SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- Flat walking, road or track
- Road or track, gentle hills
- 3. Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle sig6. Track, steep sections common, with steps Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

Pre-outing Reports

September short walks: -As we are hosting a visit from persons who have been attending the Australian Naturalists Network Annual Meeting in Chinchilla in early September the 'Friday' outing is subsumed into the ones below. All members welcome to join in all or part, and assist.

The program we are running is:-

September 7th (Tuesday) to Bald Rock and Boono Boonoo Falls. Evening dinner at the RSL.

September 8th, (Wednesday) to Girraween NP. Evening meeting for the visitors showing "Remember last year" and "Local Insects". At the CWA premises.

September 9th, (Thursday) to State Forest around Amiens. Kris Carnell

Sunday September 19th: The Richmond Range, NSW led by *Halina Kruger*.

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6th to 10th October:- Campout at Gibraltar Range.

Gibralter Range N.P. can be accessed via the Gwydir Highway, 79km east of Glen Innes. The 9km unsealed entry road to Mulligans camp ground is suitable for 2WD in all weathers. Highlights of the park are its deep valleys and giant granite rocks, scenic creeks and cascades, swamps, woodlands and heaths that can be explored on more than 80km of walking track.

Camping fees: Mulligans Camping area. \$10.00 per adult per night \$5.00 per child per night. Vehicle fees; \$7.00 per day or annual pass.

Facilities; Wood, gas/electric barbecues, picnic tables, amenities block with flush toilets and cold showers. There are 6 camping areas to suit multi-vehicle groups and 15 individual sites for tents and medium sized caravans and camping trailers. Water supply. Tap water available but boil before drinking. Several walking tracks start from this area. Little Dandahra Creek nearby is suitable for swimming. There are 10 walking tracks ranging in difficulty from easy to medium difficulty, 1km to 19 km. in the park. Temperature range for October 20-25 degrees. Rainfall 100mm for October.

There 140 species of birds, including the rare rufous scrub bird, koalas, spotted tailed quolls, wallabies, rufous bettongs, long nosed potoroos, greater glider and common dunnarts and pouched frogs to be seen in the park.

It would be good if I could get some idea of numbers of members interested in participating in the campout by the next meeting as I may have to book the campsites. Details of the walks can be accessed online at www.nationalparks.nsw.gov.au *Carol Smallwood*.

OUTING REPORTS

FRIDAY 6th August 2010 – North Girraween.



On a brisk morning with a "lazy" wind we left Weeroona Park shortly after 9.00am to rendezvous with the rest of the group at the Mt. Norman Rd. Girraween. After a leisurely morning tea our group of 10 set off along the Service road into the National Park. Along the way to our destination we observed the destruction caused by feral pigs. The walk along the road to the chosen ridge is only about one kilometre so it did not take long to reach.

During the scramble up the low ridge everyone's attention was drawn to a water-worn groove which runs straight down on a steep rock face. The flowers on the ridge were quite a sight with some yet to reach their peak. Views from the top take in The Signboard to the west, Slip Rock to the north-west, the Sphinx and Turtle Rock in the south-west and Mt. Norman to the south south –west.

We returned to the vehicles for a chatty lunch. A number of members were sufficiently impressed

with the accessibility of the ridge and its flowers that they intend to return. Col Hockings

PLANT LIST - IN FLOWER

Patersonia glabrata, Philotheca epilosa, Leucopogon lanceolatus, Leucopogon melaleucoides, Leucopogon neoanglicus, Acacia adunca, Acacia latisepala, Acacia ulicifolia, Acacia filicifolia, Mirbelia speciosa, Leionema rotundifolium, Hovea sp.(very hairy), Maytenus sp, Melichrus procumbens, Styphelia viridus, Indigofera australis, Banksia integrifolia, Erythrorchis cassythoides (climbing orchid, in bud) Zieria compacta (in bud).

Insects various including the first bee-fly of the season and a rare 'primitive' earwig, *Cranopygia* sp. which is a species with a Gondwanan distribution. (*Pictured, found under bark.*)

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Xanthorrhoea, Petrophile canescens, Banksia serrata, Banksia spinulosa, Epacris microphylla, Melichrus procumbens, Hovea graniticola and heterophylla, Acacia floribunda and Acacia ulicofolia and other unidentified acacias.
