

- Track, some steep sections.
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps.
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth.
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE NETWORK

A network of Natural History Groups evolved, beginning when the Geelong Field Nats Club considered a way of alerting touring naturalists that a group existed in Geelong. The Victorian Field Naturalists Association suggested a sign at the entrance of each town where a natural history group existed, and agreed that it should be Australia wide. It is interesting to note, as a Queenslander, that Victoria has a State wide campout regularly. The mind boggles at the thought of such a campout in our state!!! The logo was designed and signs have been prepared, which can be put at town entrances or on club rooms if applicable. I have purchased one of their Polo shirts which you will see me wearing proudly on summer outings. There are also car stickers available. The Network arranged the get together which I attended at Alice Springs recently.

THE GET-TOGETHER

There were 60 + people who attended this function and I found it a tremendous experience. I wish other members of our club could have come. The botanists would have had a wonderful time, as would the birdo's. Some members had travelled across the desert from WA to be there and there were members from Victoria, SA, and clubs on the border of NSW and Vic as well as one Queenslander. We stayed at Macdonnell Ranges Holiday Park which had cabins, bunkhouses, powered sites and tent sites.

Most days we went out in a bus which was hired for the time of the get-together. Dick Southcombe from the Geelong Field Nats organised the whole activity. He did a marvelous job. Places visited included Rainbow Valley Conservation Reserve; Ormiston Gorge; Trephina Gorge and Hayes Rock Hole; Simpson Gap and Standley Chasm; Desert Park and Ewaninga and Kuyunba Reserves. Because the Centre has had such good rain recently the wildflowers were magnificent. There was also an abundance of birds and I had pleasure in seeing a number of bird species in the wild for the first time. These included mulga parrots, spotted bower birds, Major

Mitchell cockatoos and crimson chats. The most common birds were white-plumed honeyeaters - they were everywhere, as were crested pigeons. I was thrilled to see budgies in the wild in numbers rather than in cages. The Alice Springs Field Nats were very helpful and accompanied us on some of our outings, sharing their local knowledge.

I had a wonderful time at the Australian National Naturalist's Get-Together in Alice Springs and will share some of the special experiences with you with further articles in later Newsletters. The beauty of the flora will stay with me for a long time. Now I have contacts with Nats from "all over" and I'm sure they'll be calling in here if they come this way on their travels. I hope you meet some of them sometime.

The next ANN Get -Together will be in Tasmania in 2002 - start saving !!!

Report on the First Weekday Outing - Friday 4th August

Eleven members and friends met at Girraween picnic area and enjoyed a barbeque lunch. Following this we ambled down the track to the Junction which is, as is all the district, very dry, enabling us to go places that are not usually accessible. We had a very pleasant time together, observing the many wildflowers out in bloom and many coming. The Flannel flowers should be magnificent when they bloom - I have not seen so many plants there before. (We are planning to visit Girraween again on the first Friday in November to see how the flannel flowers are doing.) The hovea and acacias look good for the future too. Flowers we found in bloom included - mirbelia; pimelia; boronia; 4 acacias; stenanthemum; helichrysum; leucopogon; epacris and melichrus.

The birds which joined us for lunch were - grey butcher bird; peewee; satin bower birds 9male and females); kookaburra; currawongs (of course); magpies; wattle bird and on the walk we saw - crimson rosellas; a yellow tufted honeyeater and a grey shrike-thrush.

A good time was had by all.

It was resolved by those present that we have regular weekday outings on the first Friday of the month. Consequently we plan to meet at Weeroona Park on Friday 1st September at 11.30am. 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July Outing Report - Kinnanes Falls

Members met at the turnoff outside Killarney before setting off to Daggs Falls for a quick look from the viewing platform, then continued to 'The Head' and stopping to take in the view from Carr's Lookout. At the top of the range then we stopped to look at the Teviot Falls before continuing to the turnoff for Kinnanes Falls where we had morning tea.

True to David's word the walk was very steep, up a grassy slope to the base of a cliff, where we all decided to take the "scenic" route around The Veranda. This was negotiated very slowly and carefully, with several stops to photograph and enjoy the scenery. On top of the ridge then it was an easy walk around to the Falls through open grassland with large Grasstrees along the edge of the cliff-line providing more excellent photo opportunities. The cliff near the falls is home to the large Spear Lily *Doryanthes palmeri*, which seem to hang on the rock face in ridiculous places, defying gravity, and making it very difficult to get close enough to photograph their huge red flower spikes. Also in flower just over the edge of the cliff at the waterfall was a clump of yellow rock lily orchids *Dendrobium monophyllum*. After investigating the creek, Wilson Creek, which was little more than a trickle, we lunched at the top, then took the less scenic route back to the cars. Care was needed here as there were loose stones along the steeper sections.

On the return trip we stopped again at Carr's Lookout but the view was totally obscured by smoke from 'burning off' fires in the Condamine Valley. At the picnic area near Browns Falls we had afternoon tea and enjoyed the walk to the falls along the delightful spring fed stream.

Our thanks to David and Narelle for organising another most enjoyable Nats outing - another of those places to add to the list in the "Must return to" category, specially after heavy rain.

Outing to Doctor Roberts Waterholes - August 20th

After having two rather strenuous outings in the Warwick area in the last two months, and as my plans to visit a couple of the Warwick SGAP Member's gardens have been thwarted because the people will be unavailable. I have decided to visit Doctor Roberts waterholes instead.

In the 1920's Doctor Spencer Roberts of Stanthorpe urged the Queensland Government to establish a National Park in this area, and consequently this delightful section of permanent waterholes in Bald Rock Creek has been named in his honour. We should have the opportunity to see a wide variety of bird life along the creek banks and if lucky we may spot an *Ornithorhynchus anatinus* in the waterholes. At very least there should be a display of wildflowers including leucopogon, boronia, hovea acacia and phebalium, though with such a dry winter don't expect a brilliant display.

We will meet at Weeroona Park, Stanthorpe at the usual time of 9.00am and drive via Storm King Dam and Pyramids Road to the Dr Roberts Waterhole parking area. After morning tea we will walk to the creek and investigate the banks of the waterholes. The more energetic members may wish to go on to the Underground Creek before returning to have lunch on the granite slabs at the downstream end of the waterholes.

This will be a grade 2 walk, as the tracks have recently been upgraded, except for the Underground Creek walk, which is about grade 4.

After returning to the cars we will drive to a property adjacent to the National Park for afternoon tea and inspect the progress of the new Environmental Lodge under construction.
