#### Outing Report Bundjalung National Park 11-14 August 2008

Kris and Margaret arrived on Monday afternoon and had time for a short walk while Archie and Grace set up camp. Along the Mibanbah Firetrail behind the campground, myriads of blooms gave a taste of what we'd find in the heath. The night provided the second shock of the outing.



(The first being a steep increase in fees \$10pp/night – along with Gibraltar Range, Bald Rock Boonoo Boonoo. and locally). much colder than I expected.



It was freezing with ice evidence in the mornings. Fortunately, the days were pleasant, though

Tuesday, Dave arrived, then we had a leisurely walk around "Emu Loop", returning along a section of the

short Jerusalem Creek. Banksia ericiafolia and yellow pea bushes were profuse. Wednesday, we strolled north along the beach where the tide, even low, caused "sprints" around some headlands and



scrambles over others. Soft brown and black "coffee rock" or "black rock" (formed by rainwater washing iron oxide and organic matter through sand dunes) formed 2-4m high cliffs and

manv little coves. Rain, wind and wave action have produced some fascinating sculptures in the rock archways, caves, potholes and (blow) holes. Most caves were



washed clean, but some deeper ones were littered with human's debris and driftwood. One tree trunk had speared into the soft cliff, and was firmly embedded horizontally.



A late smoko at the mouth of Jerusalem Creek, open to the ocean after heavy rain three weeks previously, then we followed the pleasant track between creek and sand dunes (with some vistas of the area) back to camp for a late lunch.

On Thursday, after a slightly warmer night, some packed for the return home; others stayed or moved elsewhere.

#### Jerusalem Track - Thursday 14th

Kris and I stayed another day at Black Rocks and drove out to the Jerusalem Track and walked along it to Jerusalem Creek. For the first 400 metres or so there were masses of boronia in bloom. It was a very enjoyable walk and went almost to the mouth of Jerusalem Creek. We saw the same great egret and two brahminy kites that we had seen from the other side of the creek. We then moved on to Red



Cliffs and saw a small flock of coastal Emus on the way. On our last day at Red Cliffs two whales appeared well out to sea, but we were able to watch them for a while.

**Bird List Bundjalung National Park:** brown or swamp quail, little wattlebird, grey butcherbird, welcome swallow, martin (not sure which), white-cheeked honeyeater, brahminy kite, Australasian gannet, pied oyster catcher, silver gull, tern (at least 1 species), superb blue wren, black-faced cuckoo shrike, magpie, Lewin's honeyeater, brown honeyeater, whipbird (call), kookaburra, crow, osprey, willie wagtail, duck, sacred kingfisher, silver eye, sacred ibis, currawong, white-faced heron, grey fantail, great egret, noisy friar bird, white bellied sea eagle, red capped plover, pelican, rail?, brolga? **Other:** echidna, bandicoot, kangaroo.

On Jerusalem Track: rufous whistler, grey shrike thrush, rainbow bee-eater.

Flower List Bundjalung National Park: Callistemon sp (red), Mirbelia? (small pinkish/purple pea), Leptospermum sp, Pandorea pandorana, Smilax australis, Boronia floribunda, Boronia falcifolia, Billardiera scandens, Banksia ericifolia, Banksia integrifolia, Banksia serrata, Epacris microphylla, Epacris obtusifolia, Sprengelia sprengelioides, Grevillea sp. (Coastal Wattle), Sowerbaea juncea, Conospermum sp, Xanthorrhoea sp (green buds), Woolsia sp., Pinelea linifolia, Kennedia rubicunda, Patersonia sp. Carpobrotus glaucescens (pig face), Allowcasurina sp. Berries: yellow on unidentified shrub, Elecocarpus reticulatus (blueberry ash), Lilly Pilly.

### Outing Report Mallee Ridge 24<sup>th</sup> August 2008

It was a beautiful clear morning when three car loads of Nats set out from Weeroona Park to drive to the Mt Norman Day Use Area where Trish and Rob, accompanied by Patrick, Kelly and Taryn, met us.



In the vicinity of Devil's Elbow we noticed the first of the *Acacia pubifolia* (Wyberba Wattle) coming out, and inside the National Park, *Acacia ruppii*. After the usual cuppa, 13 of us set off along the track to Mt Norman.

As we passed through the swamp at the beginning of the track there was *epacris microphylla*, *leucopogon neoanglicus*,

leucopogon melaleucoides and Bossiaea rhombifolia in bloom along the track. Further along we saw

Mirbelia speciosa subsp. Speciosa, Hovea purpurea, Acacia adunca and Acacia latisepala, as well as a lovely specimen of Indigofera australis off to the side. Where we turned to cross from one rock slab to another, almost in the shadow of Mt Norman, we saw Homoranthus montanus, Micromyrtus sessilis, Spyridium (formerly Stenanthenum) scortechinii and Prosanthera phylicifolia making a great show. Amongst the boulders the Boronia amabalis was a very beautiful pink.





We made our way through the boulders to the very large expanse of rock with a weathered dyke leading upwards, and fantastically weathered boulders scattered about. After admiring the view all the way to the Main Range, we passed through a wooded area where *Phebalium squamulosum* was in bloom and then clambered up a couple of logs to the very top of Mallee Ridge. From here the Pyramids seemed quite low and we could see The Sphinx quite clearly across the valley at the top of its steep granite slope.

Across to the south we scrambled down between the rocks to look over Wallangarra and sit in the sun to eat our lunch. This is where the Bell-fruited Mallee (*Eucalyptus codonocarpa*) grows, along with *Eucalyptus scoparia* (Wallangarra White Gum) in its natural habitat.

We made our way back to the cars and most of us travelled along Mt Norman Road to the creek crossing near Billygoat Hill where we had another cuppa. There were several species of wattle flowering here, including *Acacia rubida*. As we continued along the road, we noticed a mob of Rednecked Wallabies in a paddock on the right. We came past the headwaters of Storm King Dam where there were a number of water birds, which we did not stop to identify. All in all it was a perfect day for an outing.

The scale of difficulty is 8 as there are steep sections.

As there are a variety of terrestrial orchids at the Tank Traps on Mt Lindesay Road, east of Tenterfield, we decided to have our weekday outing for October there. At the time of going to press we have not done a pre-outing, but we trust that they will be blooming as usual at that time. We have also seen a wide variety of fungus in that area.

We will meet at Weeroona Park at 9.00am and travel via Mt Lindesay Road to the Tank Traps where we will have smoko when we arrive. It is possible to walk from the Tank Traps to Thunderbolt's Lookout along a pleasant track for about a kilometre and there is often a lyrebird in the area. If it is at all damp, be prepared for leeches. I'm taking insect repellent! We will have lunch at the cars before returning home. If we have plenty of time we can go to the town dam to look at water birds.
