

Pre-Outing Report May 20th – Mt Prentice

Leader: Dave Bright

We will meet at Weeroona Park at 9 am. Proceed along Sugarloaf and south on Mt. Lindsay road. Travel approx 15 km and turn left into Joe Gasparin's property. Proceed 3km on farm tracks, most vehicles should be ok if dry but 4wd advisable, especially if wet. Smoko will be taken at the cars. It is only an easy, short walk to Mt. Prentice from here. After exploring the Mount we return to the vehicles for a 2km drive to another unnamed rock formation. Lunch can be left at the vehicles. From here we can return home, or if time allows pop into Boonoo Boonoo falls.

Pre-Outing Report – Birdwatching at *Pinaster*

We will meet at 9.00am at Weeroona Park and travel along Sugarloaf Road and turn into Gillbard Road. *Pinaster* (No.96) is approximately 1km on the right hand side. We will spend a quiet morning watching birds in the garden and along the creek. Bring morning tea.

Outing Report Red Rock Gorge -April 22nd



Fourteen Nats, including a visitor turned up for this outing which took us into Sundown National Park. After morning tea on the lookout platform, from where we were able to see the first quarter of the walk, ten of us clambered down to the rock pool, from where the waterfall (dry at present) normally drops down over the ninety metre high cliff. We continued along the top, keeping well clear of the often very crumbly edge, and enjoyed the view into the deep valley, with Mt Jibbinbar and The Brothers in the background.

On the far side, we were able

to go down the rock faces of the dry Shepherd's Creek Cascades. We had lunch above the three small, muddy rock pools, which were all that was left of the water. Several granite dykes can be seen throughout the whole of the Red Rock Gorge area. After lunch we came upon what little is left of the old hut erected during the time when mining was done sporadically in the area. A wash-out nearby is visited regularly by goats who like to lick the walls, perhaps for salt.

I could hardly believe it but, as we went a little further upstream, we nearly walked into the very same big and beautiful spider web that I'd seen the previous week on the pre-outing trip with David Bright. We admired the colourful occupant – the interesting looking spiky spider! Driving into the park and on the walk we saw around one dozen deer.

We walked back over the ridge that runs in a northerly direction, east of the valley. We descended down to the edge of the escarpment again and made our way back up the steep and rocky slope towards the car park, where Millie and Dulcie had been waiting patiently for us for the past five hours. On the way back we briefly stopped where the track descends down the main ridge and spotted Mt Marley and the outskirts of Stanthorpe, lit up by the setting sun.

On the pre-outing I'd had to hit the brakes suddenly to avoid driving over a medium sized carpet snake, lying half across the track. All efforts to get her to move off the track were to no avail, so with my left wheels in the gutter I managed to just get past, with my right wheels only 10cm from her. Even then, the snake continued to lift her head, hissing and pointing her tongue at me, and then she reluctantly backed off. So when you read about the behaviour of snakes, remember that not all snakes will have read that book as well!
