- Track, steep sections common, with steps

- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks,
- etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

# Pre-Outing Report - November 25<sup>th</sup> to Spirabo Forest Way

We plan to do a driving trip to Tenterfield, down Scrub Road and Spirabo Forest Way to Billirimba Lookout in Washpool National Park then on through Capoompeta National Park and some scenic farmland before reaching Deepwater. We will then cross the New England Highway and head north skirting Torrington as we climb up and down the Red Hill Road before winding along Pye's Creek Road with its ten creek crossings. Then more ups and downs before reaching the Mole River and continuing, with even more ups and downs through Kingston Gap along Woodside Road to the Bruxner

Highway, then across to Sunnyside on the New England Highway and return home.

The wetter drive along the Spirabo Forest Way is through spectacular "scrub" with tree ferns, massive eucalypts and white everlasting daisies lining the road while the return trip on the drier western side of the New England Highway is open grazing land and the contrast of basalt on Red Hill with the fine granite sands further along.

The total distance is about 275km with probably only 85km of sealed road. The NP signs say 4WD only, although that would only be in wet weather, however there are plenty of potholes and exposed rocks to avoid as well as wildlife such as Lyrebirds, Echidnas and Kangaroos – all seen on the pre-outing trip.

We will set off from Weeroona Park at 9.00am, bring smokos and lunch and we should be back by 5.00pm.

## Outing Report Outing 21st October 2018 – Girraween **National Park**

Nine members braved the inclement forecast (which turned out to be wrong) and enjoyed a very pleasant day at Girraween, mostly with bright sunshine.

We had smoko at the picnic ground and then took a short walk across the rock pavements on the other side of Bald Rock Creek. The group then proceeded to Dr Robert's Waterhole parking area and walked to the waterhole and then to Underground Creek where we had lunch. After

inspecting the rock pavements above Underground Creek we returned via a detour up onto the rocks north of the walking track.

Despite the dreadfully dry winter and rain only in the last couple of weeks, there was a good wildflower display. The wattles were mostly finished (though Acacia betchei is budding up for December) but the grevillea in the swampy areas (Grevillea viridiflava) was in flower as were Leucopogon melaleucoides and Patersonia sp. The purple kunzea (Kunzea obovata) was beginning in the rock gardens on the pavements and there were several species of ground orchids in the open forest including an uncommon white form of the pink fingers.





Most of us heard and a couple of fortunates saw a Superb Lyrebird. A Rufous Fantail paused in front

of the group for a few minutes. A careful search of exfoliating granite slabs revealed several Southern Spotted Geckoes.

A most enjoyable day, despite the initial weather forecast.
