10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

Ejected Pellets from Kookaburras, containing skin etc. It is all pushed into the stonach to deal with, and instead of going down the gut it is compressed in a tight pellet called a bolus and sent back the way it came. Report on the July Outing to Wilson's Peak

Field Nats outings seem to traditionally attract less than perfect weather, but Mother Nature excelled herself for the outing to Wilson's Peak. As Narelle and I sat in the car at a quarter past eight sheltering from the drizzle, cloud and ice cold wind, we were secretly hoping that everyone would have sense enough to stay in bed and relieve us from what we expected would be an expedition of Shackleton proportions.

But turn up they did, but in considerably smaller numbers than usual. Seven car loads of hardy souls were willing to brave the Antarctic conditions. As it turned out, the pessimists amongst us were not to be rewarded with our pessimism being justified. With our arrival at Teviot Gap, the views to the east revealed a sunny Fassifern Valley. As the morning passed, the cloud dissipated to provide us with a perfect day despite having to endure an icy south west wind.

Twelve walkers decided to attempt the climb while the remaining members filled in their day enjoying the less exhausting sights of the Condamine Valley. All those who aimed for the summit achieved their goal. The initial climb, firstly through a private farm and then into the national park, brought us to a long ridge that leads to the foot of Wilson's Peak. The ridge provides a wonderful panorama that takes in an expanse of mountains and valleys stretching from Mt Roberts in the north, past the Moogerah Peaks and the Mt Ballow-Focal Peak complex, to Mt Lindesay, and finishing at White Swamp. It was along here that we had our path temporarily blocked by a handsome carpet python that had apparently decided winter was over. With one look at our slightly chilled band of mountain climbers, he realised his mistake and retreated to the confines of his winter home in the hollow base of a tree trunk.

The steep climb and the frequent photo stops meant our group had now stretched out to a very long line of isolated figures. The final ascent slowed most of us up again as the track became steeper to the point where some of us started to wonder if we might go past the vertical. With the summit finally achieved we settled to enjoy our lunch at the only reasonable viewpoint near the summit. Fortunately, this was out of the wind on the eastern side. The lunchtime entertainment was provided by a wedge-tailed eagle and a peregrine falcon that had struck up a less than amiable partnership as they disputed ownership of the surrounding airspace.

With hypothermia again tightening its grip, we began our return journey. More than one of us made a less than graceful descent as we tested both the efficiency of our posterior padding and the gripping threshold of our shoe tread. Despite some cuts and bruises, all made it back to the starting point immensely satisfied with our achievement. It really was a pity that such unpleasant weather in the morning denied many people a very rewarding day out.

RED ROCK OUTING 25TH AUGUST 1996

Cars will leave Weeroona Park at 9.00 a.m. to go to the Ballandean end of Sundown National Park. We will pick up other cars at the Sundown Road / New England Highway junction at Ballandean at 9.15 a.m. We can travel part of the way through Ballandean Station in conventional vehicles. The road then deteriorates and we will transfer to 4 W.D s.

Smoko will be at the site of the old Sundown homestead, now completely gone. We will then travel along the "top" road into Red Rock Gorge. The trip takes about an hour depending on the number of stops.

Lunch will be at the vehicles. Activities available when we arrive include viewing the gorge from the lookout (well made track), walking down to the top of the falls, walking along the cliff top, and walking up Red Rock Creek (all three rough under foot).

Visitors who have 4 WDs are welcome to join us.

On the pre-outing trip on 4th August there were a few wildflowers in bloom - Iron Bark, Olearia, Hibbertia, Pimelea and Acacia. A Pomaderis was in bud and should be in bloom for the outing.

Wildlife of note included Pardalotes and a huge Wallaroo in a clearing by the road.

GROUND CUCKOO SHRIKE

On 5th August when I was leaving the Severnlea school at about 4.30 p.m. I saw a small flock of Ground Cuckoo Shrikes feeding on the oval with a flock of Grey Crowned Babblers. The babblers took no notice of me, as they are often around the school, but the Cuckoo Shrikes flew into nearby trees.

I had never seen these birds before and had to return to the library to identify them. According to the "Readers Digest Complete Book of Australian Birds, the Ground Cuckoo Shrike is a nomadic bird of the interior, widely dispersed in small numbers, occasionally wandering to coastal regions. It is the only member of its family to walk and feed on the ground, eating grasshoppers, beetles and other insects.
