

- Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth. 8.
- Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth. 9.
- Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required. 10.

April Outing - Mt Norman

The Outing listed for this month is to Mt Norman on the 22^{nd.}

We will meet at Weeroona Park and depart at 9.00am to drive to the Lion's Park at Wallangarra, before continuing to the Mt Norman parking area for morning tea, where there is a picnic table and toilet facility. Members are welcome to travel to either of these places in their own time, rather than all travel in convoy down the highway. I expect to start the walk at about 10.00am.

Although the suggested walk is to Mt Norman, as leader I have decided instead to explore Mallee Ridge and beyond, as I feel this is a most interesting area both botanically and geologically, as well as photographically if we can strike a fine day. The ridge gets its name from the Mallee Gum, E. codonocarpa, and there are several specimens of the striking Wallangarra White Gum, E. scoparia, there as well. The rock formations resulting from weather eroded granite dykes are a special attraction and inspire ones imagination to see prehistoric monsters lumbering across the slopes.

We will have lunch in this area, with views across to the familiar Wyberba landmarks as well as towards Wallangarra and Tenterfield, and I expect to return to the cars by about 3.30pm. Most of the walking will be on open granite with a little scrambling over rocks and undergrowth, so I will have to rate it at 7, with more challenging alternatives if people are keen.

ARCOT CAMPOUT OUTING REPORT

Those of us who were able to go to Arcot were rewarded with a very enjoyable weekend. Several of us went out Friday afternoon and had a pleasant camp at the campsite. Apart from the fact that the green frogs had taken up residence in the chemical toilet all went well. We got the 'donkey' going and were able to enjoy bush showers. Although the creek was dry, there were many birds around for us to observe. It was a cool and quiet, delightful evening. By Saturday afternoon it was quite hot, so, instead of walking up to Wallaby Knoll, we went for a drive in the Rav 4 around the area, then came back to Wallaby Knoll. This has very interesting flora, being a vine scrub. Quite a lot of wonga vines had grown so big that they had pulled down the cypress they had grown on, with the result that both vine and tree had died. There were some trees in blossom with many noisy friar birds noisily enjoying the nectar. We also saw a dog, which looked very like a young dingo. We reported this to the owners.

Sunday we drove on Track 1 and then Track 22 of the many tracks around the property. The flora we drove through was mostly cypress and iron bark with melaleuca in the creek bed near the Shooters' Hut where we met up with the resident goanna. There are several small dams along the track. Track one, which is the easiest of their tracks takes you through the property and gives a very good idea of the flora. There are many very large prickly pear trees dotted over the area and quite a few acacia species as well as eucalypt and cypress trees. Track 22 branches off track 1 and runs along the top of a ridge with almost 360 degree views back to the east and west to the Texas area. It was well worth the drive for the magnificent views from "on top of the world".

The butcher bird gave us dinner music and the yellow everlastings gave colour. Butterflies hovered in the bushes with one being a strange one to me, being about 4cm across with black colour, blue/mauve spots on wings edged with small markings.

After a quiet walk to Quart Pot Creek boundary some of the group drove up Mt Marlay to finish a very enjoyable day.

Pre Outing Camp Out to Lanikai 5-7 May

Lanikai is a cattle property near the Clarence River approximately 2 hours from Stanthorpe. You travel to Tenterfield and follow the Casino Road until you are about 4kms before

Tabulum, where you turn left onto the Paddys Flat Road (also called the Pretty Gully Road). Lanikai is about 20 kms along this road.

Lanikai is a declared wildlife refuge and has several areas under management agreements as per the Native Vegetation Act. There is an undercover area with a barbecue, table and bush kitchen with hot water once the stove is lit. We can't use the right-hand drawer under the sink because the antichinus have a nest there. The toilets have character. They are long drop toilets and the white ants have attacked the walls somewhat, but privacy is secured by the hessian lining. The shower block is clean and sturdy and has a heating system for which the fire has to be lit.

On our pre-outing in October we saw 47 species of birds, grey kangaroos, paddymelons, wallabies and a koala. The paddymelons and wallabies frequent the camping ground, as do a number of birds. The site of an old dairy is close to the camping ground and very interesting to explore. We stood under a mango tree and watched a whip bird and rufous fantail.

On Saturday morning we will set up camp, and in the afternoon walk to the creek where there is rainforest type of vegetation. There is a 1.5km return walk on the Grey Gum Ridge track, the uphill part being on the way back. There is a longer walk along the Dairy Gully Track, which is about 3km return, to another interesting pool on the creek. It depends on how people feel as to which walk we do. On both these walks there is evidence of the water race built in the 1880s to carry water to miners, approximately 9km long.


On Sunday we will leave the camping ground at 9.00am to travel to the Reserve, which is an area of rainforest, with a short easy walk. From there we will travel to Lanikai homestead to spend some time in the garden which is quite beautiful. The next stop is Paddy's Flat where the road crosses the Clarence River. There is heaps of sand and shallow water. Close by there is an old graveyard which is worth a look. There was a beautiful pink autumn crocus in bloom when we were there (it had its seasons mixed). We will take smoke and lunch for the day, and return to camp in time for a barbecue tea.

Monday morning's excursion will be by vehicle to an area on the track down to the Clarence, where there is an impressive stand of grass trees. If there are sufficient interested and competent four wheel drivers we may be able to drive down to the Clarence. It is very steep and definitely a dry weather track only. After lunch we will pack up and come home.

If you are interested could you please let us know, so that we can give the owners approximate numbers. The cost is \$7.00 per adult per day, and \$4.00 per child under 12.


Specimens:
