- Flat, well-formed track, no steps, 5km or less.
 Clearly signposted. Suitable for wheelchairs with assistance.
- Formed track. May have gentle hills and some steps. Clearly signposted. No experience required
- Formed track, some obstacles, 20km or less.
 May have short steep hills and many steps.
 Some experience recommended.
- 4. Rough Track. May be long and very steep with few directional signs. For experienced bushwalkers.
- 5. Unformed track. Likely to be very rough, very steep and unmarked. For very experienced bushwalkers with specialised skills.

Pre-Outing Report - Uncle Tom's Cabin Plant Lane July 20th 2025

Meet at Weeroona Park for 9.00am start. Carpooling is necessary due to the limited parking space at the Cabin. We plan to look around the cabin and have morning tea there before walking along some of the tracks on the property and return to the cabin for lunch. We will walk another track in the afternoon, hoping to see some rare and endangered Boronias, and some early spring wildflowers around a granite slab, returning to the cabin by about 3.00pm. The tracks are vehicle tracks so walking is relatively easy grade 2.

The property is called Kurrajong Place and was owned by the Plant family since the early 1920s. It is about 229 acres and is bordered by the Broadwater State Forest and Canon Creek. The cabin was built originally for weekend stays when vegetable farming was undertaken on the property and is now something of a museum with various other buildings added for the convenience of weekend visitors. The property was made over to a Nature Refuge by agreement with the State Government some 15 years ago but remains privately owned. Current owners Terry and Michelle live in Brisbane and they hope to be with us for the outing.

Outing Report – Inglewood Heritage Centre & Australian Tobacco Museum – 22nd June 2025

Leaving Weeroona Park at 8.30am, it was a pleasant drive to Inglewood turning left at Greenup and driving along Tobacco Rd through areas of acacias about to bloom. The rich farming areas including Inglewood Farms, a leading producer of organic free-range chickens, there were several central pivot irrigation systems drawing water from the McIntyre Brook. This was the tobacco growing areas in the 1930s.

Arriving in Inglewood we were met at the Museum by volunteers Beth and Jeff Brown. There was a large display of the tobacco industry which started in the 1880s and lasted to the 1980s. There were displays of the Bodumba Run, Coolmunda Run, Glenelg Run, Terrica Run and Warroo Run for the pastoral industry. A display of the construction of Coolmunda Dam completed in 1968 and a display of the old hospital equipment used. There was a wool press, buzz saw and other farm equipment.

The Buggy room had restored buggies and a sulky owned by George Brown, who is Jeff's Dad and Kerrie's Uncle.

The museum has QR codes at the varies displays which gives a detailed description of the display, given by a knowledgeable

volunteer.

Outside there was

a replica tobacco barn, share farmer's two room cottage and various old tractors and machinery.

Beth had prepared a wonderful morning tea for us which we all enjoyed.

Beth and Jeff were thanked for giving up their time to open the museum and showing us around. We went to Coolmunda Dam picnic area for lunch where there was plenty of bird life.


