SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat walking, road or track
- 2. Road or track, gentle hills
- 3. Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle stopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

Outing to Coolmunda Conservation Park Sunday 24th August 2003

The August outing will be to Coolmunda Conservation Park near Inglewood. The park covers approximately 89 ha of sandstone country adjacent to Coolmunda Dam and has a good variety of heath-type plants, which hopefully will be in flower. It also contains a rare ironbark, Eucalyptus virens.

It is suggested we meet at 10am at the Coolmunda Dam picnic area (tables and toilets) for smoko and then proceed to the park, about 5 minutes by car. Members may like to car pool from the dam in any 4WD vehicles, as the road verge is fairly steep to the parking area. After a walk around the area we can return to the dam picnic area for lunch and members can either look around that area or return to the park after lunch and then make their own way back to Stanthorpe.

Directions: - from Stanthorpe proceed along the Stanthorpe/Inglewood road (via Pikedale) to the junction with the Texas Road at Greenup. Turn left, proceed approximately 4 km and turn right into Tobacco Road. Go a further 4km along Tobacco Road until you pass the park and then turn right at a Coolmunda Dam picnic area sign. Cross the beginnings of the MacIntyre and turn right into the picnic ground near the dam wall. Distance from Stanthorpe is about 90km.

1. Storm King Dam

2. Goomburra Valley

David Wilson reported on his outing to the Goomburra Valley on 20 July. 17 people went on the trip which involved a walk to Araucaria Falls before lunch followed by an afternoon walk to the escarpment lookouts.

3. Next Friday Outing – Nur dubbermere Falls
This will be on the 1 August and will be led by Dave Bright. He said they will go to the upper falls and he anticipated that it would be a maximum of 3km.

4. Friday Outing in September

This will be on the 5th September and will be to Tom Minch's mine at Dalveen and will be led by Archie Cameron. The meeting place will be Jim Mitchell Park at Dalveen.

5. Next Outing – 24th August

The proposed outing to the Pierries Kange requires rurner investigation so trip reader, refer masergrove is proposing instead to go to the Coolmunda Conservation Park, on the shores of the Coolmunda Dam near Inglewood. This is a sandstone area and there

should be lots of wildflowers out by then. The proposed meeting place will be the Picnic Area at 10am and the Park is 5mins drive away.

Outing Report to Goomburra State Forest – Sunday 20 July 2003

Under a partially cloudy sky, a small collection of cars departed Jackie Howe Park in Warwick for the outing to Goomburra State Forest. With more joining us at the state forest picnic ground, a total of 17 settled down to the customary cuppa before tackling the drive and walk to Araucaria Falls.

After driving up the mountain, all started the walk, no doubt contemplating how a 3km walk could take two hours return. The early part of the walk was through fairly dense rainforest, much of it regrowth from the past forestry days. As the track continued, the descent changed increasingly from the horizontal to the vertical. A few walkers started to drop off the end of the line as the somewhat precarious descent to the falls made discretion the wiser course.

Around a dozen made it to the end of the track where Araucaria Falls, drop into a small pool surrounded by cliffs. The small catchment means that the falls rarely have much flow, except after heavy rain. At these times, the descent would certainly be an adventure.

Shortly before returning to the cars, we paused to admire a pale mauve coral fungus growing on the track. Minutes later, we settled down to a relaxing lunch with magnificent rainforest giants standing guard.

Two short walks after lunch provided breathtaking views. The first was the short walk to the recently rebuilt Sylvester's Lookout. This walk through pristine rainforest gives meaning to the phrase, a living cathedral. At the lookout, we were greeted by the stunning panorama of the Fassifern Valley and the Moogerah Peaks. The wind whipping up from the valley floor reminded us that it was still winter.

The final walk of the day was to the Castle Rock Lookout. The afternoon sun made the imposing fortress of Mt Castle stand out proudly at the head of the Laidley Valley. The sun played hide-and-seek through the mosaic of gullies and ridges. In the far distance, the high-rise buildings of Brisbane could just be seen on the smoky horizon.

With the day growing short, we retraced our steps to the cars and returned to the picnic ground for a well-earned cuppa. The park was to provide one more surprise. Some observant Nats in Kris's party had noticed numerous orchids growing in and around the cuttings along the descent. A few of us returned to investigate further. In one tree, the leaves of a *Dendrobium aemulum* were located. Growing in the cuttings were

numerous greenhoods (*Pterostylis curta*). They were prolific, with one small patch of less than a square metre containing around thirty specimens in various states of growth.

With the sun by now low on the horizon, the last duty of the day was the drive home. All of us no doubt took memories of a pleasantly relaxing day in a wonderful corner of the Southern Downs.

Fungus on Goomburra Outing

We saw a number of different types of fungus on the Goomburra outing. The purple, branched fungus growing on the ground was probably *Ramaria fumigata*. Tony Young describes it in *Common Australian Fungi* as violet or purplish but sooty-brown with age, the tips remaining purple; extremely branched, crowded and compact; flesh white or creamy; may bruise reddish. Habitat: In dense clumps on soil amongst leaf litter.
