#### **Pre Outing Information**

Scenic Highlights of the Mt. Norman Road Leaders - Errol and Annette Walker

The Mt. Norman Road traverses, north to south, the eastern third of Girraween National Park and is a formed 4WD track from which travellers can view, close-up, some spectacular granite formations and waterholes set in sub-alpine swampland. For almost 50 years Annette and I have walked this fascinating area in the company of Jean Harslett and Bill Goebel. We have been privileged to share many of their "special" places and now it is time for us to share some of these places with you, the newer members of this great club.

We plan to climb Billygoat Hill for commanding views of the 'giants' of Girraween; Mt.Norman, South, West and Middle Rock as well as Bald Rock to the east are all over 4000 ft. above sea level. Our next highlight will be a short walk to what must have been a tremendous lightning strike when, in about 1963, several huge slabs of granite were exploded from a cliff face. We have a picture of the result of the strike taken in 1970 (below) and it makes an interesting comparison to view the damage today.



After lunch beside a Racecourse Creek waterhole we will drive south a few Km. for an easy walk to a vantage point from which we can look back to Billygoat Hill and the swamp around Racecourse Creek. Returning home the same way a 15 min.walk is planned along a fire trail to a natural granite crossing of Paling Yard Creek.

This outing replaces the proposed outing to the Cataract River area of New South Wales. Our pre-outing soon put paid to this destination as access timber-getting trails were overgrown and due

to re-growth after bushfires, even walking through the undergrowth was somewhat of a challenge. We did find the spectacular falls we were looking for but considered it prudent not to put a group through this 'heavy' walk. Maybe sometime in the future! However if some hardened walker would like to visit the falls the track notes are available.

For this outing we will meet at Weroona Park at 8am and be prepared to pool our 4WD vehicles so that only HIGH CLEARANCE vehicles will be attempting the trip. Lunch will be taken at the vehicles and the return driving distance will only be about 65 Km. Hope to be home by 3.30 to 4pm. We have set the 'scale of difficulty' at 2 and 5 with easy options. 3.5 Km max. walking for the whole day. More information? Phone Errol Walker. 07 4681 2008

*Campout to Arcadia Valley April 23*rd – *26*th; *the McCoskers*.

Trish and I had an unscheduled stop-over in the Arcadia Valley on our way to the Carnarvons last year because of a flooded creek, and were directed to Arcadia Valley Escape by the Injune Tourist Office. This is a working cattle property with a range of accommodation as well as camping and is about 78km from Injune and 120km from Carnarvon NP. Lake Nuga Nuga is only 50km. Apart from these nearby attractions there are numerous activities to be taken on the property including a 12km walk along a 4wd track, various 4WD tracks to explore, two large ponded pasture dams with bird hides, and

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fishing in the dam near the cottage (with fishing gear provided). Apart from a day at Lake Nuga Nuga, I have not finalised a program for the weekend as yet as it will depend on how many people come, so I am keen to hear if you are interested. It is a comfortable days drive from Stanthorpe to the campsite.

#### **OUTING REPORTS**

#### The TV Tower, Passchendaele.

Our group of seven arrived at the tower to find Jean Harslett waiting for us.



After morning tea we completed a short circuit walk to the west of the tower to look at *Diuris parvipetala*, a rare donkey orchid, discovered before Christmas by Michael Jefferies. Surprisingly, after the hot, dry weather we had been experiencing, one of the three known plants was still flowering. Adjacent to the rock pavements the Summer flowering wattle attracted attention as did the purple flowered *Scaevola ramosissima*.

On returning to the vehicles, we drove a short distance along the road to the north of the tower. This enabled us to avoid an up-hill return walk in the heat of the day. After parking beside the road we took a leisurely walk to a rock pavement on the north-western edge of the ridge. On the way it was disappointing to find that a *Dipodium* which had been in full flower on the pre-outing five days prior, was badly shrivelled and wilted from the heat and dryness. At the rock pavement

discussion ensued as to which mountains were in view. On returning to the vehicles, some members with other commitments departed and the remainder of us found shade to eat lunch.

This area would be well worth visiting again, especially during Spring as it shows promise as a good area for a variety of flowers.

#### OUTING REPORT FOR MT. CORDEAUX.

Just four of us left Weeroona Park on a fine clear day & travelled to Main Range. We stopped for morning tea at the picnic ground before proceeding to the car park where we joined by one more member. It was quite an easy walk and quite different from any previous visit in that it was much wetter. There were good streams in some of the gullies and lots of mosses and ferns were thriving well in the wetter conditions. It was quite wet underfoot in some places.



On the way up the mountain, we stopped briefly at the Fassifern Lookout for a view over the Fassifern Valley. After about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours we reached the lookout at Mt. Cordeaux where there were spectacular views of Mt. Mitchell, Spicer's Peak, Mt. Barney and other mountains of the Scenic Rim. It was refreshing to see the green outlook over the Fassifern Valley. Along the track we noticed quite a few very colourful fungi. We had a brief stop at the lookout before proceeding a little further around the northern

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side of the mountain to a saddle where we got different views of Mt. Cordeaux as well as views to the west, east and north. At the top here, we noticed a python was curled up sleeping in the rocks. After photographs were taken he was completely undisturbed the whole time we were there. We had a break here before heading back down. Along the way there were a few wild- flowers sparsely scattered in places.



After about 3½ hours we are back at the cars, where we proceeded to the picnic ground for lunch. A good day was had by all.

They are looking for photos from Girraween to illustrate walks and the flora and fauna of the Park. Anyone with an interest in this project should contact them through their web site. I have set-up a Group on Flickr purely for photos from Girraween to add to the Granite Belt Naturalist one. While talking about the web site please remember that it a quick method of communication; well when I am around, as it takes very little to change and add things to it. I am looking for another member or two to be a backup in maintaining it, feel free to contact me. The only requirement is a reasonable speed connection to the Internet and a degree of curiosity combined with patience!

Thirdly I am happy to put other things on the web site. All contributions are best as rich text format text files (RTF) or just plain text with no formatting, and separate photos carefully named! For those who don't know what rich text format is it is a way of ensuring the text can be read by nearly all word processing files – unlike MS Word for example. MS Word can save documents in RTF. It saves me a lot of time having to remove formatting stuff one gets from MS Word!

I do find that I get some problems with email addresses on the Halenet system; I suspect that the server sometimes gets very busy. As you can see I use Gmail. Not only has it the most wonderful spam control system but I can store all my emails in folders and they are accessible anytime anywhere. Everything I get about the Field Nats is stored in a folder there as well as here so your words of wisdom are not lost!
