- 4. Track, some steep sections
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

Outing Report Billyrimba Falls and 4 Bull Creek 19th February 2006

Leaders: Kris & Margaret Carnell

An enthusiastic group left Weeroona Park at 8.00am to travel to Tenterfield where we met up with some more of our members and a few people from Tenterfield Field Nats. We travelled past the Tenterfield water supply and were amazed at the number of black swans and other birds on the water. We didn't have time to stop to birdwatch on the way to Billyrimba Falls, and it was too late when we returned. Further along the road we saw a kingfisher, rosellas, a kestrel, a black-faced cuckoo shrike, as well as a flock of Richard's pipits.



We all successfully negotiated the track to the falls, passing some large specimens of Solanum (Kangaroo Apple) beside the track and admiring a staghorn or elkhorn. Our first task on arriving at the end of the track, and top of the falls, was to have morning tea, then scramble down to look over the top of the falls, or explore upstream and cool our feet in the creek, as we felt inclined. Col and Andrew went to the bottom of the falls where they took photos of the drop. They were rather hot and bothered by the time they climbed back up.

There was a large tree of Banksia integrifolia growing across the creek, and a small much-photographed one on the side on which we arrived. While looking at a rainforest type of tree, we noticed a fine specimen of a caterpillar, perhaps of a hawk moth. He was a very handsome fellow, with a spike on his tail, and he kept the photographers busy for a while. On the rocks in this area we found

Dendrobium speciosum, Dendrobium pugioniforme (Dagger Orchids) and Dendrobium kingianum (Pink Rock-orchid), along with two species of Bulbophyllum (Pineapple orchids). There were trigger plants in bloom and a few flowers on the hibbertias.

On the way back from the falls we disturbed a wallaby and saw podolepsis and grass trees from the vehicle. After turning back onto the road we noticed a number of feral lilies growing beside the road. We passed through some patches of rainforest and saw some beautiful Sydney Blue Gums. On arrival at 4 Bull Hut we had lunch and explored the new and old huts and commented on the purple loosestrife

growing in the creek. We saw choughs on the ground and wedgetail eagles circling overhead. There were Spiranthese in bloom in front of the hut where we parked.

After lunch the Tenterfield people and Dell and Ian left us, and the rest of us drove a short distance to a creek crossing where we left the cars and admired a lovely stand of tree ferns across the creek from where we parked. We walked and scrambled over a wallaby



track to a hole in the creek where some of us stopped to cool our feet, while others continued on to the waterfall and a large swimming hole. Andrew braved the cold water to go for a swim and had a



shower under the waterfall, but didn't stay in for long. He said it was "invigorating".

Storm clouds were gathering and thunder was rumbling by this time, so we set off back to the vehicles and headed for home. We thought the 4 Bull Hut area would be an ideal place for a camp-out at some time.

Stanthorpe Bushcare Volunteers

Granite Belt Landcare coordinator Samantha Williams encourages people to go for a walk to Red Bridge because a few things are missing.

Stanthorpe Bushcare Volunteers, a keen group of locals, have been busy removing honeysuckle, blackberry, coreopsis and other weeds from the Red Bridge area.

The volunteers aim to improve natural bush areas throughout the Stanthorpe shire through weed and rubbish removal, as well as revegetation and rehabilitation work.

Ms Williams said with the Red Bridge area now starting to shape up, the group would soon be moving on to Mt Marlay.

"This is a great opportunity for people to get outside, get your hands dirty, have some fun and do something positive for your local environment", she said. "With the mornings being as beautiful as they have been, now is a great time to get out and join the other keen volunteers."

"It's very easy to join in – just meet the other volunteers at 8.30am any Monday morning in the Red Bridge area. You can stay for half an hour, an hour or as long as you like"

Volunteers are actively supported by Stanthorpe Shire Council in their endeavours and have also been assisted by the current Green Corps Team as it has been tackling some of the larger infestations in the district.

Pre-Outing Report – Our Back Paddock 19th March 2006

Leaders: Kris & Margaret Carnell

We will meet at Weeroona Park at 9.00am and travel to *Orana*, 374 Back Creek Road Severnlea, then we will don backpacks and walk across the creek to a slab of granite where we will have morning tea. If we are fortunate we may see variegated fairy wrens at the creek crossing.

From there we will travel in a southerly direction up through a saddle in the hills and follow the fire trail to our southern boundary behind the mountain. At this point we leave the fire trail to climb up the back of the eastern peak. Just over the crest there are granite slabs with views to Dalveen and west to the top of the Thorndale ridge. We will then walk a few hundred metres onto the western peak, up to some rocks, which are the highest point on our property. From there on a good day, we can see a peak in the Main Range, which we think is Wilson's Peak. A few hundred metres further on we will reach a point where we have views down Sundown Valley.

We will have lunch on the mountain at a suitable place and time. The trek home will be down the front of the mountain, looking at rock formations on the way, meeting up with the fire trails again about half way down. It is then a reasonably easy walk back to the house.

On the pre-outing there were a lot of grass seeds in the off track areas. While some of it is reasonably rough we will be taking it slowly and most Nats should be able to cope. The off track areas are rated at about 7 on the scale of difficulty. Anyone who does not want to do the rough part can amble back along the track to the house and make themselves at home. The trail will be clearly marked. You will need to carry morning tea, lunch and water.

Outing Reports:

1. Tenterfield Outing – 19 February

After meeting up with some members of the Tenterfield Nats in Tenterfield, the Stanthorpe members travelled on the Spirabo Forest Way to the Billyrimba Falls for smoko. A list of plants seen in this area was made to pass on to the national parks ranger and Col and Andrew climbed down to the bottom of the falls. A lot of *Banksia integrifolia* were growing in the area and plenty of trigger plants were in flower. A large caterpillar (possibly a hawksmoth) was seen. The group then travelled to visit the 4 Bull Hut for lunch and some later had a swim in nearby pools. A purple flowering plant (*Lythrum salicaria*) was growing here and lots of feral lilies were noticed growing beside the roadsides on the return trip.

2. Friday outings

There have been none this year, so far, and none planned for March due to a lack of volunteer leaders. The Tenterfield Nats. have invited us to visit the park which they are revegetating and constructing tracks in. This could be a possible venue for a Friday outing. Kris noted that there is now a 1.1km track to Thunderbolt's Cave off the Mt Lindesay Highway and there could be an outing to there in April.

3. 19 March outing – Carnell's place – Back Creek Road

The walk will be through the Carnell's property with smoko about 1km from the house. The walk will then ascend a hill via a fire trail and there may be views to Wilson's Peak from the top.

Next Meeting Program:

Dave Bright will give a presentation on his overseas trip to Alaska and parts of Europe.

Specimens:

- 1. Margaret Carnell had a sample of the purple flowering loose strife *Lythrum salicaria* seen on the weekend outing; and photos of an imperial blue butterfly and a moth found in a strawberry tree which had greenish, transparent wings.
- 2. Col Hockings had photos from the weekend's outing

General Business:

- 1. Kris said that, in future, the newsletter would be emailed to those who requested it.
- 2. Col said that the *Border Post* had not published the last Field Nats article submitted by them which meant that other people did not know about the outing and meeting.
- 3. Dave Bright said that the gardens established by the Field Nats. in Heritage Park were looking very unkempt with a lot of the original trees and shrubs having died. It was agreed that we should replant it in spring and also mulch it to try and prevent weed growth. Liz, Del and Ian will assess what species need to be replaced.

The Bushcare group working upstream on weed control and revegetation may be able to assist with the maintenance of this part of Heritage Park. Kris suggested they put an article in the next newsletter calling for volunteers to help them with their work

- 4. The planned May outing to Mt Superbus to be led by Dave Bright was discussed. As the trip is likely to be long and strenuous, Dave suggested camping on the Saturday at the old sawmill site in the upper valley of Emu Creek so there could be an early start. Dave will put an article in the next newsletter to gauge the interest of members in this outing.
- 5. Liz reminded members that there was a meeting about the distribution of Albert's lyrebirds that was to be held in the QCWA rooms the following night.

The meeting closed at 8.30pm and was followed by a very interesting (and historic) presentation from Glenys Mathison on her early days on Fraser Island.
