Friday 7th September: Wylie Creek, Liston

We will meet at Weeroona Park at 9.00am as usual and drive to a property on the Rivertree Road. This property is bordered by Wylie Creek which was mined extensively for tin and the remains of



the old workings are still obvious, including an old steam engine. We will follow the creek for a bit then walk along the boundary fence and through a patch of remnant forest back to the cars. Being on the eastern fall from Stanthorpe this area received a lot more rain in earlier months and this is obvious with running streams and lush green grass – such a change from our present droughty winter conditions!

Please note this is a private property with a locked gate so we will have to travel in convoy.

Sunday 23rd September: Mt Norman Through Walk

We will meet as usual at Weeroona Park at 9.00am and after arranging for a vehicle to be left at the Girraween Castle Rock campground, we will drive to the Mt Norman Picnic Area. After morning tea we will set off on the 7km Mt Norman Track which, after the first steep rock slope, skirts around the western side of Mt Norman, the highest peak in the Girraween National Park, then following ridge-tops gently descends to the Castle Rock campground. As there is a well made track with some

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steep sections I would rate this a grade 6 walk, and there should be a good display of wildflowers at this time of year. We will carry lunch to have along the way and be sure to carry water.

Outing Reports

Outing to Girraween Friday 3rd August 2012

Nine members met up at the Dr Roberts Waterhole Carpark to be greeted with brilliant displays of *Acacia adunca* and Snowbush, *Leucopogon melaleucoides*, which made up for the cool dull weather. We had our cuppa then set off down the track with Coral Heath, *Epacris microphylla* providing the trackside interest until we branched off towards the Underground Creek and dense stands of New England Banksia, *Banksia spinulosa var. neoanglica*, became dominant. Several Eastern Spinebills also put on a show for us, flitting from bush to bush, and as we neared the creek there were

lots of flowering Pepper and Salt, Spyridium scortechinii (previously called Stenanthemum). We

clambered up to view the spectacularly water sculptured granite of the Underground Creek then made our way upstream to the where the creek forms a series of pools in solid granite, interlaced with large dykes. The return to the track was in a different direction as we crossed a large granite slab with views to Mt Norman, being careful to negotiate the many wet patches where moisture was seeping over the rock.

Outing Report – 19th August 2012 – Bolivia Nature Reserve

It was a perfect day for an outing when 10 Nats left Weeroona Park, picking up six more on the way to Bolivia Hill. We were able to park off the truck parking area and have a cuppa before commencing our walk. We saw *Melichrus urceolatus, Hovea heterophylla* and *Leucopogon melaleucoides* in bloom where we were parked. The *Acacia fimbriata* was in bud and *Acacia filicafolia* in bloom .

The reserve, which was gazetted in 2000, is 1782 ha in size and is made up of two former sheep stations. The one to the north that we visited first used to be called Clifferna and the southern one was called Bolivia Hill station. Both these stations were originally part of Bolivia Station. The National Parks has a plan of management for the reserve and the medium term goal is to open the Bolivia Hill shearing shed to visitors. Apparently some historic items have been stolen from the shed which probably explains the padlocks on the doors.

Entry to the Nature Reserve is through a gate just over the old railway line and the walking was easy along a road. There was a dead tree fern where we crossed over a gully and a bit further on *Acacia venulosa* and *Epacris microphylla* amongst the rocks. Our first stop was to explore the site of the old house and shearing shed, where some of the fences are still standing. There was some discussion about the naming of Boliva Station and the names of the trails. Edward Hurry was the first European to settle at Bolivia where he had a sheep station. He had lived in Bolivia in South America, hence the name. A community sprang up in the area with shops, a cemetery and a school. It is the only other place in the world with the same name as the country and the local community was presented with a Bolivian flag which they fly at Boliva Hall sometimes. In 2011 Bolivia Station was sold by the widow of Frank McAlary QC who had owned it since the 1970s. Frank McAlary was the dancing man on the dollar coin, issued in 2005, commemorating the end of WW2.



We proceeded along the Chile Trail stopping to look at a *Pimelea* which we thought was *Pimelea neoanglica*. After crossing a creek we had a look at a pig trap that has been built and used. A couple of people heard small piglets squealing in that area. From there we went along the Columbia Trail, stopping to look at an acacia with large green leaves and yellowish, flattened young stems. The buds were still green and looked as if they wouldn't be out for a while, but we thought they would have long flowers like the Wyberba wattle. There were a few plants of *Correa reflexa*

beside the track.

After looking at the view over Boliva Station we had lunch before heading back towards the parking area. Just before we reached the site of the old house we turned south along the Brazil trail. This trail runs roughly parallel to the western boundary of the reserve. The vegetation is distinctly different from the other trail. Firstly we saw golden mistletoe, *Notothixos subaureus*, growing on other mistletoe. This only occurred on *Angophora* trees in a narrow strip. Then the vegetation changed to mainly *Banksia integrifolia* which should be good for bird



watching when they are in flower. After a short time we retraced our steps to the vehicles for afternoon tea.



Then we drove to the southern entrance of the park to look at the old shearing shed and house ruins. The shed was locked so we could only look in the cracks. The National Parks has been working on the site and has replaced some of the slabs on the walls as well as protecting some of the eastern side from the weather. After a browse around the area, the outing finished and we made our way home.
