

### **Outing Reports:**

#### 1. Friday 5th November outing to Gasparin's

This outing was led by Millie Marsden and visited a rocky hill on the Gasparin's property, a short distance east of Stanthorpe. Ten people went along on this walk and were rewarded with a very good display of wildflowers and lots of interesting slabs and boulders. It was considered interesting enough for a full day's outing. Millie asked that a letter of thanks be sent to the landowners.

#### 2. Sunday 21st November outing to Koreelah National Park

Fifteen people went on this outing. Although it rained on the way there, it had stopped by the time the park was reached. After smoko, people walked down the south side of the gorge to below the falls. The creek was then crossed and the group climbed up the other side and back to the cars for lunch.

2. Wildflower Walk to Girraween Environmental Lodge

Liz Bourne reported that the last wildflower walk to Girraween Environmental Lodge on 14 November was very well attended. One of the highlights of the day was discovering *Callistemon pungens* (a vulnerable species) growing in a gully to the south of the lodge. It had not been recorded either here or in the adjacent national park before.

The meeting closed at 8.21pm and was followed by a slide programme from the Carnells on national parks within four hours of Stanthorpe.

We will stop along the way for morning tea at the picnic area in the Girard State Forest, before continuing to Drake, where we turn left on Cheviot Hills Road and proceed to the mine office on Bunijah Road.

People wishing to look at the mine workings will need to wear sturdy (leather) boots and a hard hat, and travel in a high clearance vehicle. Please contact me if you have trouble getting a hard hat, I might be able to find some spares. Our contact at the mine is John Fitch, who will show us the mine workings and hopefully the work done by Virotec with their Bauxal product, to remedy toxic chemical problems in the tailings dam. (*Note re hard hats – Kris can supply 12*)

After leaving the mine we will return to Drake, continue east along the highway to turn right into Long Gully Road and proceed to the Long Gully Rest Area for lunch. We will then continue along the Rocky River Road and if weather and time permit we will stop for a swim in the river before returning to Tenterfield via the Billarimba Road.

Please note that a lot of this trip will be on narrow, winding gravel roads which are unfenced, so take care with wandering stock, keep a suitable distance behind the car in front to minimise dust and keep the car behind you in sight particularly at turn-offs. Total distance is about 280km.

### Outing to Gasparin's Hill on 5th November 2004

Ten folk gathered to explore Gasparin;s Hill on 5-11-04. It was a dull morning with a promise of rain when we arrived at the Norcross property, which afforded us access to the mountain.

Mr Norcross told us that, as far as he could gather, there had not been a bush fire in the area for close to a hundred years. As we began the ascent, this was thought to be the case as the ground was fairly well covered with stick and leaf litter. From the very beginning of the climb, there was an excellent array of flowers. The climb was over and around boulders and fairly steep, so progress was fairly slow. A grove of flannel flowers delighted us.

Maps of the surrounding properties were pored over by the men in the group and we eventually made our way to wonderful slabs of granite. Flowers were many and much admired and the identification of these made our progress slow. (Actually it gave us time to catch our breath before the next obstacle course.)

Our morning tea stop was atop a wonderful granite slab running toward the west. From this vantage point we identified local homes and properties, various hills and mountains of the district, and viewed with joy the rain which was approaching from the west. As the granite slabs were steep and the ground cover deep, we decided we should get to level ground as quickly as possible. The rain did keep coming and we got slightly damp, but the rain was most welcome.

We did not get to the exact rock slab which was my original destination, but it was a most rewarding morning. This area is well worth closer scrutiny and we will do some more research and try again.

Mr Norcross was pleased we had chosen the area for our outing and I was impressed to see that he mows around some areas of native plants and has other small areas protected with rustic fencing. It is good to see that more people are appreciating the native vegetation.
