

- 3. Track, some hilly sections.
- 4. Track, some steep sections.
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps.
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth.
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

- 2. The Photographic Society of Queensland will be holding a 3 day conference in Stanthorpe over the June long weekend. The naturalist and photographer, Densey Clyne, will be giving a presentation on the Saturday afternoon and Kris Carnell suggested members might be interested in coming along to this.

Meeting closed at 8.45pm.

Kris and Margaret Carnell then provided members with a very enjoyable presentation of slides taken on a trip to the historic gold mining township of Hill End near Mudgee in central New South Wales.



Save the Bilby Fund

Funds are being sought to help fence a part of Currawinya National Park in south west Queensland so that bilbies can be safely relocated there.

The bilby or rabbit eared bandicoot is one of Australia's most endangered mammals. It used to be widespread across much of inland Australia but habitat destruction and predation by feral animals has reduced its numbers dramatically. It is now confined to a few scattered populations in the Channel Country and the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service is hoping to be able to relocate some of them to Currawinya National Park. However, to ensure their survival, it is proposed to construct a predator proof fence around a 25 sq km section of


the park. The total cost of the fence is estimated to be \$250,000 and donations are being sought to purchase panels for \$20 each.

It has been suggested that the Club should contribute to this very worthy cause and a donation tin will be available at the next meeting for those members who would like to help. If you are unable to make it to the meeting, please give your donation to a committee member at the outing or send a cheque, made out to the "Save the Bilby Fund", to the Club's address and we will pass it on.

Report on Sundown Campout March 18-19th

With conditions so dry in Stanthorpe it was a lovely surprise to see the country further west looking comparatively green. Sundown National Park had received a little over 2 inches and the Broadwater camping area was a soft green and relaxing place to camp.

Given such a beautiful spot and perfect weather, it was surprising so few people ventured out for a night's camping. Those of us who did enjoyed perfect camping conditions although the river was virtually dry - a year ago when we were there it was flowing fast.

On Saturday afternoon Peter Haselgrove accompanied us on a three hour walk up Ooline Gorge which was a good warm-up for the walk the next day. A couple of us took advantage of the Permanents Waterhole to cool off on the way back. The 'goat track' from the camping ground to the entrance of Ooline Gorge has been upgraded recently and even sports steps!

On Sunday morning we awoke to the prolific bird sounds of the camping area and a hot day. An intrepid little band of 5, including Peter Haselgrove and a keen bushwalker from Mossman who was camped nearby and expressed interest in joining us, headed off at about 9.30 am. We crossed the river without any danger of getting our feet wet and headed up the dry bed of McAllister's Creek. It wasn't long before we found the first pool of water then enjoyed running water and little pools and waterfalls for the whole walk.

This walk had all the essential ingredients - spectacular rock formations, water, some beautiful spots along the way, a few challenges (some of us don't like clinging by our kneecaps to rock faces), great company, tales from a person who knows this country so well, and culminating in a wonderful set of Twin Falls. Peter told us he 'discovered' these falls and that prior to this they were not marked on any maps.

Interesting finds were a yellow hibiscus Hibiscus hetrophyllus?, an area of limestone at the Twin Falls with stalactites, whalebone trees Streblus pendulinus, and a couple of Backhousias - one large specimen behind the toilets in the camping area and one in the gorge.

My sincere thanks to Peter for his guidance and knowledge and to the other walkers for contributing to a good weekend.

April Outing Details

The outing on April 16th will be an easy ramble through the Stanthorpe State Forest.

As usual, assemble at Weeroona Park at 9.00am.

We shall proceed to the starting point a few hundred metres past Happy Valley Resort on Glen Lyon Drive. There is an easy downhill walk to the valley. Here time may be spent exploring the valley or climbing the rocks (for the energetic) after the morning tea break.

After exploring the creek to the south, lunch will be taken.

Following lunch we shall proceed homeward along a well defined track along the southern perimeter of the forest. Bush bashers are free to let their legs wander at will and leave and rejoin the track whenever the spirit moves them.

When we emerge on Glen Lyon Drive again, we shall be about ten to fifteen minutes (on foot) south of our starting point.

The trek is an easy walk and can be as long or short as desired. A map will be supplied for those who need to be home earlier than others and possibly also for those who like to have some idea of where they are.

Details for Campout at Crow's Nest 29th April - 1st May

This outing will take in Crow's Nest Falls National Park, Ravensbourne National Park and Hartmann Park in Crow's Nest.

We will be camping at the Crow's Nest Caravan Park, a very pleasant park on the outskirts of the town. Crow's Nest is approximately 45 minutes north of Toowoomba on the New England Highway. I have made a booking for approximately 20 and we have been allocated a very nice grassy area. Cost will be \$12.00 for an unpowered campsite with discount for single campers. Please advise firm numbers as soon as possible.

Saturday we will meet at the picnic area of the Crow's Nest Falls National Park at 2.00pm. Members who have settled in at the caravan park will meet up with others there. We will walk to the Crow's Nest Falls and then on to Koonan Lookout which looks over the Valley of Diamonds and the junction of Cressbrook and Perseverence Creeks, all on made national park tracks, quite easy walking. The track down to the bottom of the falls is quite rough, but it is not necessary to do that part of the walk. When I walked these tracks early in the year we saw quite a number of birds, wildflowers and a large goanna. This walk will take up as much of the afternoon as you wish. Bring plenty of water if the weather stays hot and afternoon tea to have at one of the stops on the way.

We will spend Sunday at Ravensbourne National Park. If you wish to come for the day and meet us there, please be at Beutel's Lookout at 9.00am. Day visitors from Stanthorpe should take the Esk road from Hampton, and turn off that road to Beutel's Lookout. From Crow's Nest we will be coming via Perserverence Dam and Mt Jockey Roads. I will have maps available on the day for participants. After taking the Cedar Block self guided walk at Beutel's Lookout, where there are magnificent views from the escarpment towards Brisbane and the coast, we will return to the picnic ground closer to the highway where there are several interesting walks, including the Rainforest Circuit, Palm Creek Circuit and the "caves", which are sandstone overhangs, and the Buaraba Creek walk. On the pre-outing (26th March) we examined the caves, where we saw a white-headed pigeon, and we completed the Palm Forest and Rainforest Circuits with ease. The piccabeen palms were in colourful berry, we saw quite a number of birds on the walks as well as a whip bird and a number of yellow robins at the picnic grounds. We can most certainly fill in most of the day at Ravensbourne N.P. I recommend that we carry lunch and water for the circuit walks.

Monday morning we will visit Hartmann Park in Crow's Nest. This is a small area of unspoilt open forest with several walks available. On the pre-outing Banksias collina and integrifolia were in bloom, as well as some very small flannel flowers and pink rice flower even though it was very hot and dry. This park is a great contrast to the rainforest of Ravensbourne. Carry water and a snack.

The outing will officially end at lunch time or slightly later at Crow's Nest on Monday.

I need to know ASAP of numbers for the Crow's Nest Caravan Park, and if you need power, so please ring me on 4681 3074 if you are coming.
