SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat walking, road or track
- Road or track, gentle hills
 Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

Pre-Outing Report – Condamine Gorge – 25th March

Leader: Kris Carnell

We will meet as usual at Weeroona Park at 9.00am and travel via Amosfield Road to the Mt Lindesay Highway. Fourteen kilometres past Liston we turn into Cullendore Road. Morning tea will be where the road crosses the Maryland River. After morning tea we will continue via Killarney to Queen Mary Falls. This will be the last stop with proper toilets. Travelling further along Spring Creek Road at Nats pace, we will stop for a photo opportunity at Carrs Lookout before we reach the junction with the Condamine Gorge Road at The Head.



We then turn back towards Killarney along the Condamine Gorge Road and take a lunch break when we find a convenient spot. After lunch we continue on to Killarney. The road we take home from



there and whether we stop for afternoon tea together can be decided on the day. There are a number of ways home, via Legume and Liston, back through Cullendore Road, the Old Warwick Stanthorpe Road or down the highway.

High clearance vehicles will be needed on the day so car pool at Weeroona Park. The Gorge Road is subject to flooding so we will have to be aware that we may have to have an alternative outing so keep an eye on your emails.



Outing Report: Warwick - Sunday 25 February-Warwick Area

The sedate pace of the Warwick outing was no doubt a blessing to the seventeen who attended on a day of oppressive heat and humidity.

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With a gathering of members from as far afield as Toowoomba, the first walk was a leisurely stroll up the dry bed of Sandy Creek, the primary catchment channel for Leslie Dam. The lack of flow had left the granite bed well exposed. Consequently, there were ample opportunities to observe some of the unusual rock formations including dykes, xenoliths and a remarkable example of erosion that has

created a rock

resembling an almost perfect hourglass. At the farthest point of the walk, most scaled a granite rock stack from which there were excellent views of the water course and the surrounding landscape.

After returning to the vehicles, a short drive downstream provided views of the high water mark of Lake Leslie. With the capacity of the dam at just 12%, the lake bed of the upper regions was fully



exposed. The current water level was just visible on the distant horizon. From there, it was a twenty minute drive to Leslie Dam picnic ground for lunch and some welcome shade.



After the break, we proceeded to the Rosenthal Scrub, an area of remnant vine scrub on the south west edge of Warwick. Here, we were met by Darryl Fletcher, the current branch president of Native Plants Australia. Darryl provided an informative tour of the reserve, highlighting many of the endemic plants that were typical of the once extensive forest

that covered the region. Many of the plants have been labelled, testament to the extensive work that

has been done by a relatively small club membership.



Several Nats understandably dropped off the end of the scrub tour and sought shade back at the cars as the heat and humidity

worsened. A suggestion of afternoon tea was vehemently overruled. It appeared most just wanted to get into their cars' air conditioning and head for home!

Despite the weather, the day seems to have be enjoyed by all. It provided an opportunity to experience some of the lesser known features of the Warwick area.

Sandy Creek: Australasian figbird, brown falcon, noisy miner, white-throated treecreeper, willie wagtail, Eastern rosella, azure kingfisher, superb fairy-wren, dollarbird, rainbow bee-eater, crested pigeon, speckled warbler, yellow-faced honeyeater, grey-crowned babbler.

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Leslie Dam: great cormorant, little black cormorant, welcome swallow, sulphur-crested cockatoo, Pacific black duck, Australian wood duck.

Rosenthal Scrub Environmental Park: wedge-tailed eagle, double-barred finch, pied currawong, pied butcherbird.

After lunch the group were shown around the Rosenthal Scrub Reserve by Darryl Fletcher of the Warwick SGAP.

Pre-outings: Condamine Gorge – We will depart Weeroona Park at 9.00am to drive to Queen Mary Falls via Cullendore then to The Head and down the Condamine Gorge.

General Business: Kris Carnell advised that due to the National Parks' \$12/person/night camping charge they will not be camping at Bald Rock for the April 22nd Outing but will hold a day trip instead.

Jeff Campbell advised members to book and pay in advance for the Camping trip on 5th-6th May to Black Rock in Bunjalung National Park and to seek campsites in the southern end of the camping area. Ian Milinivic advised that there was an option for the Nats to do a wildflower walk with the Rare Wildflower Consortium in September.

Specimens: Errol Walker showed a photo of Nats members taken on a bus trip to "Wallaroo" near the Carnarvon Gorge in 1978 and he offered some bird pictures and books to members.

Gunter Maywald showed a collection of 32 different species of paropsine beetles he had collected that morning along the Mt Lindsay Road – a very successful effort.
