

- 3. Track, some hilly sections.
- Track, some steep sections.
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes.
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps.
- Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth.
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth.
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth.
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

Bute - The Unexplored Isle

Bute lies in the Firth of Clyde, tucked in under the Argyll mainland on the Western side of Scotland. It is 24 km long and from 5 - 8 km wide and has a population of approximately 7500.

Two ferries enable you to get on/off the island. One crosses from Rhubodoach on Bute to Colintraive on the mainland at the northern end of the island. This is the shortest ferry in Europe and takes 5 minutes. The main ferry is from Rothesay on Bute to Wemyss Bay from where you catch the train to Glasgow. This ferry ride takes 35 minutes with another 35 minutes by train to Glasgow.


My niece Judith lives at Port Bannatyne on the Isle and I spent nearly 2 months with her in 2001. While there I visited many places on Bute as well as some in Scotland. I was fascinated by the scenery and the history. I learned that, for many years, the "Western Isles" were ruled by the King of Norway as they had been conquered by the Vikings.



Pre Outing Report 24th March to Cliff Mountain Leader Glenn Crossman

Stanthorpe members will meet at Weeroona Park in Stanthorpe at the usual time of 9.00am and travel to Liston, where we will meet at the park at Liston at 9.30am, for the outing to Cliff Mountain on Sunday 24^{th} March. It is a short drive to Lindesay View air-strip where we will have morning tea, then we will pile into 4WD and high clearance vehicles for another short drive. Then there is a 5-10 minute walk (grade 2-3) to the top of Cliff Mountain. We will carry our lunch with us.

There are several spots where you can look out over Rivertree and we can spend some time exploring the escarpment. The Potanin family have built some memorials to loved ones at the top of the mountain and there is also a basic picnic spot. We will find our way back to the airstrip in time for afternoon tea.

Friday Outing to Lyra March 1st 2002

A small group of Nats and friends enjoyed a ramble up Bald Rock Creek adjacent to Brian McDonagh's property on our March Friday outing.

We drove up to the top boundary of the property and, after lunch at the cars, moved up Bald Rock Creek into that area of Girraween National Park. Very few flowers were seen (or expected to be seen at this time of the year), but the blackthorn (wait a while) was in full bloom, mostly in the creek bed.

This outing was mostly a "haven't been here before" and a bird watching exercise and was enjoyed by all. We moved up the creek a little distance and used our eyes and binoculars. Those in the group who had not seen the yellow tufted honeyeater before were impressed by this small bird's beauty. After returning to the cars and, of course, afternoon tea, some of us drove right around the boundary of the vineyard before we headed for home – some via the Bramble Patch.

One of my visitors made this comment – "I've been to visit you many times – why haven't you brought me here before?" I think that sums up the beauty of this area of the district.

Outing Report:

Kris reported on the outing on 24 February led by John Allison to the Wallangarra Railway Station and then on to Girraween National Park. A group of 10 left the Mt Norman carpark and headed towards Dr Roberts Waterhole where they got a lift back to the carpark. Group saw a robin redhead and an interesting variety of insects.

Next Outing:

This is planned for Sunday 24 March and will be led by Glen Crossman

The next Friday outing on 1 March will be led by Desley McDonagh to her brother's property at Lyra, leaving from Weeroona Park at 11.30am.

Specimens:

- 1. Kris Carnell had an ironbark beetle, Zopherosis georgei, and a longicorme beetle found on the outing on Sunday
- 2. He also had a plant like a Cape gooseberry with a purple flower which he found in his tomato patch and a burr which is not common in the Stanthorpe area. Rob McCosker said the burr was a tribulus or puncture vine which supposedly has aphrodisiac properties.
- 3. Liz Bourne had a specimen of Acacia uncinata collected at Messines. It flowers in January and has brilliant golden flowers in globular heads. According to Jean Harslett, this wattle is not common on the Granite Belt, being only found in the Messines area and at a site on Rangers Road, off the New England Highway on the road to Warwick.
- 4. Sue Allison had a new brochure on Kings Plains National Park in northern NSW

General Business:

- 1. David Oag's father, who had attended some club meetings while visiting Stanthorpe, had sadly passed away on 23 December, possibly as a result of snakebite. Our sympathies were extended to the family.
- 2. Desley reported on a bird watching trip with Geoff and Laraine Lawson to Storm King Dam where they saw 31 species of birds in two hours.

The meeting closed at 8.21pm and was followed by a fascinating slide presentation by Errol and Annette Walker of a canal boat trip taken on the canals of Wales.

Outing Report Mt Norman to Underground River 24th February 2002.

A small group of Nats set out in overcast weather to travel to Wallangarra railway station for the first part of our outing. The Heritage Centre was open that day, and a growers market was operating on the platform. As a dinkum border hopper, I found the Heritage Centre very interesting, and also stocked up with some fresh fruit and vegetables.

From Wallangarra most of us travelled to Mt Norman Picnic Area – the rest went on to Tenterfield to enjoy an open garden. After morning tea John Allison led us at a brisk pace along the Mt Norman track. We hadn't gone very far when someone picked up an unusual looking beetle, which Col later identified as an Ironbark Beetle *Zopherosis georgei*. The one we found was dull brown with deep pits and prominent tubercles on its upper surface.

We turned off the Mt Norman track along a fire trail where we had an excellent view of the Eye of the Needle. There were not masses of wildflowers in bloom, but a large number of different plants had some flowers. We stopped to look at some galls on the mistletoe, and a dianella flower, which was distorted by galls. A striking green and black weevil was seen on a bush. The walking became more strenuous when we turned off the fire trail to climb a rocky ridge where we had lunch. Although we did not see a lot of birds on the outing, we were delighted to see a robin redbreast and a wedgetailed eagle while we were having lunch.

There was also the remains to a stick nest on one of the rocks. We wondered if it was a hawk's nest.

After lunch we continued across country towards the Aztec Temple where we spent some time exploring and clambering about. It is a fascinating area. On the way Col found a female mountain grasshopper on the ground. It didn't look much like an ordinary grasshopper at all. The hind wings are absent and it raised its shell like fore wings (with a little encouragement) to reveal bright red and blue bands on the abdomen.

There were hundreds of green and yellow beetles on the grass beside the track on the way down towards the creek, some of them mating. We saw a white faced heron in the creek which seemed to be having some difficulty in flying. The Underground River was very low, not running at all, but there was water for the wrens and other birds we saw there. Col had left his ute at the car park, so we all piled in to go back to the Mt Norman car park to pick up our vehicles. On the way we saw a quail thrush and firetailed finches.

Thank you John for a most enjoyable outing.
