- 6 Track, steep sections common, with steps.
- 7 Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8 Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth.
- 9 Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10 Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

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## CAMP-OUT REPORT GIBRALTAR RANGE NATIONAL PARK 6 - 8 / 6 /1998


We set out for our cold weather camp out on Friday 5th June after work. Which meant we set up camp in the dark, which was not difficult as it was a lovely clear night with plenty of moonlight. The cold was quite stimulating, but we were prepared for it, and lit a fire for atmosphere as well as warmth.

The currawongs were in evidence as usual, next morning and we watched a kookaburra sitting fluffed up on a branch in the sun for quite some time thawing out, while the spinebills flitted about in the banksias. Two or three wallabies came to visit, which Mario later identified as red necked wallabies, not pretty faced as we had thought.

At about 11 am we went for an hour's walk along the Atricornis Trail, thinking no one else was coming for the afternoon walk. There were two banksia species in bloom, one being spinulosa we think, as well as zieria and grey grevillea. We watched crimson rosellas, a pair of yellow robins, striated thornbills, Lewins honeyeaters and New Holland honeyeaters along the way.

While we were walking Karol and Mario arrived, so we set off after lunch for the Tree Fern Forest, where there are four different species of tree fern, with many other ferns along the way. Before we had gone very far, we heard a lyre bird calling, and were within hearing distance of them all the way. At one stage one crossed our path, surely a sign of good luck. There were numerous fungi along the path, ranging from honey coloured toadstools to orange coral fungus. There were tiny red toadstools and bigger yellow/green ones and some white with red blotches. A white furry fungus was growing on some of the toadstools, and some of the brown ones looked varnished.

Karol and Kris getting down to the "white furry fungus", probably a Phycomycetes.



Helen arrived in the evening, so we gathered round the fire to cook a damper which Karol had made. We had trouble with the coals going black, so it took longer than usual to cook. However, it was worth the wait and disappeared in no time when spread with cockey's joy.

Sunday dawned cold and windy, so we rugged up and set out for Boundary Creek Falls to meet Trish and Rob. After the mandatory cuppa and a look at the falls, we ventured along the track to Duffer Creek Falls, pausing often to admire and photograph more fungi.

On arriving at the falls we worked our way downstream past the first two falls to the big drop into the Demon Fault, which is many metres high. We sat at the side of the falls to eat lunch, while the wind roared up the gorge beside us, and we sat warm and sheltered by the rocks. It was interesting to watch the wind blowing on some of the ridges in the gorge, while others were quite calm.

On arriving back at boundary Creek we decided to head back to camp to light fires before it was too dark. The bush shower was much appreciated. Our fire on Sunday night was more obliging and the damper cooked in half the time. This time we had apricot jam instead of syrup.

The wind blew very strongly during the night, so on Monday morning we needed to start walking to keep warm. We drove to the Washpool to walk to the Twin Cedars. Again there were lots of fungi and lyre birds calling. Helen and I were fortunate to get a good look at a lyrebird which ran down the road, did a couple of turns, put its wings out and started calling when it got around the corner.

Progress was quite slow because we stopped so often to admire ferns and fungi. There were huge Sydney blue gums along the track in the dry sclerophyll forest, as well as other species which we didn't know. We watched bell miners chasing crows on the way in and on the return journey, and heard bower birds calling. As we approached the twin cedars we saw a beautiful strangler fig which had fallen at an angle, so that its aerial roots are starting to grow down like the curtain fig on the Atherton Tableland - It still has a way to go!

The Twin Cedars are magnificent. It's rather like standing in a cathedral when you stand looking up into the branches and touch their rough bark. We admired elk horns and bird nest ferns in the tops of the trees, and after a while soaking up antiquity we headed back for lunch, then home.

Although there were so few campers, a total of 7 for the outing, we had a very enjoyable weekend, and survived the cold remarkably well. Whatever time of year we go to Gibraltar Range there is something different to see. This time the colour was provided mainly by fungi rather than wild flowers, and the park wove its usual magic.

Plants seen in flower included Zieria, three Acacias, Scaevola, Goodenia, Helichrysum, Epacris longifolia and microphylla, three Leucopogons, Choretrum candollei (Broom Bush), Banksia spinulosa and B. integrifolia, Drosera, and Utricularia dichotoma (Purple bladderwort).

The walk is on a graded track to Turtle Rock and then cross country to Wallangarra Ridge. This will involve some rock scrambling and a little bush bashing, not very arduous, certainly no more than the steep climb from the camping area to Castle Rock turn-off.

Distance involved is 12 to 14 kilometres, so there will be very little time on the way out for stop-offs such Sphinx or Turtle Rock or flower pauses, not that there will be very much out at this time of year. These can be examined in more depth on the way home if time permits.

Lunch will be at Wallangarra Ridge, so bring a back-pack.
