

- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

August Outing Report - Dr. Roberts Waterholes, Girraween NP

After setting off from Weeroona Park a little after the scheduled time of 9.00am Our first stop was at a large tree beside Pyramids Road to view the beehive which is attached to a branch high above the road. The hive, of European bees, has been there for several years and has large 'shawls' of empty wax combs hanging from a branch.

We continued to the Parking area for Dr Roberts waterholes for morning tea, then set off down the track with the most noticeable wildflowers, the Coral Heath, *Epacris microphylla* and the occasional *Hovea heterophylla*. Soon after passing the turnoff to the Underground Creek we saw *Banksia spinulosa var.neoanglica*, which seems to always have flower spikes, the common Snowbush *Leucopogon melaleucoides*, a couple of straggly specimens of Rice Flower *Pimelea linifolia*, and the first few flowers open on a Starflower Daisy, *Olearia microphylla*. Continuing on to the edge of the waterholes we counted seven wattles in bloom, including Prickly moses *Acacia ulicifolia*, *A. ruppii*, *A. venulosa*, *A. adunca*, Sally wattle *A. floribunda*, *A. filicifolia*, and *A. pruinosa*. We made our way through the dense undergrowth to the large flags of granite at the downstream end

of the waterholes. This area provides a suitable microclimate at the edges of the rock for several showy wildflowers, which benefit from the run-off from even the lightest shower of rain. Seen here were *Leucopogon neoanglicus, Mirbelia speciosa, Micromyrtus sessilis, Zierea sp.* and *Hovea linearis.* The consensus then was to continue as a group across the creek, which was not even a trickle due to the dry weather, and walk upstream towards the underground creek. On the higher rocky slopes we saw *Phebalium rotundifolium*, with its bright yellow terminal flowers and characteristic pungent smelling leaves, which some people liken to cat's urine. There was also a Sarsaparilla, *Hardenbergia violacea*, with just the first few blooms appearing, and the ever-present Ten-corner, *Melichrus urceolatus*.

When we reached the creek, which had to be crossed to get back onto the Underground Creek track, the only options were to cross a log, or paddle through. Thanks to a gallant effort by Kris, who shed his shoes and stood in the freezing cold water well above his knees to assist people across, we all eventually reached the track, safe and dry. We had lunch at the Underground Creek, then explored the rock formations carved out by the rushing water of Bald Rock Creek, made much easier on this occasion, due to the lack of rushing water. Along the track, as we returned to the cars, we saw some very nice specimens of Wooly buttons, *Stenanthemum scortechinii*, and the first flowers open on a Mint bush, *Prostanthera phylicifolia*.

We had afternoon tea at the cars before driving through the National Park and on to inspect progress at the Girraween Environmental Lodge, which is under construction on a neighbouring property. We followed a track which has been constructed through the bush and rocks to access one of the Lodges and which also facilitates the provision of water, sewerage, power, television and telephone services. A feature of the Lodges is the use of recycled timber for some wall cladding and verandah flooring. We also took the opportunity, before heading home, to walk the track to a nearby ridge with some interesting balancing tors and views over the development to the Sphinx and Turtle Rock on the distant ridge to the south east.

Outing Report Quartpot Creek Walking Tracks Friday 1st September

A small group enjoyed the second of our weekday outings. We met at Weeroona Park at 11.30am, lunched at Apex Park and walked along Quartpot Creek up the walking track, Kingston Road, Sugarloaf road, Pioneers Parade, down the track back to Quartpot Creek at the small bridge that the Nats painted some years ago (and which needs painting again) for afternoon tea at Heritage park. We then separated, some to go home from there and the rest back to Weeroona Park. It was a very pleasant outing and quite some time since some of us had done that walk. We really enjoyed the relaxed atmosphere, the company and the area we covered. If you haven't been up that way at all or for some time, I'm sure you would find the walk well worth the time it takes and very easy walking.

The creek is barely running but there were some flowers struggling to survive in the drought conditions. We recorded 2 leucopogon species; 6 acacia species: a. granitica, a floribunda, a. adunca, a. fimbriata, a. nerifolia, a pruinosa; 2 hovea species, phebalium rotundifolium, stenanthemum scortechinii, and anguillaria dioica.

We saw and heard quite a few birds: superb blue wren (male and female), galah, crimson rosellas, eastern rosellas, kookaburras, pee wee, pied butcher bird (heard), willy wag tail, magpie, yellow rumped thornbill, silvereye, firetailed finch, banded lapwing, black duck, pied cormorant, dusky moorhen, purple swamphen. We also heard a whistler but couldn't identify it by its call.

Thanks to those who came and made the outing so enjoyable.

Outing to Amiens State Forest - September 24th



This walk will explore the granite slabs and wildflowers of the southern, eucalypt section of Amiens State Forest, west of Stanthorpe. A recent visit there by Liz Bourne found a proliferation of wildflowers - *Boronia granitica, Mirbelia speciosa, Hovea purpurea; Leucopogon sp.; Bossiaea sp.* as well as lots of *Acacia adunca* and *A. grantica* in flower - despite the dry conditions. The walk will depart from Sue Kenna's place off Sonego Lane so those members on the western side of town may care to meet there by 9.15am. For others interested in going on the outing, meet at Weeroona Park in Marsh Street at 9am.

The walk will be a reasonably strenuous one (Grade 7 - 8) as it is predominantly through rough bush and will involve a few steep climbs up the hills. However, we should be rewarded by good views from the granite slabs and plenty of wildflowers. If we should be lucky enough to actually have some rain (what's that?) before the outing, many of the creeks and cascades will also be very pretty. Should people be energetic enough, we can visit a gorge on one of the creeks where a family of powerful owls have been sighted. There is a wealth of interesting natural features to explore in this State Forest and where we go will depend on the fitness and interests of participants. However, we will aim to be back at the Kenna's place by 4pm. Bring your lunch, water bottle, camera, binoculars, hat and sunscreen and sturdy footwear.
