

## Pre-Outing Report – Jibbinbar 21st August

Leader: Peter Haselgrove

Meet at Weeroona Park at 8.30am. Proceed along Texas Road to Springdale Rd turnoff. Go along Springdale Road, past Peak Vale Station. Cross old pipe grid in road and go a further 4km approx. where we will meet you at the Jibbinbar turnoff at about 9.30am. We then drive in for about 1km to a locked gate. This might be the place to have morning tea and organise everyone into 4WD vehicles for the remaining 5km into the park. If the weather is good we can have lunch on top of Jibbinbar. Bring lunch and water.

Jibbinbar is a granite intrusion with heath vegetation and hopefully with the rain and warm weather there should be some interesting things flowering. Of special interest are <u>Homoranthus montanus</u> and <u>Macrozamia occidua</u>, species with very restricted distribution.

# **Outing to Amiens Forest – Thursday 1 September**

(please note the change of date from the usual Friday)

The outing will leave from Weeroona Park in Marsh Street at 10.00am and travel out to the Amiens Forest (approx. 20 mins west of Stanthorpe). The outing will be through the eucalypt and heathland section of this forest where there is usually a good diversity of plant and birdlife to be seen. There should be a profusion of wildflowers out after the winter rain, so bring along your cameras and plant books.

After having smoko at the cars, we will walk through the bush onto some rock slabs, which have good views to the south, and follow these through some heath areas where some of the best wildflowers occur. This will be reasonably easy, off-track walking, with a gentle climb to start us off. We'll aim to have lunch somewhere with a view. Depending on the interests and fitness level of those in attendance, we can either return to the cars via a track or go cross country through the boulders. We should be back at the cars by 2.00pm.

Bring along your smoko, lunch, water, camera and binoculars. If it happens to be rainy, call me by 9.00am to confirm whether the walk will still be on.

#### **Report on July Outing to Sundown – McAllister Creek**

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Fine weather greeted the 18 members who met for the outing, which was postponed from last month because of rain. We left Stanthorpe at 9.00 and arrived at the Broadwater Camping area soon after 10.00am for morning tea and a chat with Park Ranger Peter and wife Lynette.



We set off to cross the Severn River and concerns of having to wade through icy water were unfounded as, although there was a flow, it disappeared into the gravelly river bed below the waterhole. Controlled burns in this area made walking much more pleasant than our pre-outing in early May, and the recent rain had promoted fresh green growth which was being enjoyed by the numerous kangaroos and wallabies. A couple of deer were seen as we started up McAllister Creek and feral pig diggings were seen along the creek bank. On the pre-outing there were only about three waterholes in the creek but on this trip we followed a babbling brook with several pretty waterfalls, which cascaded into large clear pools. The amount of water made the going much slower than I had anticipated, as we had to negotiate pools that weren't there previously. As we neared Split Rock falls, three (more energetic) souls went on ahead with the aim of reaching Twin Falls further upstream, a couple of (less energetic) people decided to wait there, while the rest of us continued to the falls.

The last climb to the bottom of Split Rock falls took a little gentle coaxing around some interesting narrow ledges to test our nerves, but those who made it thought the experience was worth while.

We had lunch downstream a little from the falls and were joined by the others who had made it to Double Falls. They were suitably impressed and had the proof on their digital camera. We returned down the creek to the river but this time had to negotiate the stepping stones above the waterhole at the Broadwater to reach the cars at about 3.00pm for afternoon tea.

I would like to say that that was the end of an enjoyable and incident free day but unfortunately that was not the case, as we left two people behind, who became quite lost for some considerable time. Mario and Linda were a little behind the group as we reached the clearing near the Broadwater and were seen walking in a northerly direction. At this time they were quite disoriented and they continued in this direction, following the River upstream for about an hour before realising they were alone, and returned to the clearing to wait for someone to find them. Unfortunately, we presumed that they had gone off to look at the Permanents Waterhole and would return in their own time, so after a cuppa we all headed for home. Fortunately Mario and Linda eventually found there way back to their vehicle, after a lengthy distressing time in unfamiliar territory and the possibility of having to spend a cold night in the bush. I am very sorry for the distress they have suffered and take full responsibility as leader.

This incident highlights the need for outing leaders to be aware of the whereabouts of all members of their group, and never presume where they are. At the end of the day we must be certain to leave with the same number of people we started with.

## First Spring Wildflower Walk – Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> September

Members of the Stanthorpe Field Naturalist Club have been working with the World Wide Fund for Nature, the Stanthorpe Shire Council and the Granite Borders Landcare Committee over the last couple of years on a project to help protect the rare wildflower heritage of the Granite Belt.

This region contains some unique flora and every spring, displays an incredible array of native wildflowers, providing an important attraction for tourists and nature lovers. Some of these wildflowers are found in very few other locations, many are rare and some are threatened by land clearing, grazing impacts, altered fire regimes and invasive weeds. While some of these plants are conserved in local national parks, many are found outside these areas and have little or no protection.

As part of efforts to raise public awareness about these plants, the group will be hosting a wildflower walk to Amiens State Forest on Sunday 11 September. This is aimed at showing interested local residents and visitors some of the rarer plants in the district. This forest contains a number of rare and threatened species, including the granite boronia (*Boronia granitica*), *Acacia latisepala, Westringia amabilis* and *Allocasuarina rupicola*.

All club members, families and friends with an interest in learning more about our local flora are most welcome to come along. The meeting place will be in Weeroona Park in Marsh Street, Stanthorpe at 9.30am where will try and organise some car pooling. From here, it is about a 20 minute drive to the forest west of Stanthorpe. People should bring along a hat, water and their lunch. There will be some off-track walking and scrambling amongst boulders and slabs to get to the best wildflower areas, although there may also be some track options available. We will finish about 1pm unless some wish to continue on for a longer period.

There will be two further walks being organized by the group. On 9 October, the walk will be to the Harslett's property at Amiens and on 13 November it will go to Girraween National Park.
