- 3 Track, some hilly sections.
- 4 Track, some steep sections.
- 5 Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6 Track, steep sections common, with steps.
- 7 Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8 Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth.
- 9 Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10 Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

OUTING REPORT WEST BALD ROCK

23 people met at Lions Park Wallangarra at 8.30am for the days climb to West Bald Rock. A fifteen minute drive found us at the stone entrance to the stone house. After smoko we headed off with our first stop being the abandoned stone house which, with every visit, is showing more signs of deterioration. Four people headed back to the cars with the remaining party now following a national parks fire maintenance trail.

As we followed the trail and nearing the ridge we were to follow to the top, an owl was spotted flying away from the base of a fence post near the trail. On further inspection, a young owl was found on the ground still tooyoung to fly or fend for itself. We then climbed through the fence and followed the ridge stopping along the way to take in the various vantage points which afforded good views into the valley below and on reaching the top of the ridge before turning for the final ascent, a good view across to Middle Rock.

We reached the summit at around 12.30 pm and as people at this stage were becoming quite hungry, found a sheltered spot for lunch. After lunch and a wander around we headed back for the cars and this is where the day began to go not as planned.

Following the ridge down I allowed myself to drift to the left on what was a different ridge to the one I had followed up and on reaching the bottom the surrounding scenery did not look familiar. After walking some distance we found ourselves on an old trail which ended back to the border fence. At this stage I was not sure which direction to head and after finding a vantage point, taking compass reading and sending out a scouting party, we found ourselves heading in the right direction. Following the trail we came across times that Colin Hocking ,who had left the party at the top of West Bald a little earlier than us, had scratched into the ground and revealed that he had passed by almost three hours earlier. With the sun fast disappearing we arrived back at the cars at almost 6.30pm some two hours later than was anticipated. Thankyou to everyone who attended the day and I hope I am forgiven.

Outing Report - Nundubbermere Falls

About 45 people including many new faces turned up for the trip to the falls on 18/1/98. It was surprising how many people had never been there although it isn't far from Stanthorpe. Before we set off, Millie gave an excellent description of how a convoy travels through a series of gates. This was put to the practical test and found to work well.

The falls were only a short distance from the carpark but the track was too rugged for some. Quite a few people went swimming, some walked up to the falls and some went back to the cars up a side gully. Some recent rain had brought a small flow to this creek.

Some folk drove up to the top falls where another group went swimming. The rock formations here have some large cylindrical holes and are locally known as Koina's Tanks, wittingly named after a Stanthorpe plumber. Here Colin Hocking's father discovered a plant he said was previously unknown in Queensland, a species of Correa. Colin found a Burton's legless lizard, with it's distinctively shaped head, about 40cm long.

Pre-outing Report - Teviot Falls


The February outing is to the Teviot Falls on the Main Range. Meet at 9.00am, at the Queen Mary Falls Picnic Area. The shortest and more scenic route is via the Mt. Lindsay Road, turn right 6km past Legume then a further 6km to Queen Mary Falls. Alternatively, drive to Warwick, then Killarney and turn left 4 km past Killarney. Allow about an hour to get there.

The forestry access road is off the Boonah Road, past Carr's Lookout. Wilson's Peak is on the right. The Superbus Map marks the south branch of Teviot Brook as Teviot Falls. We will be heading for the north branch which has the lovely 'bath tub' pool just in from the lip of the falls, and an impressive view of Wilson's Peak.

We enter the rainforest from the forestry track, cross the south branch of the creek and stay parallel with the cliff line up to the north branch. We could have lunch at the pool. The water would be unsuitable to drink as it flows through cleared pastures etc. Please note - ticks leeches and mosquitoes are a problem at times.

The walk is not a long one but the edges are very steep - I took one giant step from the top to the side of the creek! We will bring a rope to use as an aid. Scale of difficulty - 7.

Christmas Breakup

Our Breakup, on Sunday the 7th December, was a bit of a fiasco, the Stanthorpe weather behaving as only Stanthorpe can.

The day had been very hot, so only a few people turned up at 4 o'clock at Heritage Park to walk up the creek to the Red Bridge. Most came much later just to meet everybody else and have a barbeque tea. There were about forty people in all as cooking got under way, and at the same time the sky quickly clouded over and a cool wind came up to make it more pleasant.

About half the people had had there fill when the clouds opened up making things very cold and uncomfortable, so there was a hurried exodus for cars and home. The party was over in a flash, and incidently there was no more rain that evening.



Burton's legless lizard

This lizard, which Col Hocking found on the Nundubbermere Falls outing, is often mistaken for a snake. Its botanical name is *Lialis burtonis*, and it belongs to a family that is endemic to Australia and New Guinea. It is found throughout Australia, in ground or low-lying vegetative habitats - I have occasionally turned one up in the compost heap. Usually it is active at night, although as it hunts worms, geckos and skinks it is often seen during the late afternoon and early morning. It will grow up to 70cm in length, and like many lizards it is able to drop its tail if grabbed there, but its best form of defence is its camouflage.

I found this information in the book *The Cold-Blooded Australians* by Gunther Schmida.
