SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat walking, road or track
- Road or track, gentle hills
 Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

Pre-Outing Report - 19th March – Quart Pot tree planting working bee


Since the Stanthorpe River Improvement Trust has made a request for us to look at revegetating areas along the creek which have been affected by the recent excavator works, we have decided to hold a tree planting day instead of the programmed outing. The concern is that the bare soil needs to be stabilised as soon as possible in case of flood damage and also, as there are some plants available from Mole Station Nursery, the sooner they are planted the better their chance of getting established before winter.

Now the tricky bit is that some of the plantings have to be on islands so it will be an interesting exercise to ferry plants and people across on canoes, boats and rafts- something which is not covered by our Scale of Difficulty for Nats Walks! I envisage only 3 or 4 people need to cross to the islands while others load plants etc. on a raft which can be pulled across with a rope. There are two areas to be planted-the island and bank at Heritage Park and the island near the YMCA.

We will meet at 9.00am at the park across from the YMCA and after planting this area move to Heritage Park for morning tea before planting that area. We will hopefully be done by lunch time, then go for a walk to the Little Red Bridge.

The plants, water crystals and fertilizer will be supplied by the River Trust and we will need to bring buckets and shovels and of course wear suitable protective gloves and boots.

Outing Report – Washpool National Park – February 19th 2017

11 of us met at the park as usual. Most of us had rain gear as we were expecting wet weather.

We were however very fortunate to only have a few drops on us and we had a nice cool day for exploring and walking. After driving through Tenterfield we took the Scrub Road and drove into the forest. We drove to the start of the track to Billirimba Falls and reduced the vehicles to three for the

trip in. We had to squeeze past a fallen tree but despite some recent rain, the road was in good order. This was a 10 k return trip. We had morning tea at the falls and explored the rock pools and enjoyed



the view. There are some short cascades near the falls and these were very pretty with a good flow of water. On the way out we saw a dingo. He or she crossed the road and then stood on a log to have a good look at us. I think one of our party managed a photo. On the way back to the road we stopped at a small creek. The banks of this creek and the swamp land near it are very interesting and have a diverse range of flora. Only a few were in flower. I have been to this site in the spring and it's wonderful to see.

On our return

to the Spiribo Forest Road we drove to Farnell Road. We went through several blocks of rainforest as well as great stands of tall white eucalyptus . We had lunch at the cars and then walked into an old mill site. Rob had researched an outing report from 1995 which provided us with some history of the site. This included information about a large house that was built on the site (no sign of it now) and the importance of the mill in providing timber during WW11. We had a look at all the old machinery on the site. We then crossed the creek that runs past the mill and enjoyed a walk along one of the tracks. We don't



know where it went to as we turned back at 3pm so as to commence our return journey. We all went home the way we came in, rather than drive through to Bolivia. Other than most of us getting a leech or two, we all enjoyed the cool and dampish conditions.
