SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- Flat walking, road or track
- 1. 2. Road or track, gentle hills
- 3. 4. 5. Track, some hilly sections
- Track, some steep sections
- Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.



There was no **Friday** outing in April.

Sunday April 22nd, east end of Sundown NP, led by M Müller. Red Rock Falls - Gorge Rim - Shepherds Creek - Red Rock Creek







We continued along the rim, keeping well clear of the crumbly edge and enjoyed the views into the gorge and towards Mt Jibbinbar and The Brothers in the distance.

On the far side we went down the cascades of Shepherds Creek which were completely dry. Further east we reached what little is left of the old hut erected during the time when mining was done sporadically in the area. On reaching the track to the Severn River we turned north, then west to get back to Red Rock Creek where we intended to walk back to the falls along the scenic creek-bed when one member had a very unlucky fall and had to be taken to hospital.

Urn heath, *Melichrus uceolatus;* Peach bush, *Olearia elliptica;* Blue mountain daisy, *O.ramosissima;* Purple daisy, *Brachyscome stuartii;* Bluebell, *Whalenbergia graniticola.*

Also noticed along the track in the National Park was extensive areas invaded by Coolatai grass *Hyparrhenia hirta*.
