Over 30 people attended the outing on 19th September led by Desley McDonagh to "Upson Downs" on Nundubbermere Road, including a good roll-up from the Toowoomba Bird Observer's Club.

Next Outing:

Brian Dodd will conduct his trip to Wallangara Ridge in Girraween National Park on 24th October which had to be cancelled last year because of rain. He estimates that it will be approximately a 12km round trip taking at least 6 hours.

Jean Harslett then provided members with a wonderful slide presentation of trips she and Bob had taken in Europe, primarily Denmark and Norway.

Wildflowers and things at our back door

Trish takes our dogs for a walk around the neighbouring roads and properties every day and after she commented to me about the number of wildflowers coming out along the stock route I decided to join her one morning. The start of the stock route is ideal for orchids, on a south-east slope, very rocky with an understory of tea tree and cypress, and we soon came upon some delicate Wax-lip orchids, *Glossodia major*. These were scattered extensively through the grass and varied in colour from pale pink to a deep cerise. In one place a pair of Spider orchids, *Caladenia reticulata*, stood defiantly next to the throng of Wax-lips, and everywhere there were little Everlasting daisies contrasting with the last of the deep blue *Stypandra glauca*.

We noticed a tell-tale scratch on the base of a smooth barked gum tree and at the same time the dogs began very excitedly sniffing around another tree. This was a cypress, and high up near the top was a koala with a half grown cub. The disturbance from below made them try to climb higher, one above the other, and as I could see the top begin to sway we called the dogs away and continued our walk.

Trish pointed out an Elkhorn fern and a rock covered with a Strap fern, and I found a clump of Tongue orchids, *Dendrobium linguiforme*, in full bloom. On our return we came across some clumps of Finger orchids, with both pink and white varieties represented, *Caladenia carnia* and *C. alba* respectively. We wondered at the ability of these plants to put on such a good display in spite of the dry conditions and decided that they must store energy from previous good seasons. This seems to be the case with our home garden as the Iris lilies are blooming better than in other years.

Later in the day we were able to return to the 'koala tree' without the dogs and spend more time watching them. This time mother and baby were feeding on different branches of a gum tree and seemed quite content for us to stay and watch.

Observations in the Chapman Garden

Over the years we have derived very great pleasure from the birds that frequent our bird feeding table. Regular daily visitors are Red-browed finches, Double-barred finches, Crimson rosellas, Peaceful doves and Bar shouldered doves.

Not as regular but common are Crested pigeons and Ring parrots while we always enjoy the occasional clients including Red-winged parrots, Eastern rosellas, Common bronze wing pigeons, Apostlebirds and Galahs. However when seven fully coloured male Red-rumped parrots appeared and sampled with obvious relish our offering of millet seed we were of course very interested.

Why only mature males?

On referring to the Readers' Digest "Complete Book of Birds" we learnt that during breeding the female incubates the eggs while the male feeds her at almost hourly intervals throughout the day, moving about in small parties with other males for the rest of the time.

We were quite intrigued to think that while we were watching these seven beautiful little parrots enjoying easy seed gathering, somewhere in the vicinity seven of their mates were patiently hatching out the next generation.

Outing Report for September

Over thirty members and friends of the Stanthorpe Field Nats and the Toowoomba Bird Observers Clubs enjoyed a very pleasant outing to "Upson Downs", the home of Geoff and Rose McDonagh on September 19th. We got away from Weeroona Park at about 8.15am instead of 8.00am sharp, which was just as well because some members either slept in, were held up, or just couldn't understand that 8.00am wasn't 8.30am. Fortunately, we all got together eventually at our destination after collecting those who were waiting at the Nundubbermere turnoff.

After a short break at the house for members to meet hostess Rose and admire the setting of the home, we set off down the road to a small dam for smoko. We enjoyed the time watching birds and trying to identify some of the plants including a ground cover with small white flowers. (One plant identified as *Anguillaria dioica* or Early Nancy is now named *Wurmbea biglandulosa* - just to make life more interesting. Editor.) Also seen here was "Punch" the Grey fantail.

After this pleasant interlude we moved on down the road and then followed the marked trail to the escarpment. The trees marked with yellow ribbon proved to be a successful idea as people could find there own way back when they wished. As we crossed a small creek we admired a very good stand of Pomaderris which followed the creek line. It was in full bloom, much more advanced than it had been on the pre-outing.

All except two people, (birdo's who stayed at the dam) made it to the escarpment. It took the botanists quite some time to get there as they were held up identifying and listing the flora. The list is attached below, many thanks to my brother Brian who took on that task, and to others who assisted in identification. Quite some time was spent on the escarpment which allows a magnificent view over the surrounding country. Several of the more active members went further on to the next hill, attracted, I believe, by the beautiful granite boulders on it. The children who came with the Toowoomba Club enjoyed their time there also. (The bird list which follows was compiled by those same children. Editor.)

After lunch most of the birdo's and some of the Nats returned to the house where they enjoyed cold drinks and tea courtesy of Rose, while a number of others walked farther down the road where we continued to find wildflowers and birds to study. A pardolote was observed entering its nest in a bank by one group while the rest of us just enjoyed the peace and quiet of this unspoiled area.

I had a phone call from one of the Toowoomba folk on the morning following the outing, expressing thanks to the Nats for including them in the outing; to me for leading it; to Rose McDonagh for her hospitality; advising that the bird list would number more than 30 and telling me that the children had a wonderful day.

I want to thank my family - Rose and Geoff (who was sorry that he was unable to be part of the day) for allowing us to tramp over their property, Brian for his hard work with the plant list, as well as Rob McCosker for his liason with the Toowoomba Bird Observers Club and other helpful support, and all those who came and made the outing an excellent one. Outing Report from Toowoomba Bird Observers

The beautiful dry spring weather attracted a large crowd of Birdo's and Stanthorpe Field Nats in a joint outing to "Upson Downs", a property near Stanthorpe owned by Geoff and Rose McDonagh. For a start Crimson Rosella and Bar -Shouldered Dove were seen as people arrived at the entrance of the property.

We gathered alongside a small dam for morning tea where Striped Honeyeaters called persistently. Next, we walked to a point where we divided into two groups. The larger group ventured through the bush guided by yellow ribbons to a rocky escarpment with superb views. The small party kept to the main track heading to the dingo fence at the edge of the property. Eastern Spinebill, Grey Shrike-Thrush, Eastern Yellow Robin, White -Throated Treecreeper and a female Rufous Whistler were seen, while a possible Speckled Warbler was too far back to identify.

The small party had arranged to meet the rest at the escarpment for lunch and when they arrived, Inland Thornbill, White-cared Honeyeater and Leaden Flycatcher were reported. Afterwards we ambled back to the house and enjoyed a pleasant chat while Field Guides were checked and checklists were updated.

Using our eyes and ears, 31 species were recorded and a great time was enjoyed by everyone.

October Outing - Wallangarra Ridge

This has been set down for Sunday the 24th October. Meet at Weeroona Park at 8.30am or Castle Rock Camping Area (right hand side of the road) at Girraween at 9.00am.

The walk is on a graded track to Turtle Rock and then cross country to Wallangarra Ridge. This will involve some rock scrambling and a little bush bashing, not very arduous, certainly no more than the steep climb from the camping area to the Castle Rock turn-off.

Distance involved is 12 to 14 kilometres, so there will be very little time on the way out for stop-offs such as the Sphinx or Turtle Rock or flower pauses, not that there will be very much still out at this time of year. These can be examined in more depth on the way home, if time permits.

Lunch will be at Wallangarra Ridge, so bring a back-pack.
