- 4 Track, some steep sections.
- 5 Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6 Track, steep sections common, with steps.
- 7 Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8 Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth.
- 9 Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10 Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

## **WEST BALD ROCK**

Walking times on the pre-outing were 20 minutes to the stone house and a 2 hour walk from there to the summit of West Bald Rock. These times will be longer with a larger group of people.

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#### Outing Report 18-19 October 1997 Goomburra Campout

Those people who were able to get there on Friday, had the best of the weather. Saturday morning's sunlight became hidden by clouds, and the mossies arrived for afternoon snacks. Nevertheless, five people made it part way up the aptly named Cascades Creek, to a couple of small rock pools that would be very tempting on a hotter day: others dropping out along the way, as they desired. Saturday night saw 20 campers gathered around the fire after tea, confusing the marshmallow chefs with lots of advice? Millie's well-practiced production of another damper from a hotter than ideal fire, was in time to counter the arrival of a cool change , and coincided with the visit of a pair of possums. (Coincidence, or long memories?)

Sunday's dawn chorus replaced the roar of wind in the trees, but with cool, cloudy conditions, and the promise of showers from the east, only three set out for the Cascades-Ridge walk. A few misty showers did eventuate, but not until we were in the shelter of the rainforest canopy, where they enhanced the beauty and mystery of the forest giants and varied lower stories. From the more open schlerophyll ridge, the neighbouring ridges were blanketed in cloud, and the steep descent to camp was completed just as the rain started.

One immature male Satin bower bird was in the process of changing from green to dark blue - a really strange sight - with bits of green and dark blue in a mottled pattern.

Other observations included horses, a hare, possums, cattle and on a beautifully clear Friday night - satellites.

Plants noted include buttercups, wonga vine, violets, brachycome, maiden hair, glycine, hardenbergia and king orchids.

N.B. If the listing is singular we saw only one, and the \* indicates a first sighting for me.

#### **Bird Watching with Mollie Stratton**

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Mollie has a wide variety of beautiful trees on her property and they provide a haven for birds.

Over many years successive generations of a family of Butcher birds and a family of Striated honeyeaters have formed a close bond, and are never far apart.

This year they have nested in the same pepperina tree - the exquisite nest of the honeyeater hanging from a lower branch and above, in a fork of the tree, the somewhat untidy nest of the Butcher bird.

Anyone passing by will be warned by the butcher bird flying overhead complaining loudly, followed closely by the honeyeater. They have then been seen to perch together on the top of the flagpole - a small precarious perch but an excellent observation post !

There <u>are</u> Water-rats in Australia

What's more some of them are living in Quart Pot Creek !


Audrey Ridge recently wrote to the Queensland Museum asking for help identifying the rat-like animal she had seen swimming in the creek, and according to Dr Steve Van Dyck, the Curator of Vertebrates, she had given him "a perfect description of a Water-rat, *Hydromys chrysogaster*". Audrey has seen the Water-rats on several occasions, and in several different locations on the creek this winter. Below is some of the information received from the Museum.

This species is restricted to Australia, New Guinea and adjacent islands and is unrelated to the Water Vole of Europe. Among its adaptations for aquatic life are broad, partially webbed hindfeet and waterproof fur. The Water-rat usually lives in the vicinity of permanent bodies of fresh or brackish water and on some marine beaches. Nests are made at the end of tunnels in banks or occasionally in logs. It can climb hollow trees in search of prey, but is slightly clumsy on land and takes most of its food from the water, searching among vegetation along the shoreline and around submerged roots and sunken logs. It eats little plant material, being essentially an opportunistic predator on large aquatic insects, fishes, crustaceans and mussels. Frogs, lizards.small mammals, fresh carrion and water birds may also be taken, and is often carried to a regularly used feeding site.

The Water-rat is not entirely nocturnal, which is unusual among Australian rodents, with most activity taking place around sunset and sometimes foraging in full daylight. They appear to be territorial, with home ranges in South-east Queensland of 2-10 hectares, and where populations are dense there is considerable fighting, particularly among males, many of which have damaged tails.

Head and body length - about 300mm, Tail - about 275mm, Weight - 600-755g Colour - almost black to slate grey above, white to orange below. Tail thick, well covered by dark hair, usually with a white tip. Head and body somewhat compressed, body tapering gradually to tail. Small ears, eyes and nostrils set high on head. Hind feet broad and partially webbed. Apart from the Platypus, the Water-rat is the only amphibious Australian mammal.
