COUNCIL NEWS

The Annual General Meeting (AGM)

The Annual General Meeting of the Club will be held during the February 2021 meeting. At the AGM all members of the Council shall retire from office but shall be eligible upon nomination for re-election except that the maximum period of consecutive office of President shall be two (2) years. (Constitution - 12.2).

Nominations, which shall be in writing and signed by the Member and their proposer and seconder, shall be lodged with the Secretary (secretary@qnc.org.au) at least fourteen days before the AGM at which the election is to take place (12.3b). At the commencement of the AGM, should there be an insufficient number of candidates nominated, nominations may be taken from the floor of the meeting (12.3d).

The Council of the Club shall consist of the following officers, all of whom shall be members of the Club (12.1); President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Excursion Secretary, Editor (Journal), Newsletter Editor, Librarian, Lanternist, Councillor (up to 4 Councillors), Immediate Past President.

Proposal to amend the QNC Constitution by vote of members at the November General Meeting

David Shaw, who has indicated he will retire from Council at the February 2021 AGM after more than 2 decades service, has held the Lanternist (audio-visual coordinator) position for most, if not all, of these years. As computer technology developed, David took on the Webmaster role and also maintained the Lanternist role at General meetings.

Council has been thinking ahead to the February 2021 AGM, with the view to attracting interest from members to join Council and undertake specific roles. Attracting people to Council is more likely to be successful if the Lanternist and Webmaster roles are separated into two positions. Rather than increase the overall number of positions on Council, changing the regularly un-filled second Vice President position to a Webmaster position seems a sensible option.

Amending the Constitution requires a vote by members at a General Meeting. If members vote to make this amendment, notice of the amendment to the Constitution is forwarded to the Office of Fair Trading. Given the abovementioned background and information, members at the November 2020 General Meeting will be asked to vote to amend the Constitution to remove the second Vice President position and to add the Webmaster position. The term "Lanternist" is no longer in common use, having been replaced by Audio-visual coordinator, and members will also be asked to vote to change the name 'Lanternist' to Audiovisual coordinator.

The Motion to be put to members at the November 2020 General Meeting will be "To amend the QNC Constitution point 12.0 Membership of Council:

- FROM "The Council of the Club shall consist of the following officers all of whom shall be Members of the Club: President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Excursion Secretary, Editor, Newsletter Editor, Librarian, Lanternist, Immediate Past President and up to an additional four (4) Councillors",
- TO "The Council of the Club shall consist of the following officers all of whom shall be Members of the Club: President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, Excursion Secretary, Editor, Newsletter Editor, Librarian, Webmaster, Audio-visual Coordinator, Immediate Past President and up to an additional four (4) Councillors".

CT WHITE LECTURE HELD OCTOBER 19th 2020

A Brief history of Bryological exploration in Queensland

From 1951 the Queensland Naturalists' Club has held an annual C.T.White Memorial Lecture to honour the Government Botanist from 1917, Cyril Tenison White. Dr Andrew Franks from Queensland Herbarium delivered the 2020 memorial lecture. Dr Franks is the Collections' Manager and Principal Botanist at the Queensland Herbarium, as well as being principal botanist at the consultancy, Oberonia Botanical. His topic was Bryophytes, the non-vascular liverworts, hornworts and mosses. The illustrated address concentrated on a list of prominent collectors in Queensland, which has Australia's most diverse species. Prominent collectors included Ludwig Leichhardt (1863), Amalie Dietrich (1863-1871 and one of two women in the list), C J Wild (1880), F M Bailey, John Shirley, Rev William W Watts, Ilma Stone (1969-1994) and Heinar Streiman. Hugo Flecker was a Cairns radiologist who founded the North Qld Naturalist Club. The areas of Bellenden Ker and Bartle Frere have yielded many species including a new species last year. The complete address is expected to be published in a forthcoming issue of the Journal of the Queensland Naturalists' Club.

This park entrance is well maintained with relatively low weed incursion, diverse ground covers and the potential for lots of insect-host plant action (if it rains beforehand). Our path, depending on our walking speed, may take us through a number of different Regional Ecosystem types that are of least concern. The area we'll be exploring drains into Kholo Creek, close to the Brisbane River. The nearby "Ugly Gully" was once a well-known swimming hole in the 1960s & 1970, though now **overgrown** with invasive plants and difficult to access.

There are no facilities available in the area of this walk. The track is well established, though may be hilly in some places, depending on how far we walk. Sturdy shoes are recommended.

For those wanting to go on an early morning walk along the Brisbane River, we will meet at 07.30am but for those who would like a later start and are happy to just look over the lagoon and river, come for a breakfast at 9.00 am. We will meet at one of the shelters along Bobby Auld Drive, probably near the western end, look for QNC signs. The exact location will depend where we can get a free shelter. Turn off the Mt Crosby Road, Chuwar at #408-492, just south of the bridge over the Brisbane River (UBD 194:F10, -27.5574, 152.8023). The recreation area has shelters, BBQs, toilets and a café which should be open. There are a good variety of water and woodland birds, with insects and interesting plants along the walk. Bring breakfast, sunscreen and insect repellent. At about 10.00 am there will be the final QNC council meeting for the year.

This will be an off track walk down Bullant spur to Blue Pool and then return back along the Blue Pool formed track to O'Reilly's. Bullant Spur descends from Lamington Road just on the resort side of Duck Creek Road. We will meet in the O'Reilly's carpark at 8am and load into a minimum number of vehicles, travel back to start of walk, park cars there and head into the rainforest. We will follow the footpad down the ridge to meet up with Blue Pool track just above Blue Pool. Depending on time I hope to have lunch at Blue Pool and then it will be a long track walk back up the Blue Pool track to O'Reilly's where we will travel back to cars where we parked them in the morning.

I have not done this track for a few years so can't advise on the amount of possible fallen timber etc. The track down is about 1.8km with a descent of 400m. I do hope to have a look at the track a couple of days before the planned walk. The graded track back is 400m ascent but over 5km. The walk will be cancelled if the weather is inclement. If there has been rain prior to the walk but the day is fine we might cancel the Bullant spur track and take an alternative track walk to the old Forestry Camp and Lyrebird lookout.

EXCURSION REPORTS

September 4-6: Long Weekend Camp – Durikai State Forest

I have now identified all the plant collections from the Durikai camp. The most significant record was *Calotis glabrescens* (photo attached). This species was described by C.T. White in 1946, from a collection he made in 1944 from Bybera near Inglewood.

No more collections were forthcoming and the species was "forgotten". In the Flora of South-eastern Queensland (1986), it was relegated to synonymy with *Calotis lappulacea*, despite the latter having short yellow rays on the outer florets. About ten years ago, Ailsa Holland (Qld Herbarium) recognised it as distinct, and thought it was probably an extinct species. She later identified a small specimen by Paul Grimshaw on the Herries Range, west of Leyburn, as *C. glabrescens*. Paul Forster revisited the Grimshaw site recently (Sep 2020) and found the plant to be quite common there.

So it is now known from two sites; Durikai SF and W of Leyburn. I saw *C. glabrescens* from only one site at Durikai, in *Eucalyptus moluccana* woodland. At the time of the camp, I knew only that it was a *Calotis* I was unfamiliar with, and so I did not survey the population, but I probably saw about 20 plants.

October 17: Scotts Point, Redcliffe Peninsula

Report by Myriam Preker

Eighteen QNC members and one visitor spent a pleasant afternoon exploring the boulders, the seagrass and the sandy-muddy intertidal area of the southern end of Scotts Point. This region, situated on Brisbane's doorstep, has historically been an important recreational area, and some members had fond memories of visiting here in the past. There was a general consensus that the habitat had deteriorated over the years, with fine silt covering much of the high intertidal. Despite this, we recorded a good selection of marine flora and fauna.

One of the highlights was seeing a large Haddon's Anemone (*Stichodactyla haddoni*), usually only found in the lower intertidal but, here, nestled among the high rocks. Marine worms were well represented: the flatworm, McGrath's Oyster Leech (*Imogine mcgrathi*); a peanut worm, (*Phascolosoma sp.*); and numerous segmented bristle worms (Polychaeta). The free-living segmented worms were represented by: the predatory Green Paddle Worm (*Phyllodoce novaehollandiae*); Eunice sp.; and a polynoid Scale Worm. By far the most spectacular of the sedentary worms was the beautiful Feather Duster Worm (*Serpula jukesii*).

ITEMS OF INTEREST

DR GEOFF MONTEITH ONE OF THE WORLD'S BEST

Exciting news from the Queensland Museum Network that one of our members, Dr Geoff Monteith, has been hailed as one of the world's top 10 most commemorated scientists based on the number of species named in their honour.

Dr Monteith, former Senior Curator of Entomology at the Queensland Museum joins the ranks alongside celebrated historical figures in science including Charles Darwin and Alfred Russel Wallace. At the time of publishing, Dr Monteith had 225 species and 15 genera named after him. Throughout his career, he has been a major force in the collection and survey of rainforest invertebrates, both in Australia and nearby overseas countries since the early 1960s, carrying out collecting surveys in all major rainforest areas in Australia.

More dragonfly and damselfly photos!

The QNC is seeking photos from club members to illustrate a guidebook of the dragonflies and damselflies of south east Queensland to be produced in memory of the late Deniss Reeves. Deniss was a former QNC President and long-term member who had a passion for dragonflies and damselflies. He devoted his life to raising community awareness and the understanding of them. He collected numerous specimens which he donated to the Queensland Museum and other scientific institutions.

In memory of Deniss, and with some of the generous bequest received from his estate,

members of the club are working towards producing a guide for budding naturalists to learn about these insects. In addition, the guide will encourage younger naturalists in the pursuit of natural history, according to his wishes.

A group from the club has been meeting regularly this year using Zoom video-link technology. Chris Burwell, QNC member and Senior Curator of Insects at the Queensland Museum, and Shane Appleby, previously Digital Assets Manager at the Queensland Museum have both provided valuable advice. The scope of the project is now changing. Initially a brochure was envisioned, but now the project has expanded to produce a

small guide.

The guide is to be illustrated with photographs of damselflies and dragonflies. To assist this process, we would like to invite club members to contribute quality images. Some images from Deniss Reeves may also be used. The club has invested in the purchase of a license for an image management system called Pics-io, using funds from Deniss' bequest, which is being used to catalogue photos contributed by members and to enable taxonomic and other data to be recorded for each image.

Many photos have already been received by the club and we thank members who have contributed to date.

However, more images are still required. Images need to be high quality, sharp and of a high resolution, suitable for publication. We will welcome pictures of any species native to the area, but in particular we have no suitable images currently from the following species:

Having the following information for each photo would be beneficial but not essential.

- Photographer's name
- Species if you know it (not essential)
- Date and time of observation
- Location description and, if possible, coordinates and datum
- Habitat type
- Any other notes from your observation

Photographers agree that the Club may use their photos for the project, including materials relating to the project. QNC may crop photos for display but copyright remains with the photographer and all photos used will be credited to the photographer.

EXHIBITS

- 1. Barbara Braddock showed a specimen of faeces, black and full of seeds, which was found at Minto Crags. Barry Jahnke thinks it is probably Red Fox.
- 2. Barbara noted there were few birds at Minto Crags because of the drought, mainly White-throated Honeyeaters, an occasional Leaden Flycatcher and Rufous Whistler. There were the usual Kookaburras, Butcherbirds, Currawongs, Magpies and a pair of Wedge-tailed Eagles was seen over the Crags. There were good views of the local Koala on the first night. The geology was fascinating and 2 Burton's Legless Lizards/Snake Lizards, *Lialis burtonis*, were seen as well as a beautiful chestnut colour and a copper bellied skink of uncertain id.
- 3. Also shown was a small Acacia possibly *conferta* as seen at Barakula State Forest.
- 4. Bruce Rassmussen showed footage of two Kookaburras fighting over a lizard with a Grey Butcherbird

PLANTS OF TOOWOOMBA AND THE DARLING DOWNS: CAN YOU HELP US?

A local group of plant lovers has initiated a project to develop a field guide to the plants of Toowoomba and the Downs based around the Condamine River catchment (area of interest lies within the black polygon shown on the map in previous editions of the QNC News). Our inspiration is the excellent Mangroves to Mountains by Glenn Leiper et al. Our working title is Condamine Country: A Field Guide to the Plants of Toowoomba and the Darling Downs.

To that end, we are seeking photos of local flora and would be pleased to receive any good shots you might have that you are willing to share with us. The project is not a profit-making venture, so no payment for images is possible, however authorship of any images we use will be acknowledged.

- We are seeking photos that are in focus and show the features of the plant clearly.
- Ideally photos should show flowers, foliage and any other features of significance for identification. The field guide is aimed at ordinary people with no botanical expertise. The most suitable photos for our purposes are the ones which show the feature/s of the plant which are most likely to attract the attention of a curious amateur.
- Photos should be as high resolution as possible and in JPEG (jpg) or TIFF (tif) format; we may need to crop or otherwise adjust images.
- Photos should be of wild plants only (not garden specimens)
- Photos can be of introduced as well as of native species. We intend to include a selection of introduced plants.
- Please name any files you send us in this way:
 - [Genus] [species] [your given name] [your surname] [the location of the plant] [month taken]
 [year taken] (e.g. *Acacia blakei* Fred Neurk Clark Rd Chinchilla Feb 2018)
 - Omit any of the detail above that is unknown; if the plant itself is unidentified, please replace [genus] and [species] with the word [unknown] (e.g. unknown Fred Neurk Clark Rd Chinchilla Feb 2018)
 - If you are submitting more than one photo of a particular species, please add a number at the end (1, 2, etc.)
- Please limit your submission/s to three photos of any given species.
