Outing Reports

Historic Roads – 4th July 2009



Mark McNichol led a very interesting outing on Saturday 4th July. The weather was cold and windy but about 20 people braved the elements. Some of us met at Weeroona Park and travelled to the Sugarloaf Rural Fire Brigade shed, where several more people joined the outing. Mark distributed maps and information and talked about the roads and telegraph line we hoped to investigate, before we set out to find the old road East of Storm King Dam. It was possible to follow a faint track, just a depression in the landscape, for quite some distance to where it crossed a creek and continued up the other side. The crossing was slightly higher where dirt had been placed in the creek and the water had banked up a little behind it. Michael did an excellent job of leading the group along the track.



From there we travelled to Panorama Drive and onto Peter Crisp's land where we had morning tea, before looking for the old telegraph line. Ruth Bott had two joeys with her and one of them was quite frightened and confused by all of us when let out to stretch his legs. We discovered the remains of a greater glider hooked on the fence, so Ruth took it with her to be tested for DNA, to establish whether the area would be suitable for the release of any gliders that the Wildlife Carers had rescued. After smoko, we went through the fence into the bush looking for signs of the telegraph line and found a tree with an old blaze in it, and further on a cairn of stones. Some Nats found a patch of nodding greenhoods (*Pterostylus nutans*) in bloom, as well as lots of leaves of

bird orchids (Chiloglottis sp).

We drove along the road and walked down the paddock, past the yards in Peter's place, where we were joined by Alan Mayne and he and Mark marked the junction of the Stanthorpe branch line and the main Sydney to Brisbane telegraph line. There was some mistletoe with flowers that seemed to be a different colour from the usual ones, growing in a tree near the fence. Alan walked along the branch line to the road where the rest of us met him and we drove to Col and Janet Hocking's place where we had lunch in their garden. We were having such a relaxed time chatting that we were reluctant to stir our stumps and walk across the road to the site of an old dredge. Peter McNichol brought a model of a sluice box and a 1/16 size pump that he had made, and explained how it worked where the original sluice box would have stood. We saw the hole in the creek where the sand and tin was pumped from and the hole behind it where the water and sand would have washed out. From there we drove a short distance to the Brisbane Claim, an old tin mine. We found the remains of the old road beside the claim with rocks that may have been scraped by steel coach wheels.





The Brisbane Claim was one of the richest in the world and had a floating dredge on it at one time. It was also worked by Chinese miners. We walked along Quart Pot Creek and found the rusted remains of an impeller of a pump that had worn out from use in the mines. As time was passing rather too quickly to visit any more old road sites, we came home via Dalcouth and stopped to look at the site of the Dalcouth school and hall.

It was a very interesting outing and we would like to thank Mark and Peter McNichol, Peter Crisp and Alan Mayne for going to so much trouble and making it so enjoyable. *Margaret Carnell (photos by Margaret Carnell)*

Rokeby Station Sunday, 19th July 2009.



Eighteen adults, one very keen young fellow and a bub met at Rokeby. After smoko we were led by our young naturalist, Curtis, slowly to the top of the ridge through Rokeby Scrub. The scrub is true rainforest with a variety of tree sizes, but a completely closed canopy resulting in an almost bare floor and numerous vines and creepers to be negotiated. Several old brush turkey mounds were seen. Once we reached the top of the ridge the rainforest ended and became open woodland, with views to the west (top end of Connolly Dam) and north-west to Warwick. We then walked around the edge of the scrub to the power line

easement and followed it back down to the cars for lunch. Photo Col Hockings

After lunch, most of the group drove northwards to Elbow Valley. We inspected a small timber cottage at the valley entrance and then proceeded into the valley. Lantana along the creek soon forced us up the valley sides and we then obtained excellent views across to the east to the Main Range. It became obvious that although we did not have the time, we were part-way on the walk to the top of Rokeby Hill and and this has real potential for a future trip. Although there will be some steep walking for some of it.

It was interesting to contrast the two valleys - the Rokeby Scrub was true rainforest, with quite large Stinging Trees, Crows Ash, Fig species, Lacebark Kurrajong and Silky Oaks, plus numerous smaller rainforest species, whereas Elbow Valley vegetation was Ironbark and Gum with a smattering of dry rainforest species along the creek edges. Poplar-leaved Kurrajong (the common one for this area) were present and an unknown *Backhousia* (*angustifolia*?) was seen on a rock face. Lantana was present in both areas but only around the edges of the Scrub as it had been shaded out in the interior.



Birds seen or heard included Wedge-tailed Eagle, Nankeen kestrel, Pied Butcherbird, Currawong, White browed Scrubwren, Superb Blue Wren, Brown Thornbill, Yellow Robin, Grey Thrush, Eastern Whipbird and Lewin Honeyeaters. Towards the top of the ridge in the Scrub some platelets were seen scraped on the ground. These are typical of button-quail and it would be interesting to know if they were Black-breasted button-quail.
