Outing Report - 3rd Crossing of the Severn River - 23rd January

By the time we got to the swimming hole, the birds had also decided it was too hot and, apart from some cormorants, there was not a lot to see. Liz had a swim in the tepid water, which was only partially refreshing while Glenn added a few more birds to his list.

Just before midday, the skies darkened and the lightning started to crack so we decided to head back to the car before we got caught in a storm. With the promise of rain, the birds all decided to come out again so it was quite an interesting return trip. The storm did not eventuate over us but when I got home was lucky enough to get a downpour that delivered 27mm.

February Outing Report

First my apologies for not being able to visit the Drake gold mine as published in the Newsletter. I heard only 5 days before the outing that the caretaker would not be available for the weekend. In spite of this setback 16 people turned up to investigate some of the features of the Girard State Forest.

After meeting at Tenterfield, and one vehicle being pulled over for a Breathalyser Test, we continued down the Bruxner Highway to the Crooked Creek Rest Area for morning tea. Col produced a pair of hand held radios for the lead and tail end cars to keep in contact, after I explained the concern of keeping the vehicle behind in sight while driving through the forestry, so we could then at least all get lost together. Which we did. Well I should say we were geographically embarrassed, as I set off to follow Bowerbird Road to McLeod's Creek Road then on to the Rhodes Flats falls. Unfortunately by taking a wrong turn we arrived back on the Highway a few k's west of where we started. We decided then to continue back along the highway to McLeod's Creek Road, and in doing so have the opportunity of seeing some of the lush pasture paddocks and the lonely grave beside the road, of young Joseph Barker of Norfolk England, dated 1864-1889.

When we reached the creek crossing where we hoped to park to walk to the falls we were met by a barking dog and bearded gent who refused to allow us through the private property to access the falls, as the owner was not home. After more map consultation we decided to turn around and attempt to locate the Fire Tower shown on the maps. The fire trail we followed was a little overgrown but passed through some lovely rainforest before rising to the cleared hilltop with the fire tower and a



communications tower. Although the day was very hazy we could make out a peak to the north-east, which is Mt Warning according to the info on the Forestry Map. From here it was a short drive past the disused forestry headquarters building back to the Crooked Creek Rest Area where we stopped for lunch.

Back on the highway after lunch, we continued through Drake to turn into Long Gully Road. This road descends through a section of the Girard State Forest, which is also a delightful

Outing to the Condamine Gorge

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The outing on Sunday 20 March will be a less strenuous day than some of the more traditional outings organised by we Warwick members. It provides an opportunity to enjoy some of the more civilized areas around the Warwick Shire.

Stanthorpe members will depart from Weeroona Park at 8:00 to meet up with the Warwick members at Jackie Howe Park. The park is located on the north side of Warwick just past the Mobil garage. We will depart from there at 9:00 for a leisurely drive to Killarney via the Freestone Valley and Yangan. The drive through the Condamine Gorge will require four-wheel drives to negotiate the eighteen or so river crossings.

We will travel back to Killarney along the Spring Creek Road. There are several points of interest along this road. The Moss Gardens is a 200m walk through rainforest veiled in lichen. Carr's Lookout is one of the best lookouts you will see in Southern Queensland with views into the Head Valley and across to Mt Superbus. Some people may like to lunch or snack at the Carr's Lookout Café.

The planned lunch spot will be Queen Mary Falls. After lunch, some may choose to do the circuit walk to the bottom of the falls. This is easily completed in around an hour.

From there, we will continue back towards Killarney, stopping at Daggs Falls and finally Browns Falls. There is a rough 15-20 min walk up the creek to the falls.

The success of this day will depend on the weather. If there is heavy rain, the gorge will not be attempted. On the other hand, the many falls are a spectacle after heavy rain.

General Business:

1. Proposed Book on Wildflowers of the Granite Belt

The Stanthorpe Rare Wildflower Consortium (of which the club is a member), has been investigating the need for a book covering the flora of the Granite Belt. Paul Donatiu from the World Wide Fund for Nature explained to the meeting about his involvement with the Queensland Museum's production of a book on the flora of South East Queensland. They could be interested in a similar book on the granite flora but would require some outside financial assistance before beginning production. It had been suggested that the Field Naturalist Club make an application from the Gaming Machine

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Community Development Fund for this money. Paul was asked to provide further information and more detailed costings of what would be involved in the production of such a book and present this at a future meeting.

The meeting closed at 8.26pm and was followed by a slide programme from David Wilson of trips he had made to central Australia.
