommended to go any further than the end of the vehicle track.
- 13. Take bus past Capella South to the start of the track to Smoking Tracking. Walk along that track skirting a farmhouse to enter the forest. Start buttress rooted tree, old ship water collection points and bridge across the creek

NOTES

It is less than a kilometre between Nos 12 & 13 so you may be able combine them.

Obtain bus time table; Bicycles are for hire; The cattle are $v \in \{0\}$ guiet; Some tracks may be a bit boggy.

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OUTING REPORT

POVERTY POINT MINE

Sunday the 25th of February, and the day greets us with very heavy overcast conditions with occasional drizzle. A call from a Nats member from Tenterfield wanting to know if the trip was still going ahead indicated that weather conditions at our eventual destination were decidedly worse.

With everyone gathered at Weeroona Park, we headed off for Tenterfield and morning tea. 15 cars carrying a total of 39 people left Tenterfield for Poverty Point. Leaving the bitumen revealed recent road works, which combined with now persistent drizzle, made the road rather greasy in places making me wonder if the pre-outing report should have read 4wd vehicles only. A planned stop to look down onto Demon Creek was cancelled due to the misty conditions.

After all vehicles successfully negotiated the not ideal road conditions we arrived at Poverty Point Mine. Leaving the cars we took a short walk to the mine itself. Starting at the bottom of the mine workings it wasn't long before people divided into groups finding there own way around the mine and giving the place a really good look over. People with torches ventured into the horizontal shaft and discovered that it eventually followed through to another opening which came out in a rather deep open dug out with only one side offering a way out. Moving further along, rather large rock fragments left from blasting revealed quite alot of molybdenum embedded within the rock which had quite a shine to it when the sun made a rare showing through the clouds. Walking past capped test drillings led us to quite a long and deep open cutting that must of followed a worthwhile seam in the granite. Comments were made on the amount of work involved in such as cutting. A let down point was found to get us into the shaft and once down inside a totally different world was revealed with different plant life taking advantage of the protected conditions with increased moisture. The heavy cloud combined with the darker conditions inside the shaft made photography a tricky prospect with many people testing out how steady handed they were with some photos being taken on very slow shutter speeds. Trees and rock edges certainly help steady some people up. Walking back to the cars, many people admired a palm tree that was growing quite well up out of a hole cut into rock which had over the years filled with dirt making an ideal pot for it.

Back at the cars and having lunch, maps were soon appearing as people worked out exactly where they were. Lunch was quite a peaceful and relaxing affair when all of a sudden a cry rang out. "It's a Leech" screamed Carol Stica, a prospective new member. To say she had a phobia with leeches is an understatement. For the next ten minutes Carol couldn't sit down constantly scratching herself making sure there were no more and then just when things were starting to settle down she spotted another leech on someone else's sleeve which started the whole process over again.

Travelling back home we stopped at a couple of points of interest including the site of the Poverty Point township and to see a eucalyptus tree that is normally only found near the coast but for some reason is thriving in this one particular spot. Once back on the bitumen and familiar territory people made their own way home after another enjoyable well attended outing despite the adverse weather conditions.

Specimens: 1.Desley Mcdonagh had photos of Basket Swamp and Poverty Point outings.


