Outing to Mallee Ridge Sunday 25th July

The outing will be an all day walk to the Mallee Ridge south of Mt Norman. We will meet at the Mt Norman day use area at 9am, for those who don't know, travel to this area via Wallangarra, conventional vehicles OK.

This is a tough walk, Grade 9. We will head towards Mt Norman and up to the Mallee Ridge, then on to The Valley of The Winds, a special and remote area generally unknown, with ancient plantforms and spectacular views. Bring plenty of water, morning tea, lunch and lots of energy.

There will be an alternative to walk to the base of Mt Norman and environs. The wattle is in bloom and quite spectacular. This would be a Grade 4 on track.

Outing to Koreelah National Park 20th June 2004

Twenty Nats braved a chilly morning to meet at Queen Mary Falls for smoko. From there we drove throught the majestic gums of Carbeen Nature Reserve, past Carrs Lookout, The Head, and the abandoned Condamine Tick Gate to White Swamp Road, which parallels Koreelah National Park. There is a small, pleasant camp ground beside a large waterhole on Koreelah Creek, "dammed" by a small waterfall, just trickling. Crossing this, we followed the cliff tops for some distance, with views into a surprisingly deep gorge, and glimpses of another waterfall.

After a cold lunch break back near the cars, following the creek bed downstream (with some scrambling in two or three places) rewarded us with views of 30m high vertical cliffs. The double potholed waterfalls (one pothole in the process of breaking out on its lower side) stopped all but three people, who scrambled to the bottom for photos.

A short detour up a side gorge revealed two delightful spa-sized potholes, which evoked cries of "we will return" (in warmer weather). After a quick smoko, we headed homewards by different routes (two cars having left earlier), after a pleasant day.

I would like to add a few observations to the plant and bird lists for this outing.

One interesting thing we saw was a meat ants' nest with dark pieces of stick and charcoal covering it to keep the nest warm for the winter. The ants were fairly sluggish but quite a number came out to investigate us.

While walking back along the cliff top we were spellbound, watching at least six grey fantails hovering in the air feeding on insects. They flew around our heads almost within touching distance, while a pair of willy wagtails fed on the ground nearby. In the same area we found evidence of Black Cockatoos which had been feasting on grubs, that they had removed from the trunks and branches of the trees, in some cases "chopping" the tree right off. Some of the holes left by the grubs were as thick as a man's thumb.

We saw a wanderer butterfly and a termite nest in the branches of a tree.

Book Review - Spiders of Australia

Did you know there are about 2000 species of spider in Australia? I found that out by

reading green guide to Spiders of Australia by Terence Lindsey which was given to us. We have found it to be a very interesting and useful book. The photos are very clear and the text easy to read, which makes it easy to identify the spider you've found, or at least its family. I was able to identify the one that bit me on the finger a few years ago as a badge spider, which is thought to have a dangerous bite. I know that it was weeks before my finger returned to its normal size although that was the only symptom I had.

The book is divided into sections such as *Ancient Spiders* (this includes the funnelweb), Roving Hunters, Sit-and Wait Spiders, Snare Makers and Web-weavers. There is also a checklist of Australian spiders. Altogether a book worth having. - *Margaret Carnell*

- 1. Margaret Carnell had leaves from a velvety shrub seen on the Koreelah outing which had shiny black berries and bell-shaped, mauve flowers. Jean Harslett though it might be *Keraudrenia integrifolia*. Margaret also reported that 16 flower and 13 bird species were seen on the outing. 15 bird species were seen on the way home via Legume, including 6 grey fantails feeding in the air above some cliffs.
- 2. Jean Harslett had a dead Indian mynah bird from Ross McCorquadale's property at Crystal Mountain. She also reported that the lizards she had brought to the last meeting had been identified by the Museum as the western form of the skink, *Ergenia cuninghamii*.
