- Track, steep sections common, with steps 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick
- undergrowth 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over
- rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick
- undergrowth 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

Pre-outing Reports

The 2012 Transit of Venus:- 6th June:- last chance for 105 years

As by now you all may have heard it from the media, on the 6th of June planet Venus will move directly in front of the sun. We know it takes 365 days for the Earth to circle the sun. Our distance to the sun is approx. 150 million Km. Venus is much closer. At 100 million Km she circles faster and subsequently completes her year in just 225 (earth) days. So every 584 days Venus is overtaking us. It is very easy to see what Venus is doing. If Venus appears as the so called "evening star" she comes closer and is about to overtake us. If we can see her in the morning sky she has already overtaken us. So keep watch, from about 10 days after the event we will gradually spot her shortly before sunrise. The reason why such a transit is so rare (the next one is in 2117) is that in contrast to the earth the orbit of Venus is tilted by 3.4 degrees so that normally she passes well north or south of the sun. However, this time, on the 6th of June from 8.14am we should see the apparent contact of Venus with the disc of the sun. This will last until 2.41pm.

From 8.00am onwards I will have my telescope outside and all members (family etc.) are welcome to drop in at any time and have a look. Tea and coffee available. Let's hope for a clear day.

Friday 8th June:- Seven Acres Rock, Passchendaele SF.

This outing was scheduled for October last year, but sudden heavy rain forced us to return. Outing Reports

Friday 4th May; Sugarloaf, Narelle & Brian Hill

Our Friday outing for May was a beautiful sunny day and 11 Nats turned out for a leisurely morning. Firstly we had morning tea at George's place, our neighbour's property in Brown Gully Road. We observed where his front yard was literally washed away in the January 2011 floods and



where he has done considerable work creating ponds and dam walls to prevent this from happening again, and his front yard ending up in the middle of town. He already had a lovely spring fed dam, upon which a white duck was floating, the dam being a leftover hole from the mining days and since Jan 2011 he has created another 3 at the front of his house.

After morning tea we walked up to the northern end of George's property to his "tree house", along the way observing many plants, fungi, birds, insects, butterflies and another spring fed dam. From his tree house we observed the wonderful views to Bald Rock and over Girraween National Park together with the unusual

construction of the tree house. Michael J has since advised that the tree house sits at 1004m above sea level. (on Google Earth, the house is clearly visible, Ed.)

We then continued up the eastern boundary of George's property to the border fence. Many stops

were had along the way while various Nats took photos of plants and many fungi. We saw a red bellied black snake, which slowly moved into NSW. Leeches were in abundance (Pic. - *Carol trying to avoid leeches*! *Ed.*).

After following the border fence along the northern boundary of another two properties, we cut back south through the "Jeremjenko" property (established in the 1970s) down to the creek on the road. Many trees had been planted, including Bunya & Hoop Pines and a Brown Pine was also seen on this property. Ian was also locating numerous plants and trees along the way.

Michael Jefferies was taking many photographs along the walk, one of which was a brown butterfly. Michael has informed us that this butterfly was a Silver Xenica at the far north of its range and an interesting find. The nearest record known to Michael is from Boonoo-Boonoo Falls. (*See below for pic etc. Ed.*)



At the creek crossing, we explained how our it was washed away also, taking large gums and banksias with it. We were locked in for about 5 weeks until the Council

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fixed the road. It was shown that when the creek washed out the crossing, it revealed large logs from an old wooden bridge which was there many years ago. We had been told that some years prior our road was used to get to Liston etc. An elderly gentleman once told us that he as a young man walked through the Sugarloaf area to go swimming at the dam. He also told us that he regularly saw Regent Bowerbirds in this area. Some of the old bridge timbers have been used on the new crossing and one at George's place, which we sat on to have morning tea. Most of the Nats then came up to our property and had lunch. Our property sits at 1054m above sea level. Following lunch some wandered around our ridge before going home. Thank you for a lovely outing. *Narelle & Brian Hill*

Birds seen or heard: Yellow tailed black cockatoos, White cockatoo, Nankeen Kestrel, Red Browed Finches, King Parrots, Brown Thornbill, White Throated Tree Creeper, Wrens, Grey Thrush, Crimson Rosellas, Grey Butcherbird, Red Wattle Bird, Golden Whistler, White Winged Choughs.

Plant list:- (*transcribed MGJ, errors & changes are mine!*)

Taxonomic name followed by 'common' name. * =exotic weed.

Asteraceae: Xerochrysum bracteata, Golden Everlasting; Chrysocephalum apiculatum, Yellow Buttons; Brachyscome macrocarpa; Calotis cuniefolia, Blue Burr-daisy; Olearia elliptica subsp. viscosa, Sticky Daisy bush; Cyanthillium cinereum, Ironweed; *Senecio madagascarensis, *Hypochaeris radicata, Cat's Ear.

Apiaceae: Hydrocotyle peduncularis, Pennywort; Trachymene incisa, Native Candytuft.

Campanulaceae: Lobelia purpurascens, White Root; Wahlenbergia sp. Bluebell.

Dillenaceae: Hibbertia linearis var. obtusifolia, Guinea Flower.

Goodeniaceae: Goodenia bellidifolia, Daisy-leaved Goodenia.

Euphorbiaceae: Poranthera microphylla, Small Poranthera.

Stylidiaceae: Stylidium graminifolium, Grass Trigger-plant.

Violaceae: *Hybanthus monopetalus,* Slender violet; *Viola betonicifolia,* Mountain violet. **Roseaceae**: *Aceana novae-zealandae,* Biddy-widdy.

Laxmanniaceae: (Asparagaceae) Eustrephus latifolius, Wombat Berry.

Verbenaceae: *Verbena bonariensis, Blue-top.

Proteaceae: Banksia integrifolia.

Celasteraceae: *Elaeodendron australe*, Staff Climber. (*Cassine australis var angustifolia*). **Primulaceae**: (Myrsinae) *Myrsine howittiana* or *variabilis*, Muttonwood.

Apocynaceae: *Marsdenia rostrata*, Common Milk-vine. Trees planted at Jeremijenko since 1970

Bunya Pine, Hoop Pine and Brown Pine (*Podocarpus elatus*).

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Insects

There were not many but there was one of particular interest; the Silver Xenica; *Oreixenica lathoniella* (Westwood, 1851). This species is at the far north end of its range; its photo is alongside. While similar to some other 'browns' the eyespot on the upper front wing and the bright triangles on the under-hind wing are characteristic. It has been reported from Girraween in the past and an effort is to be made to see if it is still present. Please look through your photos of butterflies to see if you have any that can give us a location anywhere in the district!

The Ascent of Mount Sturt - 20th May 2012

Nine people gathered at Jackie Howe Park, Warwick, for the ascent of Mt Sturt. After a short 20 minute drive east of Warwick, we arrived at the property of Bruce & Anne Hempel at the foot of Mt Sturt. We were warmly greeted by Anne before beginning our climb. As with the pre-outing, there was some difficulty locating the start of the track. Eventually, it was located and the climb up the steep western side of the mountain began. Much of the ascent was through remnant vine scrub, some of which was regrowth after logging. Numerous stops were made to catch our breath. As



the summit ridge was approached, the vine scrub gave way to open forest. It was here than the track was briefly lost. Incredibly, while we were off track, I located my lens cap lost during the preouting! What were the chances? With the track located again, it was a short walk to a viewpoint on the south west corner of the mountain. Lunch was enjoyed from this vantage point with the rolling farmland of the southern Downs and the distant Granite Belt spread out before us. For a short time, a wedge-tailed eagle soared overhead. After our break, we retraced out steps back to our starting point. The steep descent made us appreciate why the climb had been so exhausting. With the walk



completed, all took the option of a leisurely drive through farmland around the base of Mt Sturt. A stop was made in the park at Yangan for a well-earned cuppa. Some members took the opportunity to purchase cappuccinos from the historic Yangan store. Once the cuppa was over, we headed up to the saddle ridge near the eastern flank of Mt Sturt that separates the Swanfels & Freestone valleys. Regrowth has obscured the once impressive view into the Swanfels Valley from this point. Once we entered the Freestone Valley, some dark clouds started to build over Mt Sturt. Numerous stops were made to take

photographs of the changing landscape. With the loop was completed, we parted company and headed for home, cheered in knowing a new peak had been bagged. *David Wilson*
