

Outing to Mt. Bullaganang Sunday 22nd August

Leaders: Peter & Lynette Haselgrove

The August outing will be to Mt. Bullaganang, a granite hill intruded into traprock near Coolmunda Dam. We will meet at Glen Rosa Station and proceed in vehicles to the north-eastern side of the mountain and then walk approximately 3 km of reasonably easy grade to the top. The return trip will be a shorter, steeper more direct rout. Whilst the top is timbered, views can be obtained of Coolmunda Dam, Fishhole Mountain and country in between. Scale of difficulty for the day is 7-8. Leave Weeroona Park at 8.30 am, getting to Glen Rosa by about 9.30am. We will have smoko either at Glen Rosa homestead or the car parking area and be prepared for lunch on top of Bullaganang. The whole walk should take about 3-4 hours. As there is quite a bit of Melichris about it would be advisable to wear long trousers.

Road directions:- travel along Texas Road to Pikedale. Take the Inglewood road and after 25km turn left into Soldier Settlement Road. Glen Rosa is approx. 6 km down this road, on the right. Turn in over the grid to the house.

Hopefully Rod Cameron of Glen Rosa will be able to join us on the walk.

Outing to Orana Friday 3rd September

We will meet at Weeroona Park at 9:00am and travel about 12 kilometres to our property at 374 Back Creek Road, Severnlea. We will carry smoko and walk along fire trails, over the creek and up the side of the mountain to a stand of Eucalyptus caleyii (Cayley's Ironbark). There are a few steep parts, but we can take it slowly so it should not be too difficult. After inspecting the E calevii we will cross to an outcrop of granite where we will get good views of the valley, and hopefully see some wildflowers. The track to this outcrop is just a track, not a mowed fire trail. We will stop for smoko here.

After smoko we will continue uphill for a distance and then turn off to a very pretty waterhole (supposing there is some water). We have seen rufous fantails in this area. We will return along the same track to the creek, and then take a short diversion along the side of the creek before returning to the house, where we will have lunch in the garden. The area along the creek is protected because of the $\frac{2}{3}$

Eucalyptus blakleyii and associated understory. There are Happy Valley Bottlebrush and Senna odorata growing along the creek (not in bloom at present). I would rate the outing at about 4 on the scale of difficulty.

Outing Report to Mallee Ridge Sunday 25th July

Nine people braved the elements for the day's outing to Mallee Ridge and Mt Norman environs. The wind was strong and very cold. Four of the most adventurous headed up on the Mallee Ridge and on to the "Valley of the Winds", with only two achieving the goal. The wind was so cold that some of us decided to retreat to the lower areas on the approaches to Mt Norman and then head back to the cars. The Mallee Ridge has interesting dyke formation and large boulders, well worth another visit.

The botanically inspired group had a very fulfilling day with a number of species recorded from the various islands of vegetation crisscrossing the approaches to Mt Norman. Interesting to note was the Dwarf Cypress Pine or Callistris monticola, the pink tinged Mousebush, and the Rock She-oak or Allocasurina rupicola. On the ridge was Eucalyptus condonocarpa or Bell-fruited Mallee, hence the name Mallee Ridge. Jean also pointed out a rare Stringybark. Other eucalypts noted were E. scoparia or Wallangarra White Gum, E. prava (or Bancroftii), E. andrewsii or Western New England Blackbutt. On the Wallangarra side of the gate, there was a Eucalyptus bridgiesiana on which was growing a mistletoe Noeothixos sub aureus on a pendulata mistletoe.

Banksia spinulosa var Neo Anglica, Acacia adunca or Wallangarra Wattle, Acacia ulicifolia var ulicifolia or Prickly Moses, Acacia latisepala, Blue Mountain Daisy, Leucopogon juniperinus, Pimelia linifolia or Queen of the Bush, Cassinia quinquefaria or Dead Finish, Mirbelia speciosa and the valley Prosanthera saxicola. Also seen in bud were Phebalium ambiens or Fruit Salad Plant, Acacia venulosa or Woolly Wattle, Prosanthera lasianthos, Hovea, Melichrus, Homeranthus papillatus or Mouse Bush, Kennediana.

Wildflower Walk – 12th September

Members of the Stanthorpe Field Naturalist Club have been working with the World Wide Fund for Nature, the Stanthorpe Shire Council and the Granite Borders Landcare Committee on a project to help protect the rare wildflower heritage of the Granite Belt.

This region contains some unique flora and every spring displays an incredible array of native wildflowers, providing an important attraction for tourists and nature lovers. Some of these wildflowers are found in very few other locations, many are rare and some are threatened by land clearing, grazing impacts, altered fire regimes and invasive weeds. While some of these plants are conserved in local national parks, many are found outside these areas and have little or no protection.

As part of efforts to raise public awareness about these plants, the Club and the Granite Borders Landcare Committee will be hosting a field day to Amiens State Forest on Sunday 12 September. This is aimed at showing interested local residents and visitors some of the rarer plants in the district.

All Club members with an interest in learning more about our local flora are most welcome to come along. The meeting place will be in Weeroona Park in Marsh Street, Stanthorpe at 10.00am where we will try and organise some car pooling. From here, it is about a 20 minute drive to the forest west of Stanthorpe. People should bring along a hat, water and their lunch. There will be some off-track walking and scrambling amongst boulders and slabs to get to the best wildflower areas, although there may also be some track options available. We will finish about 1.00pm unless some wish to continue on for a longer period.

Specimens:

The Granite Belt Naturalist August 2004 Vol. 361

1. Jean Harslett reported she had received a phone call from a Stanthorpe Shire Council officer concerning roadworks at the corner of Barker's and Cannon Creek roads where a small population of *Acacia glaucocarpa* existed. Only a few examples of this species are found in the district. Jean visited the site and, as a result, the Council subsequently identified the remaining plants and marked them off to protect them from the roadworks.

2. Jean also had photos from the outing to Girraween.

3. Col Hockings had some photos of Acacia adunca in flower from Sunday's outing.

4. Liz Bourne reported she had seen a rufous bettong (rat kangaroo) that day in an open forest area west of Ipswich. This species was generally confined to the coastal areas although she had heard of a report of one being seen near Dalveen.

5. Rob McCosker had various pamphlets and posters on native and introduced freshwater fish that he would put in the club library.

The meeting closed at 8.12pm and was followed by a slide programme from Rob McCosker on highlights of a trip to Perth as well as central coastal New South Wales.
