We will meet at Weeroona Park at 9.30 a.m. SHARP - and any who wish may wait at Dalegon and we will join them there.

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LAUE BROADWATER, DALBY CAMPOUT

Perfect weather, a lovely setting and congenial hosts made our campout at Lake Broad water Dalby one to be remembered. Jack & May Bennie spared no effort to make our visit a happy one and had the camp well set up when we arrived with tables; a fire for cooking B.B.Q. style; Hot water laid on and plenty of firewood to keep the fires burning. The 'Hot Water System' was a gem.

Nine cars and thirty-one people were in camp - two of these were our friends from Brisbane. Some folk planned to sleep in the 'Hall' but tents, a caravan and campervan were also used. Mealtime was always a friendly affair - no one standing on ceremony. After an early lunch we boarded a bus supplied by our thoughtful hosts and went to 'Duntroon' where a pleasant walk was taken through typical Cypress Country. One Smoothbarked Appletree (Angophora costata) had a most unusual swelling on the trunk which gave the camera enthusiasts an interest as did the pinkish-red colour of the Much interest was taken too in the difference between Angophora which has its leave opposite while the Eucalypts leaves are single and opposite. Woody Pears were also

of interest but noone volunteered to eat them.

A visit to 'Lakeview', the home of Jack & May was next and in their garden can be found over 400 species of 'natives' including Acacias and Banksias all of which were a delight to see. Jack fed the birds while we were there and some of these were so tame they took food from his hand.

A B.B.Q. at the campsite was enjoyed that evening after which we were joined by members of the Dalby Camera Club, Chinchilla Nats and Dalby Wild Life Club for an entertaining 'Slide Show' by Jack & May which included a visit to the Blackdown Tablelands; Unusual Post Boxes and a very well produced and well received showing of 'Reflections'. The evening concluded with supper which included some delicious 'damper' baked fresh that evening in a camp oven. by Millie.

Sunday morning saw some campers out with their cameras taking advantage of the beauty this broad expanse of water offered with its graceful trees along the shoreline. Before breakfast could be cooked a Blue tongued Lizard, who had found a good spot to keep warm near the cooking fire, had to be forcefully removed and didn't like it one bit.

After Breakfast we were joined by some interested local folk and travelled to the other side of the Lake by bus and we walked down to the Lake through the bush and along the shore of the Lake. On our way we passed through typical Brigalow (Melon hole) Country where the Brigalow, Wilga and Belah form the typical scrub. Around the Lake a strip of Murry Grey Gums grow — some of these actually were growing in the water. Geologically this lake is a bit of a mystery for there seems no apparent reason for its formation and it would not appear to be caused by a meteorite. Bird Watching on the other side of the Lake completed a very enjoyable morning. Our 'Ballandean Birdo' will report more on that.

After Lunch we broke up camp and headed homeward - our grateful thanks to May and Jack Bennie for a very memorable weekend.

BIRDING AT LAKE BROADWATER by a Ballandean 'Birdo'.

The invitation from Jack & May Bennie to camp overnight at Lake Broadwater near Dalby was accepted with happy anticipation by a large and representative group of our club members and even the most optimistic hopes for an enjoyable and informative weekend were more than fulfilled. The only disappointment of any kind was suffered by those members unable to make the trip.

The Campsite right at the water's edge was quite delightful and the tranquil beauty of the broad expanse of water in the golden glow of late afternoon was only disturbed by the waterfowl, who swimming, diving or poised watchfully were seeking their evening meal. Overhead a veritable chorus of bird-song also heralded the coming of night. The scaly -breasted Lorikeets screeched happily as they wheeled through the trees, a Pied Butcher-bird fluted his musical song in the distance, magpies carolled and the twittering and chirping of smaller birds was eventually drowned in a late evening Kookaburra chorus.

The bird list supplied by our hosts were most helpful and the company of several other bird watchers who shared with us their local knowledge as well as their interest and enthusiasm made our birding most enjoyable.
