May Outing to the Girraween Lodge

In perfect autumn weather 11 members met up to attend the outing to the Girraween Environmental Lodge. The property is bordered on three sides by the Girraween National Park and we started the day with a cuppa at the "Girraween Hilton" campsite. This is beside an old irrigation dam on the eastern side of the property quite near to Castle Rock, as the crow flies. We followed the tracks to circumnavigate the property in an anti- clockwise direction to view the named rock formations along the way, (as well as view the well known peaks of the National Park from different angles). There was Whale Rock, Echidna Rock, Pillows Tor and Cathedral Arch where we paused for lunch. After lunch we made a short detour up the ridge to see the Lyrebird's nest, before returning to the tracks to view the Giants Marbles and Rock Pools, then continuing to arrive back at the cars at about 3.00pm.

There was quite a lot of bird activity early in the day but my apologies as I did not make a bird list. We did not expect to see many wild flowers in bloom and indeed saw only the first blooms of the Blue Mountain Daisy, *Leucopogon sp.*, *Lionema (Phebalium)* and one confused *Boronia*. While at the Lyrebird's nest Halina noticed a cocoon on the ground next to Narelle's foot, who then proceeded to pick it up, much to her discomfort. It was most likely from a White-stemmed Gum Moth *Chelepteryx collesi* which are patterned in wavy bands of grey and brown and have a wingspan of up to 160mm. The caterpillar of this moth grow to between 100 and 120mm in length, are grey and white in colour with tufts of reddish bristles. These bristles are forced out through the silk of their cocoon when they pupate to protect them from predators, but when touched easily penetrate the skin, causing irritation and sometimes an allergic reaction. So be warned - look but don't touch!

The effects of the flood

I walk around the section of Quart Pot Creek from Lock to Britannia Street most days and keep an eye on the bird life as I go. On January 5th the Stanthorpe area had a lot of rain, we recorded over 120mm in town. The subsequent flood down Quart Pot Creek had a significant effect on the water birds. After the creek subsided most of the resident coots, moorhens and little pied cormorants had gone though the Pacific Black and Wood ducks stayed. In the following months the moorhens returned quite quickly but the cormorants are only now back in their pre-flood fishing areas. However the coots have not returned as yet and the Australasian grebes have only just reappeared on this stretch along with the white-faced herons.

1. Wombat Survey in Girraween National Park

A small number of members attended this outing which was led by Rob McCosker. One interesting sighting was a tree bearing three different types of mistletoe.

3. Girraween Environmental Lodge – 25 May

Rob McCosker also led this outing which visted a number of the tracks on the property, including some newly constructed ones. Some bluebells and *Phebalium rotundifolium* were seen.

Pre-outings:

1. Weekday

Halina and Nanette had offered to lead this but as there were no details, Michael offered to organise something if they were not available.

2. Dalveen Tunnels

Archie Cameron will be leading this outing to the railway tunnels at Dalveen, starting at 8.30am.

3. Potential future outings

Michael suggested a possible walk down the Boonoo Boonoo River from below the falls and also inquired about tackling the Mallee Ridge in the southern part of Girraween from the western side. Col reported that, in his experience, this was very thick and rocky.

Specimens:

1. Rob McCosker had a hairy cocoon of the white-stemmed gum moth – *Chelepteryx collesi*. The adult moth apparently has a wing span of up to 16cm. The bristles of the caterpillars and the cocoons can cause an allergic reaction in some people.

General Business:

1.First Aid Kit

Michael asked where the club's first aid kit had got to as it should be taken on outings. It was thought it may possibly be with the Carnells. Members felt that as it was quite large and bulky this prevented people from carrying it. Michael offered to review what was in it to maybe try and reduce it in size.

The meeting closed at 8.09pm and was followed by a presentation from Michael on a cycling trip he did around the west coast of Ireland in 1994.
