- Flat, well-formed track, no steps, 5km or less.
 Clearly signposted. Suitable for wheelchairs with assistance.
- Formed track. May have gentle hills and some steps. Clearly signposted. No experience required
- Formed track, some obstacles, 20km or less.
 May have short steep hills and many steps.
 Some experience recommended.
- 4. Rough Track. May be long and very steep with few directional signs. For experienced bushwalkers.
- 5. Unformed track. Likely to be very rough, very steep and unmarked. For very experienced bushwalkers with specialised skills.

Pre-outing Report – Inglewood Heritage Centre & Australian Tobacco Museum Sunday 22nd June 2025

Meet at Weeroona Park at <u>8.30am</u> to carpool, it takes approximately 1.5 hours to drive to Inglewood. The Museum is at 3 Victoria St, diagonally opposite the Lions Park at the corner of Albert St (Cunningham Highway) and Victoria St.

The Museum has the history of the Tobacco Industry, Squatter's Legacy, Cobb & Co Depot, 100 Year History of the Show Society, Buggy Room, Coolmunda Dam Exhibit, and Hospital Equipment. Beth Brown will be there to serve morning tea and show us around the museum.

Program - Uluru and Surrounding Area

In May our daughter Jenny took Kris and me to Uluru for the first time. We fitted a lot into the four night stay, looking at sunrises and sunsets at Uluru and Kata Tjuta, travelling to King Creek Station and Kings Canyon and doing four walks – one at Uluru, one at Kata Tjuta, one at Kings Canyon and one at Kathleen Springs. Because there had been rain we were lucky enough to fly over the channel country and see the water between the dunes. Where we walked it was green with some wildflowers. We saw a dingo and I was fortunate to see two wild camels on the drive back from Kings Canyon. The weather was good but it was COLD in the morning taking photos. - *Margaret*

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Outing Report to Bald Rock National Park - 25th May 2025



Seven people attended the outing. We arrived at Bald Rock NP in time for morning tea. There were numerous vehicles in the carpark.

Conditions were fine as we walked along the lower slopes of the Bungoona Walking track. A family of 7 Yellow tailed black cockatoos were feeding in a tall gum tree along the track. Soon, the path veered west as we skirted the granite boulders and passed under three rock formations, referred to as Granite Titans. Clumps of King Orchids were seen on top of various boulders although none were flowering. One wattle

species was


already in blossom. Other wattle species were already forming flower buds.

After about 2 hours, we reached the top and were rewarded with great views towards Mt Norman to the west, the MacIntyre Wind Farm turbines to the north and Mt Wilson to the east. Lunch was enjoyed sitting on the rocks at the peak, after which we started walking back along the same path back to the carpark for afternoon tea.




