SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS



- 1. Flat walking, road or track
- 2. Road or track, gentle hills
- 3. Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

Pre-Outing Report – Top of Swan Creek – 22/7/2007

Outing Report Billyrimba Falls 24^{th} April 2007

Thirteen Nats set out on a crisp, clear morning to travel to Billyrima Falls via Tenterfield. We were a little late setting out, so we had a brief stop in Tenterfield, then proceeded past the water supply dam, where we saw quite a number of black swans and coots and ducks. On the way home, two pelicans had joined the clan.

As we travelled along Spirabo Forest Way we noticed a large flock of ibis in a paddock, along with eastern rosellas and what we thought was a brown falcon. A couple of wallabies crossed the road ahead of us at high speed.

When we arrived at the top of the falls we were all ready for smoko before venturing to the bottom of the gorge. We crossed the creek and headed across a ridge where we saw quite a few settler's flax plants, some with seeds. Most of the group decided to go to the bottom of the gorge, but three of us went part way and then took a leisurely walk back to the cars. We could see orange flowers or berries on creepers or trees across the gorge when we stopped to admire the view. We couldn't decide which they were and wondered if they were native or not.

Those of us who walked/scrambled down to the bottom of the gorge passed by a very interesting rock outcrop. On it were numerous orchids and ferns. There were king orchids (*Dendrobium speciosum*), *Dendrobium*

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kingianum, pineapple orchid (bulbophyllum elisae) pencil orchid (Dendrobium fairfaxii), and Liparis sp. On the rock there was also a very primitive fern (flannel fern?) and some fleshy-leaved creeping plants that we couldn't identify.

Once into the gorge, we explored down stream to a small waterfall. We were unable to go up to the base of the main falls, as the rocks were too slippery. Further down again there was another waterfall which we viewed from the top and we then made our way back up the spur to where the other three were. Experience told us that this is probably the easiest way to get into the gorge.

After lunch we all crossed back over the creek to explore an outcrop of rocks. There was a nice clump of grass trees on the way, and we could see other outcrops of rock across the gorge. We walked through bracken and blady grass (Garnia) to the outcrop which consisted of large granite boulders. There were some orchid leaves amongst the bracken, but no flowers. We did see blackeyed Susan (Tetratheca sp) We didn't have a long time to explore the rocks so we only saw a small section of them. We left at about three o'clock and made our way home.

Outing Reports:

1. Saturday walk – 2 June – Hocking's place

Col reported that only 21 species of birds were seen on the day which was a bit disappointing. However, the following weekend, 4 different honeyeater species were seen in the garden.

2. Sunday 24 June – Billyrimba Falls

13 members attended this walk, with most walking down into the gorge via a steep descent. Four different species of orchids were seen, although not in flower. After lunch, the group explored some other rock formations to the east. Lyrebirds were seen but there were few other birds about. Rob McCosker saw an echidna.

Pre-Outing Reports:

1. Friday 6 July

This will be to Wallangarra Ridge in Girraween National Park. It will leave from Weerona Park at 8.30am. The track to The Sphinx and Turtle Rock will be followed further south out onto a slab rock which has a good view from the end. It should be a 12 - 13km round trip.

3. Sunday 22 July 07

This will be to Swan Creek, east of Warwick, and will be led by Peter Kerr.
